Bring on the World Tour - Featuring the U.S. Women's National Team

Four Nations Cup • USA vs. Sweden • Nov. 5, 2013
Lake Placid, N.Y. • 1980 Herb Brook Arena • 7 p.m. ET



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BRING ON THE WORLD TOUR: The Tour is part of the overall preparation for the 2014 Olympic Winter Games that includes the 2013 Four Nations Cup and three games against Canada in the U.S. The three games vs. Canada are Oct. 12 in Burlington, Vt. (3-2, loss), Dec. 20 in Grand Forks, N.D. and Dec. 28 in St. Paul, Minn. Tickets are currently on sale for the games in Grand Forks and St. Paul.

THE FOUR NATIONS CUP: The Four Nations Cup is an annual tournament that has been held in varying forms since 1996. The U.S. competes against Canada, Sweden and Finland in this year's tournament. This year marks the 18th year of the tournament (previously the Three Nations Cup) and the fifth time it has taken place in the U.S. All games will be held at the 1980 Herb Brooks Arena. The United States has competed in the tournament 16 times, having not participated in 2001. The United States has captured the title five times (1997, 2003, 2008, 2011-12), including the last two years and three out of the last five events. Team USA has finished second in each of the other 11 tournaments it has participated in. The Americans hold an overall record of 36-5-4-20-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) in 67 Three/Four Nations Cup games. Team USA has never lost a Four Nations Cup game to any team other than Canada, although the 1997 tournament saw the United States play to a 3-3 draw with Finland.

GAME DAY: The U.S. Women's National Team faces off against Sweden in its first game of the 2013 Four Nations Cup at 7 p.m. on Tues., Nov. 5, at the 1980 Herb Brooks Arena in Lake Placid, N.Y. The game will be streamed live on USAHockey.FASTHockey.com. Follow along on Twitter @USAHockey and @USAHockeyScores) and join the conversation by using hashtag #4NationsCup. This marks the first meeting between the two teams at this event since they faced off on Nov. 6, 2012. In that game, the U.S. shutout Sweden, 4-0.

USA vs. SWEDEN: In the Four Nations Cup, Team USA has never lost to Sweden, holding a 12-0-0-0 record overall. The U.S. has shut out Sweden in the last three games over the last three years by a collective score of 16-0.

DUGGAN’S CAPTAINCY: Meghan Duggan is captain for the U.S. Women’s National Team. She previously served as captain for the U.S. at the 2011 Four Nations Cup and 2008 Under-22 Series and has also been an alternate captain at the 2013 IIHF Women’s World Championship and 2012 Four Nations Cup. She was selected as USA Hockey’s Bob Allen Women’s Player of the Year for 2011 after being named the 2011 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award winner.

DOUBLE TROUBLE: Twin sisters **Jocelyne** and **Monique Lamoureux** will once again compete together for Team USA. They have participated in more than 75 games together for the U.S.

SIBLING SUPPORT: **Amanda Kessel**, and brother Phil Kessel, could potentially both be competing for Team USA at the Sochi Games.

MAKING HISTORY: Head Coach **Katey Stone** will be the first female to lead a U.S. Olympic Women’s Ice Hockey Team when the team hits the ice in Sochi, Russia.

REBOUNDING STRONG: The Bring on the World Tour marks Kelli Stack’s first action since suffering a lower body injury in December 2012. Prior to her injury, she was voted best forward of the 2012 IIHF Women’s World Championship.

FIRST-TIMERS: Thirteen players are vying for the opportunity to represent the United States for the first time in the Olympics.

CALIFORNIA DREAMING: **Annie Pankowski** played her youth hockey in California and is a great example of the growth of women’s hockey and the sport’s advancement across the country.

OLYMPIANS: Twelve players are returning from the 2010 Olympic roster that earned silver, led by Julie Chu, a three-time Olympian. Between them, they have appeared in 71 Olympic Winter Games and won 14 medals (silver-13, and bronze-1).

AGE APPROPRIATE: **Jincy Dunne** is looking to become the youngest player to earn a spot on the U.S. Women’s Olympic Team and will be 16 years, 8 months, 24 days as of the opening ceremony. She is 15 years younger than the oldest member of the team, Julie Chu, who would be the oldest player to represent the U.S. at 31 years, 10 months, 27 days.

DREAMING BIG: **Lyndsey Fry** competes not only for herself and her team, but for her best friend and former teammate, Elizabeth Turgeon, who was tragically killed in a car accident in 2010. If not for the accident, Turgeon would likely be considered for a spot on the 2014 U.S. Olympic Women’s Ice Hockey Team as well. Fry carries Turgeon’s Team USA jersey on this journey as inspiration.

PERSEVERANCE: During the Bring on the World Tour, forward **Kate Buesser** is wearing the U.S. jersey for the first time. She has earned her the opportunity after failing to make previous U.S. teams. She is the only player on the roster to enter the tour without representing Team USA for a single game.

BLOODLINES: Forward **Alex Carpenter** is looking to do one of the few things her father, Bobby, did not during his illustrious career. He never played in the Olympics because NHL players did not begin competing until 1998 during the final year of his 18-year career.

AGE: The average age of the 25 players on the team is 23. The oldest player on the team is **Julie Chu** (31) and the youngest is **Jincy Dunne** (16). Dunne is joined by fellow teenagers **Alex Carpenter** (19), **Annie Pankowski** (19) and **Lee Stecklein** (19).

STATES: The players hail from 13 different states, led by Massachusetts with five players. Minnesota (three), Illinois (three), Wisconsin (three), North Dakota (two) and Ohio (two) also have multiple players representing their states.

COLLEGE: College: Of the 25 players on the roster, 23 have attended college. Nine different NCAA schools are represented and two universities, Harvard University (ECACH) and the University of Minnesota (WCHA), have had five skaters play for them. Twelve players come from the WCHA, five each from the ECACH and HEA, and one from the CHA.

PATTY PROUD: The current roster includes five players who have won the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, presented annually to the top player in NCAA Division I women’s ice hockey. Those players include **Amanda Kessel** (2013), **Brianna Decker** (2012), **Meghan Duggan** (2011), **Jessie Vetter** (2009) and **Julie Chu** (2007). During her breakout junior campaign, Kessel helped the Gophers to an unblemished record. She led the NCAA in goals, assists, and points and became the fourth player in NCAA history to reach 100 points in a single season. She was also the 24th player in NCAA history to reach 200-career points and only the ninth player to do so in three seasons.

BOSTON STRONG: Eight players competed last season for the Boston Blades of the Canadian Women’s Hockey League. One player played for the Montreal Stars.

RESIDENCY: The players have relocated to the Boston area to train together and participate on the tour and in various competitions in the build-up to the 2014 Olympic Winter Games. Some players are billeting with host families in the area. The team is doing all of its on-ice training at The Edge Sports Center in Bedford, Mass., and all off-ice training at MBSC in Woburn, Mass., under the tutelage of Mike Boyle.

General Manager - Reagan Carey

Carey became USA Hockey’s direc-
tor of women’s hockey in August
2010. Her primary focus is the
management of the U.S. Women’s
National Team Program, including
elite development efforts of players
and coaches. Carey also serves
as general manager for all U.S.
women’s teams, including the U.S.
Women’s Olympic Team.

Team USA has had significant suc-
cess under her guidance. The U.S.
Women’s National Team has won
two gold medals (2011, 2013) and
a silver medal (2012) at the IIHF’s
Women’s World Championship,
and finished first on two occasions
(2011-12) and second once (2010)
at the Four Nations Cup.

As part of USA Hockey’s develop-
ment initiatives, Carey has over-
seen all aspects of player develop-
ment camps, tournaments,
and team operations at all levels.

For the two years prior to joining
USA Hockey, Carey was the
director of fan development and
youth marketing for the NHL’s At-
lanta Thrashers and NBA’s Atlanta
Hawks.

Carey is a member of the IIHF
Women’s Committee, serves as an
advisor on the Board of Directors
for the CWHL and is on the Profes-
sional Development Council for the
American Women’s College Hockey
Alliance.

A 2001 graduate of Colby College,
Carey played four years of col-
legiate hockey and volleyball. She
was the recipient of the 2010 Colby
College Carl E. Nelson Sports
Achievement Award.



Head Coach - Katey Stone

Stone, head women’s ice hockey
coach at Harvard University, is leading
the U.S. Women’s National Team and
will be the first female head coach of
the U.S. Olympic Women’s Ice Hock-
ey Team at the 2014 Olympic Winter
Games in Sochi, Russia.

Stone has been involved with the U.S.
Women’s National Team Program since
2006 and has served as head coach of
the U.S. Women’s National Team for
eight competitions, most recently guid-
ing the U.S. to the gold-medal at the
2013 International Ice Hockey Federa-
tion Women’s World Championship in
Ottawa, Ontario. In total, she has been
the head coach for three IIHF Wom-
en’s World Championships (gold-2011,
2013; silver-2012), four Four Nations
Cups (1st-2008, 2011, 2012;
2nd-2010) and one IIHF Twelve Na-
tions Invitational Tournament Series
(2011).

In 2012, Stone guided Team USA to
a silver medal at the IIHF Women’s
World Championship in Burlington, Vt.,
and helped the team capture the Four
Nations Cup title in Vantaa and Kera-
va, Finland.

Under Stone’s leadership, the U.S.
Women’s National Team enjoyed a
highly successful season in 2011, earn-
ing gold medals at the IIHF Women’s
World Championship in Zurich, Swit-
zerland, and the Four Nations Cup in
Nykoping, Sweden, as well as the inau-
gural championship at the IIHF Twelve
Nations Invitational Tournament Series
in Vierumaki, Finland, where the U.S.
went undefeated in six games.

In 2010, Stone led the U.S. to a second-
place finish at the Four Nations Cup in
St. Johns, N.L., Stone also served as
the head coach of the U.S. Women’s
National Team at the 2008 Women’s

Four Nations Cup. There, Team USA
captured the tournament title for the
first time since 2003.

In addition, Stone led the U.S. to the
gold medal at the first-ever IIHF Un-
der-18 Women’s World Championship
in January 2008, and also coached
the U.S. Women’s National Under-18
Team at the 2007 Under-18 Series
against Canada and the U.S. Women’s
Under-22 Select Team at the 2006 Un-
der-22 Series against Canada.

Along with her accomplishments on
the international stage, Stone is the
all-time wins leader in women’s college
hockey. She completed her 19th sea-
son behind the Harvard bench in 2012-
13 and has led the Crimson to a 402-
171-35 (.690) record, which included
the 1999 American Women’s Colle-
giate Hockey Alliance national champi-
onship, three straight appearances in
the NCAA championship game (2003,
2004, 2005), nine NCAA tournament
appearances in the event’s 13-year
history, six ECAC Hockey regular-sea-
son titles, five ECAC Hockey tourna-
ment championships, six Ivy League
titles and 10 Beanpot championships.

In addition to the team’s success un-
der Stone, she has molded some of
the best individual talent in the sport
of women’s ice hockey. Stone has
coached nine Olympians and six Patty
Kazmaier Memorial Award winners,
presented annually to the top player in
NCAA Division I women’s ice hockey.

Before coaching at Harvard, Stone
served as assistant athletic director
and coach at Tabor Academy (Mass.)
and had coaching stints at Northfield
Mount Hermon (Mass.) and Phillips
Exeter Academy (N.H.).

Stone graduated from the University
of New Hampshire in 1989 with a de-
gree in physical education. She was a
captain and four-year letter winner in
both hockey and lacrosse and helped
the Wildcats hockey team win ECAC
championships in 1986 and 1987, and
the lacrosse team capture an NCAA
title in 1985. She earned All-ECAC
honors in hockey and was a two-time
All-America selection in lacrosse.
