



Friends and colleagues; fellow keepers of the game;

* It is the heat of August now., but fall is just around summer's corner .And, in each and every corner of our state we have begun the marvelous. ritual that is football, a game whose lessons learned on the field mirror those of life and binds us inexorably to one another no matter how large or small the school or where we choose to live .Beyond those on our respective fields, football truly has no boundaries. That realization is just another among the many that makes our game so very special. Along with having those in our charge experience much of the 'stuff' of life, playing high school football may have a unique place in today's sports landscape. Participation does not require social status, creating a financial burden or challenge, exclusive year round commitment, and inordinate or unreasonable demands. As coaches and keepers of the game, It is important that each of us continue to teach, promote, and support football as an enhancement of and healthy contribution to the education of the student-athletes in our trust.

As in so much of the educational environment today, as professionals we have our challenges. The issue of safety has been hi-lighted and well documented, not just in media, but within the game's framework from youth to the NFL. In accordance, at

every level, steps have been initiated to make our game safer for all who play. As a result, we practice safer; have better equipment, have developed and follow medical protocols, augmented regimens that have greatly reduced risk and educated ourselves in meaningful ways. These steps and more have helped create a safer playing environment. As recently as last January, the MFCA produced a position paper of our stance in regard to the concussion discussion.

A significant challenge to participation in football and sports in general remains a genuine concern by professionals in every aspect of sport. The prevalence of youth specialization. Despite overwhelming evidence to the contrary, specialization at an early age continues to grow. The MFCA and the MSHSL have a excellent working relationship and have worked on a number of football issues for decades. In two recent publications, The march issue of THE PREP COACH and the spring issue of the MSHSL BULLETIN, Kevin Merkle, Associate Director of the MSHSL and football liaison to the MFCA devotes two articles to how specialization is impacting youth sports. He states the case and cause for concern very, very, well I urge you to read these well documented articles. They illuminate the challenge to high school athletics in 'real' time.

That is it from here. Have a great season. Remember.. it is about the kids.... all about the kids.



It is our job as coaches to educate ourselves as much as possible in regards to prevention and care of head injuries. New practice policies have been put in place to help deter the number of hits kids are taking in practice which should immediately reduce head injuries. Blocking and tackling techniques are continually being refined to keep the head out of the hit. Proper fitting of helmets and shoulder pads is more important than ever to make sure our players are getting the best protection possible. I urge all head coaches to get together with their coaching staffs and just take stock in what they are doing in regards to player safety. Have that discussion to see what you can do as a staff to improve what you are currently doing in your program from the top down.


LETTER FROM COACH CLAEYS UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

MFCA CODE OF ETHICS

PREAMBLE

One of the distinguishing characteristics of a profession in education may be that its members are cognizant of, and perhaps dedicated to, rendering a service to humanity. As educators who choose to coach football, we must understand that the justification for football is that it provides educational and physical values for those who play the game, and the game essentially belongs to the players who choose to play it.

The welfare of the game depends on how coaches live up to the spirit and letter of ethical conduct, and how coaches, as educators, model ethical conduct, and remain mindful of the trust and confidence placed in them by colleagues, players, and the public.

PURPOSE

This code of ethics has been developed to protect, promote, and preserve the best interests of the game and the coaching profession. Its primary purpose is to clarify and distinguish ethical and professional practices from those which are detrimental. Its secondary purpose is to emphasize the value of football as an experience that contributes to the overall education of the student-athlete and to stress proper functions in relation to schools, players, and the public.

ARTICLE ONE - RESPONSIBILITY TO PLAYERS

- 1. Coaches shall be aware of the tremendous influence they have on the education of the student-athlete; therefore, they shall never place the value of winning above the value of instilling the highest ideals of character and integrity.
- Coaches shall follow or create and enforce a set of training rules for players that reflect the positive values of abstaining from drugs, alcohol, and tobacco.
- 3. Coaches shall never place the value of winning over the safety and welfare of players.
- 4. Coaches shall not exert pressure on faculty members to give players special consideration.
- 5. Coaches shall show respect to all players by treating them with integrity and honesty in both verbal and nonverbal behavior, regardless of their role or contribution to the team.
- 6. Coaches are responsible for their players' actions on the field and must not permit them to perform with the intent of causing injury to opposing players.
- 7. Coaches shall not seek unfair advantage by teaching deliberate unsportsmanlike behavior to players; they shall instruct players to play within the written rules and within the spirit of the game at all times.

ARTICLE TWO - PROFESSIONAL BEHAVIOR

- 1. Coaches shall exemplify the highest moral character, behavior, and leadership.
- 2. Coaches shall display modesty in victory and be gracious in defeat.

- 3. Coaches shall promote ethical relationships among fellow coaches.
- 4. Prior to, and following contests, coaches for the competing teams should meet and exchange cordial greetings to set the correct tone for the event.

ARTICLE THREE - SPORTSMANSHIP

- 1. Coaches shall exhibit, model, and teach good sportsmanship.
- 2. Coaches shall exert their influence to enhance sportsmanship by spectators, both directly and by working closely with cheerleaders, pep clubs, booster groups, parents, and administrators.

ARTICLE FOUR - SCOUTING

It is considered ethical to scout opponents only during games and agreed upon scrimmages, and within the designated rules of the conference or section by-laws. The head coach is responsible for the actions of his scouts.

ARTICLE FIVE - RELATIONSHIPS WITH GAME OFFICIALS

Coaches shall respect the integrity and judgment of the game official. Coaches shall not include in conduct which would incite players or spectators against officials. Public criticism of officials is considered unethical.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD VETERANS FIELD DEDICATED

Tears streamed from fans as they joined Father David Forsman, pastor at St. James Catholic Church, in God Bless America and America the Beautiful while four World War II planes passed over Veterans Field in several formations. Fans stood in silence, moments before introductions, as the T-6 Thunder honored pilots and crews who never returned from duty with the Missing Man formation.

Festivities included patriotic music throughout the evening and fireworks organized by Steve Bare. Over 400 people were served at the pregame cookout sponsored by Roth RV and the Up North Fireplace Gallery. Following the team's victory over Pine City, team pictures were taken in front of the new Veterans Field sign.

"Tonight was about honoring our veterans," said head coach Tom Sanford whose players each wrote the name of a veteran they were playing in honor of on their wrists. "What a blessing to see so many people pay tribute this evening to the sacrifices that the service men and women of this great nation have made for each of us."



Success More Than Just Game Night

MITCHELL MAXWELL is in his seventh year as a science teacher and coach at MHS. Maxwell is a graduate of Concordia College in Moorhead, MN where he was a three year starter on the offensive line. Coach Maxwell is also an assistant baseball coach for MHS as well as the head coach for the Marshall Legion baseball team. His wife, Elizabeth, teaches Title I at Park Side Elementary. They have three children: Cora, Thomas, and Evelyn.

TERRY BAHLMANN will be in his 33rd season as a head football coach in 2016. Coach Bahlmann will be entering his 13th year as head coach of the Marshall Tigers. He has a career record of 213-94. His 213 career victories

currently rank him 14th among Minnesota
Active Football Coaches in wins. In his eleven
seasons in Marshall his teams have compiled
an 89-29 record. He has had 13 conference/
district championship teams, winning a state
championship state runner up in Iowa. He has
been named conference/district Coach of the
Year 13 times. He is a graduate of the University
of Northern Iowa. He has a Masters degree from
Southwest Minnesota State. Coach Bahlmann
was the Head Coach for the Outstate in the 2007
Minnesota Football Coaches All Star Game 2007.

His family consists of wife, Jan and 3 children. Allison, is married to Kent Bass and is a teacher at Tri City United, Montgomery, MN. They have



a son Brayden who will be seven in November and daughter Harper who will be 4 in February. Daughter Dani, is a Kindergarten teacher and is the Head Volleyball Coach at Tri City United. Son Brad, will be a Sophomore at SMSU this year and will be playing football for the Mustangs and majoring in education.

During my senior season at Marshall High School in 2000, our football team finished 4-6 and won a playoff game, a huge accomplishment at the time. The coach for that season was my third in four years at Marshall. Prior to that season, the Marshall Tigers finished 1-8 and the year before that 0-8. Unfortunately, seasons like these were normal. In fact, it was common for the team to come out of the locker room after halftime to find the majority of the those in the crowd had left because, in the words of some, the "real show was over" because the marching band had played. After that, there was simply nothing to stick around to watch.

Fast forward 15 years and the culture surrounding Marshall's program and its results are both vastly different from the programs of the past. In 10 years under the guidance of head coach Terry Bahlmann, the Tigers have amassed an 89-29 record. Marshall has won six conference championships (five Southwest and one Big South), one district championship, and one second place section finish. Last season the team won a section championship and notched its first State Tournament appearance since 1991. Losing seasons are few and far between, and the expectation to win has become a fixed mindset.

This transformation has led several of my former classmates and teammates to ask a simple question: "How did Marshall football evolve from the program we experienced to the program it is today?"The question is difficult to answer because

those who ask are probably expecting a simple response. Perhaps our population has changed and we have more talented athletes. Or, maybe we have a new look offense or defense that is hard to stop or is impenetrable. The real answer, however, lies in what happens behind the scenes, away from the lights of Friday night. It is an intentional plan to maximize the potential of our student athletes by meeting high levels of expectation through a culture of hard work.

The implementation of the offseason program immediately follows the conclusion of the season. Coach Bahlmann arranges a players' meeting to recap the season, vote for next year's captains, and, most importantly, for each player to receive a goals sheet. Each player is responsible for filling out team and individual goals as well as specific weight room goals. The players are then expected to meet individually with Coach Bahlmann before the first cycle of weight lifting begins. The importance of this meeting cannot be overstated. At its conclusion, an establishment of clear, honest, and attainable goals has been outlined for each player's growth over the course of the coming months. This creates a reference point for athletes as they obtain their goals or if they veer away from their objectives.

Coach Bahlmann often uses the expression, "Potential means you haven't done anything yet." The strength and conditioning program, an indisputable component to Marshall's continued



success, is how each player works to reach his potential. Players' weight lifting programs are kept in a filing cabinet in the weight room as a means of tracking attendance and progress. There are also four opportunities to demonstrate progress through max out lifting weeks. The first occurs before the first lifting cycle in the fall and the others are in the winter, spring, and prior to fall camp. Records are kept for bench, squat, power clean, and hang clean as well as a total for all four lifts. Players also track their percent body weight to lift ratios. The culmination of these activities is a list of the top five for each of the lifts, which is clearly posted as players enter the weight room. Those who have demonstrated a regular commitment to the weight room are always chosen first for the pre-summer weight room draft held mid-way through the month of May.

Each senior player leads an offseason weight lifting team that competes throughout the summer for top work-out attendance. The process begins in May when seniors build their teams by drafting underclassmen players. The winning team is rewarded with a day off from conditioning during fall camp. As a result of this program, everyone involved understands the benefits and outcomes of committing to hard work in the offseason.

Inevitably, key players graduate and talent leaves the team. However, our program specializes and takes pride in developing young players to fill those roles. A player who has performed below average or average becomes a good or great player through effort in the strength and conditioning program. A player may have worked his way into a new position as a result of their increased weight, strength, or speed. Additionally, players

who have committed to offseason work are always given an opportunity to earn a starting position or are considered first when it comes to selecting players for special teams.

In addition to player development through hard work in the weight room, our program makes every attempt to utilize practice to implement skill development through efficient use of time and meticulous attention to detail. The coaching staff meets before each practice and uses a time oriented spreadsheet to create a specific practice plan. Practice is organized into time slots of 15 or 20 minute increments. A "parts to whole," method is used in which drills are chosen during individual sessions meant to teach a skill that will reinforce muscle memory, be utilized later in practice, or correct mistakes that were caught in a previous practice or on film. Using a drill as a "time filler," is not allowed. Time slots are devoted to teaching time, which is an opportunity for players to demonstrate their understanding of a scheme via a walkthrough or a question/answer session where players are not reprimanded for wrong answers. A player is only reprimanded if a skill has been taught, demonstrated, and then performed incorrectly. Finally, the skills taught at each position and in each time slot are synthesized into coordinated team time.

When the written practice plan is put into physical action, coaches and players are expected to execute at a high level. Tempo and pace are extremely important because wasted time detracts from an opportunity to perform more repetitions or take advantage of coaching points. The quality of coaching is not at the expense of meeting the pace of practice. Skill teaching is executed with precision and accuracy. For example,

if a player is taught an alignment during the installation of a defensive stunt, it is not enough, "to just get to the spot." Coaches pay specific attention to the technique used to get to that spot and the relationship to other players involved. It is important to note that every player is taught each of these skills. If there is need for additional instruction, time is allocated outside of practice to review concepts or answer questions. For these reasons, a player only earns a position if he outperforms and outworks another player and not as a result of poor coaching or being ignored.

Our program is not built on a revolving door of new schemes or short term solutions. Rather, it is built on a foundation of skills that provide a platform for our players to be successful in life. Football becomes a conduit to train young men to become positive contributing members to their communities. When a player leaves Marshall Tiger Football, he understands the relationship between hard work and self-improvement, commitment to achieve goals, and the role that individual excellence plays in team success. If our players want to achieve at a high level, getting the job done right means paying special attention to detail and working hard to do the right thing all the time. Our program's greatest success is rooted in more than wins and losses under the Friday Night Lights. Marshall High School football aims to make its players better men.

Shifting the Paradigm: The New Focus of the North Polars

ERIC LONGTIN - Head Football Coach, North High School

Eric Longtin is in his 10th year as head coach at North High and 23rd year in coaching. North High is a 5A school in North St. Paul that plays in the Metro East red Division. In addition to 9 years as an assistant in the Houston (TX) metro, Coach Longtin has had head coaching stints at Irondale High School and St. Louis High School (MI) as well as collegiate experience at University of St. Thomas. Coach Longtin played for MFCA Hall of Fame Coach L.E.

Drechsel at Crookston Central High School and at Bemidji State University where he graduated with a B.S. in mathematics. Coach Longtin is married to Julie and together they have four children: Michael, Molly, Montgomery, and Madison.

Like many football programs, North Football has had its ups and downs. There has not been a sustained tradition of good football since the late 1960's; in fact, North High has not had three consecutive winning seasons since 1950. A mere 65 years. My tenure here has been no different. Taking over a team that went 5-23 the three years before I arrived in 2007, we matched those 5 wins in our first year and then proceeded to lead the Polars to a three year record of 14-13. Not a great three year record, but respectable for team accustomed to losing. At that time, I thought we were on the right track and moving forward, to the point where I scheduled 6A power Edina for our nonconference game.

In 2010 we went 2-7. Something happened... actually, a lot of things happened. At the time I thought our luck was because of injuries and a few bad breaks. However later, I would realize those were just excuses. The fact was I had lost sight of what was really important and my priorities for our program were

mixed up. The program was going in the wrong direction and had no one to blame but myself. It would take two more seasons before we would make major changes to the character expectations of our players, which would ultimately put us back on a path that would give us a chance to win.

After a 1-8 season in 2012, the North Polar football team had a cumulative team GPA of 2.3. Many of our kids were constantly in the office for behavior issues and some were in trouble with the police. We had athletic kids who could have earned scholarships, but were never considered because they had such low GPAs. In addition to poor grades, players were disrespectful to teachers, had attendance issues, and spent a lot of time in detention. The bottom line: I realized our program was populated with players of poor character.

What bothered me the most was that we had some outstanding kids and a number of good football players. Many of our kids were hard workers and had bought into our

program's objectives. I felt like I had let these kids down, and in all reality, I had. Thus, in November of 2012, a major overhaul of our entire program took place.

After three years, we feel like we are now going in the right direction. 2015 was the most successful season at North High School since 1973, and the eight wins ranks 2nd all time. The section championship this year was only the second time in school history the Polars advanced to the state tournament. The changes we made were a group effort, and they could not have happened without the efforts and support of my coaching staff, particularly Coordinators Tom Cappelen and Dominic Mahon. There is nothing magical about what we did. We just tried to focus on what was really important and work hard at it. This article is about a shift in priorities we adopted and the changes made to align with those priorities.

Academics/Classroom Behavior - The foundation.

Since 2012, the primary focus for the North Polar Football Team has been classroom behavior and academic success. While academics have always been important, now they are the top priority. An old coach once told me, "If they let you down in the classroom, they will let you down on the field." His version was more colorful than that, but the concept was the same. We needed our kids to value education, so we focused on the classroom both from an academic and behavioral perspective. Though very easy on paper, the changes in expectation would come at a price.

First, we required every player to carry a 2.0 GPA (either cumulative or the average of the two most recent trimesters), and would take a conditional kid above 1.5 as long he had no behavior issues and no failing grades. Students were expected to behave as well. We did not allow excessive behavior referrals and removed any kids who had shown disrespect towards teachers and staff. Easy enough, or so we thought.

In May of 2012, after giving our players two full marking periods to meet expectations, we had to tell 19 players they were no longer able to play football because their grades were not good enough. Then we had to remove eight kids because their behavior did not match our expectations. Six kids transferred to other schools and some just quit. In all we went from 134 players to 86 in one year. We lost some starters as well as kids who were all-conference in other sports. We lost some good and even great athletes.

While painful because of the decrease in numbers, we did not make any exceptions. Though it did take a while, our expectations are now known by both kids and parents. Kids

still make choices to not perform in the classroom, but it is less every year. Our team GPA has been above 3.0 for two years and the number of discipline issues is minimal. The young men who have made the choice to be a part of North Football are outstanding. Our numbers have stabilized right around 15-20 athletes per graduating class, which pretty is small for a 5A school of 1850. However, this past season, 28 varsity players was all that was needed to go 8-3 and win a section championship.

The Weight Room - Concentrate on Culture

No magic here. Our success is from the weight room. We like to think we outwork most of our opponents in the off-season and into the season. With an emphasis on squats, cleans, and bench press, our weight room culture has been a bright spot. The interesting fact is that after our roster decreased in size, the raw number of football players in the weight room actually increased. Our players have made major gains in their core lifts and have developed the strength to compete.

To start, I assigned one coach to take over all weight room activities. He was given full reign of our strength program. We find a way to pay him year round and though other coaches are required to be there, he designs and implements all aspects of the weight program. I do show up regularly and think the head coach needs to be there year round, but he has ownership over the program.

From November to August, we lift four times per week. We superset our core lifts with plyometric and functional exercises. We track progress and attendance in 10 week cycles and post the most recent testing numbers on the weight room wall. Once summer strength starts, we add an agility component and a speed component to the program. In order for the weight program to effective, coaches must be in the weight room interacting with the kids and not standing around visiting. Our workout time is not prep time.

During the season, we lift three times per week (M, T, Th) to maintain our strength. This is where our kids have really bought in. One Thursday late in the season I tried to give them the day off from lifting because practice went a little longer than normal. Their response: "We need to lift, we have a game tomorrow!" Had we not opened the weight room, I might have had a small mutiny on my hands. It was at that point I realized that we had achieved a great weight room culture. Our strength and conditioning program has given us the tools to be competitive and keeping that mentality is a priority.

Simple Schemes - Practice Fast.

Both our offensive and defensive schemes are very simple

and allow for minimal thinking. When a kid has to think, everything slows down and mistakes happen. We also wanted schemes that could be installed from our youth programs up. Our thought process was that if 4th and 5th grade kids are able to understand it, then it will be easy enough for our kids.

Offensively, we switched to a base wing-t scheme and have adapted from there. We hang our hat on buck sweep, jet sweep, and belly, and then do the things that fit our current personnel. The wing-t fits our both our personnel strengths and coaching philosophy. It can be taught at all levels of our youth programs which allows our offensive staff to develop a rapport with our youth coaches, and the scheme is adaptable to the teams we play. Simplicity also allows us to practice at a high speed. Because we maximizing reps at a rate of 20 seconds per snap, the pace feels slow for our kids when we get into actual game situations. Since switching to the wing-t, we have finished near the top of our conference for rushing and total offense every year.

Defensively, our choice was a 3-4 base that attacks and bring pressure on almost every play; we play man coverage, quarters coverage, and cover 3 behind our base and bring guys from different places. Since the scheme is simple, we have more time to work on skills. We have a team tackling circuit every day and work takeaway drills almost as much. Individual time does not get cut for scheme work which allows our players to continually getting better at their position.

Though both our offensive and defensive have their weaknesses, we are counting on the simplicity to allow our athletic kids play at full speed as mistake free as possible. Both schemes are easy to teach which allows younger coaches to pick them up quickly and both schemes fit our two-way player mentality. To practice fast, we need maximum reps, and we cannot have anyone standing around. Our simplicity on both offense and defense fit right into the go fast mentality.

Priorities: What is Really Important?

What is not a focus or priority is fundraising, team building, community service projects, 7 on 7 competitions, or summer team camps. While we have participated in some of these activities (fundraising pays for the weight room coordinator and extra coaches), we have eliminated or severely limited pretty much everything else especially outside the season. We have 7 summer practices culminating with a 3 day team camp and those practices are only available if the player is participating in the summer strength program.

By focusing our efforts towards fewer priorities, our coaches and players have more time for their lives. As a staff, we try to work more efficiently, minimizing staff meetings and often working from home. We split the time-consuming tasks such as hudl breakdown/data entry, statistics, practice organization, and player grading between the entire staff. It does take coaches that are able to work independently. Those who struggle to fulfill their responsibilities usually do not make it very long on our staff.

Teaching kids how to commit to something and how to prioritize is a skill we focus on as a staff. We expect our young men to honor their commitments, both in the classroom and on the field. Holding them accountable prepares them to be men, and not doing so would be a tremendous disservice. Sometimes kids realize that football is not a priority and that is OK, on the other hand, sometimes kids learn that the true rewards in life are a combination of perseverance and hard work. Seeing this phenomenon happen provides a true reward in coaching. Having a core group of kids that value academics, character, and a commitment to the weight room has been the catalyst to our change, and the main reason for our success.

In short, there is no secret ingredient. There is no magic potion. Football wise, we really did not do anything any different from what we had been doing. There was a shift in philosophy and shift in focus. One might even say we shifted our focus away from football. By focusing on a change in off-field expectations, on-field results improved.

This past season was a result of a lot of hard work by the coaches on our staff, and by the kids in our program. Their selfless attitude was responsible for the positive changes. We have made mistakes, but like anything in life it has been and will continue to be a learning process. Will we continue to have success on the field? Only time will tell. I do know our kids will have decent character and will continue to excel in the classroom. But most importantly, I will continue to be proud to be part of the North Football Program.

Hermantown Football Celebrating its Diamond Anniversary 75 Years of Tradition

Seven and a half decades and six head coaches have led the Hawks to numerous undefeated seasons, conference championships, section championships and several state appearances. The program began as a club sport in 1941 under George Rukovina. World War II began and the Hawks took on the colors "Blue and Gold" representing the Navy.

Coach Stanley Mickolajak took over in 1942 and the Hermantown Hawks were off and running, winning their first conference championship and undefeated season in 1948.

Under new Head Coach George Petrich in 1949, Hermantown Football continued its tough play, competitive spirit and traditions, winning the conference in '53, '57, '58, '60, '61, '64, '65,'70 and '72. Dale Schinn from 1958 is the only player to date from the 50's to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. The 1960's were filled with undefeated seasons in the Polar Conference, as the Hawks competed with a number of local rivals. In a time where there weren't playoffs for teams, Hermantown Football competed with teams like Duluth East, Esko, Duluth Cathedral and Morgan Park. Three teams from the 60's, 1964, 1965, and 1966 were inducted into the 2011 Inaugural Hermantown Football Hall of Fame, along with their head coach George Petrich. Players from the 1960's in the Hall of Fame include Jim Swanstrom '66, James Micketts '64, Ed Dammer '61, Bruce Melin '60, James Crigler '61, Leonard Anick '62 and Dick Voltzke '63. In the 1973, Head Coach Gary Bowen started his Hall of Fame career. The mid-70's came as tough years for the Hawks until the end of the decade. Out of the 70's came Hall of Famers Richard Bosiaski Jr. '74 and Gary Gilbert '79.


In the early 80's, Hermantown Football exploded into seasons of state playoffs. The 1981 team also is an Inaugural Hall of Fame team, along with their head coach Gary Bowen. The Hawks finished 11-2 and runner-up in the state championship finals losing to St. Peter. This season sparked a run of Hawks teams finishing strong under the direction of Head Coach Gary Bowen. The 80's consisted of five conference championships ('80, '81, '84, '85, and '86) and state tournament appearances in

1980, '81, and '84. Hall of Fame athletes from the 80's decade include Scott McLaughlin '81, Corey Veech '82, Clint Buchite '83 and Joel Heckman '86. Current Head Coach Daryl Illikainen played under his mentor Gary Bowen and years later took over Gary's teaching and coaching duties at Hermantown, as Gary became the Athletic Director.

The 90's decade continued to be strong under Gary Bowen's brother Randy Bowen for six years, winning the conference in '93 and producing Hall of Famers like Brian McDonald '94 and Kevin Graves '92. Randy resigned



in 1996, leaving the program very healthy for newcomer and current head coach Daryl Illikainen. So healthy, that in the late 90's, Hermantown Football had undefeated seasons and conference championships in 1997 and 1998, playing in

the state quarterfinals in '97. It was again in 2002 and 2003 that the Hawks returned to the state quarterfinal stage. The late 2000's were filled with some Hermantown traditional successes, winning the conference in '09, '11, '12, '13 and '15. Undefeated seasons in 2011 and 2015 with a state quarterfinal appearance in the fall of 2015. HHS traditions have again and again continued, even still running the wing-T that Gary Bowen implemented in the 1980's. Coach Illikainen says, "Having mentors and coaches like Gary Bowen, Randy Bowen, Tom White, Frank Russ still around when I took over the football program was inspirational and motivated me to continue the traditions that were established." Not many programs in the State of Minnesota can say they have had only 6 head coaches in their history.

The rivalries Hermantown Football has established and continued throughout the years has made local football a Friday night attraction. Going back in history when the Hawks were in the Polar conference, rival teams like nearby Esko would have the Hawks playing their best. After 1962, Hermantown moved into the Seaway conference bringing on rivalries such as Proctor and Cloquet. Later, Hermantown joined Proctor and Cloquet in the Sea-Range Conference, maintaining those rivalries that are currently in the North-East District Conference. Rivalries bring out the best in players, pride in the program, attaining season goals and great football games in the local area. Rivalry games bring out community spirit, former players and excitement for the youth programs.

One of the strengths of the Hermantown Football program is the experience, professionalism, dedication, camaraderie and continuity of the coaching staff. The program has continued throughout its years to have educators, professionals, and dedicated people who continue to coach for all the right reasons. Assistant coaches in the 1960's and 70's included Dick Veech, Dave Olson, Dick Zell and Tom Ling. Other assistant coaches like Tom White coached alongside Gary Bowen, Randy Bowen and Daryl Illikainen stretching over 33 years. Tom solidified the JV program for all those years as well as helping on Friday nights. Assistant coach Frank Russ coached with Gary Bowen in the 1970's and 80's. Coach Randy Bowen was also an assistant coach during the 70's and 80's for 19 years before taking over head coach for six years. Current Assistant Coach Tad Forsell has coached football for a total of 37 years, with 27 years being at Hermantown, starting with 7th grade

football under Gary Bowen in 1989. Both Tad and Tom have coached alongside three different head coaches. Tad remains to be the Head 9th grade coach with Dale Mundle and does an outstanding job developing young players. Current Assistant Coach Mike Sweeney has coached a total of thirty three years with twenty four of them with Hermantown. Mike started under Randy Bowen in 1992 and is currently coaching under Coach Illikainen. Former players Mike Zagelmeyer and Dale Mundle have joined the staff and bring not only great experience but

have "Blue and Gold" Hermantown Football traditions running through their blood. Assistant Coach Mundle has coached 22 years for the Hawks and continues to teach Freshmen the fundamentals of the game and prepares them to be future varsity players. Assistant coach Mike Zagelmeyer has coached football for 20 years and 19 of them for Hermantown. Starting out in the 7th/8th youth program he has been at the varsity level for 12 years. In 20 years of coaching the Hawks, Coach Illikainen has only needed to replace 2 positions, because of retirement. When Tom White retired, Assistant Coach Tyler Homstad replaced him. Tyler has coached football for 13 years, five years as head coach for Wrenshall and the last eight years as JV coach for the Hawks. Other program volunteers who have given their time and are a big part of Hermantown Football history are Bill Omundson (Weight room) and Joe Griffith (statistician). Hermantown head coaches have positioned great people around them and will continue to hire educators who are dedicated to Hermantown student/athletes.

Another strength of the Hermantown Football program is the solid youth program, committed two and three sport athletes, great school support, dedicated parents with good values and a community backing are the reasons for the success! Many football alumni continue to live within the community and support the programs. Throughout the years, the school district and head coaches have supported and maintained a 7th and 8th grade program with educators who start young Hermantown Football players with basic skills, teaching the game and following the program's philosophy and systems. Coach Illikainen started a youth 4th, 5th and 6th grade flag football program 14 years ago and has since added 3rd grade flag. Adding flag football has started kids learning and practicing their football skills earlier and has kept football participation up throughout the years. Volunteer parent coaches and flag football coordinator Richard Cora have been a continued strength for the program, supporting the youth philosophy of developing skills, teamwork, respect, sportsmanship and fun! Coach Illikainen believes that youth players need to develop their confidence in these areas before adding the element of contact.

Current Head Coach Daryl Illikainen started playing football for Hermantown in 7th grade. His greatest memories of Hermantown football is their 2nd place finish in 1981, his teammates, friends and coaches. After High School, Illikainen had the opportunity to continue playing football with a scholarship to North Dakota State University in 1984. Freshmen entering N.D.S.U. typically redshirt a year with 4 years of eligibility to follow. Illikainen traveled with the team in 1985 as the punt and



extra point center and then starting for the Bison as an offensive linemen for the next three years. Coach Illikainen was privileged and honored be a part of such a tremendous field of athletes who went on to win National Championships in 1985, 1986 and his senior year

in 1988. Playing for

Hermantown Football and then N.D.S.U. was instrumental in his career choice to be become an educator and coach. Success in college can also mean individual success, including the honor of being selected for the NFL combine camp with the top 320 athletes in the country. Illikainen had tryouts with the Pittsburg Steelers and New York Jets before signing a contract with the Houston Oilers in the spring of 1989 as a free agent. After the opportunity to play in three pre-season games, he was released. Then, faced with the decision to continue to train for NFL football or start his career, Coach Illikainen utilized his degree in Health and Physical Education and started a career in teaching and coaching in Fargo, North Dakota. After teaching and coaching in West Fargo for two years, his goals always remained to eventually get back to his Alma Mater. The path led him to take a position at Duluth Marshall School where he taught and coached. In 1995, the opportunity to return to Hermantown opened up. Coach Illikainen credits his former coaches, teammates and his wife Joy of 27 years (also an HHS and NDSU grad) for making him who he is today.

Our Version of the Wing-T

STEVE HILL is a 1972 graduate of Northfield High School where he played football for his dad, Don Hill. Hill then graduated from St. Olaf College and played for Tom Porter. His teaching and coaching career has been at Glenwood High School and then at Minnewaska Area High School when area schools consolidated. Hill will be retiring in June, and he and his wife Claire will move back to Northfield.




Every football coach in America has his own interpretation of football, based on where we played the game, who we played for, who we coached for or which influential coaches we hear at clinics. The wing-t offense has many interpretations and every coach that has run it has his own version of this decades old offense. At Minnewaska, our version of the wing-T has a history.

In 1984, our staff decided that we wanted to change our offense from the split-back veer to the wing-T. Not knowing nearly enough about the wing-T, we needed to find someone to teach us about that offense. The best wing-T coach I knew of was Dick Hanson from Burnsville. After contacting him, Dick and his staff agreed to meet with us. They showed us film, shared their playbook and practice plans and patiently answered all our questions. They got us off to a great start with the wing-T. I will always remember the kindness and professionalism of hall of famer, Dick Hanson.

While that was quite a few years ago, we are still running most of what Coach Hanson showed us that day. We like the buck series, the belly series and we also run an option series to the weak side. Of course, we also like the play-action pass game that is so effective in this offense.

Over the years, we have made adjustments, additions and subtractions. One of these adjustments has been in the formations that we use. We will run the buck series from multiple looks, one of which is our purple formation (diagram). In this formation, we can use buck series play-action to twins and use our two player combo routes. By dropping our HB down toward the LOS, we can use him as the #3 receiver and run our three player combo routes. I like this formation because along with the passing game possibilities, it still gives us the buck series threat coming back to the TE side.

One thing I learned the hard way is that you need to be able to attack both sides of the formation, weak and strong. Early in our wing-T experience, we were pretty good at running the buck series to the TE side, but we were not effective running the



ball away from the TE. Defenses began to slant to and overload our strong side and due to the lack planning on my part, we were not able to counter that. When we finally remedied this problem with a better weak side belly series and an option series, our offense got much better.

Our coaching staff has also learned how to run most of our offense from the shotgun formation. This has allowed us to transition into our three step and five step drop back series. This part of our offense has expanded the field for us and forced the defense to cover more territory. An essential part of our drop back game is our hot system. Our designated hot receiver site reads any blitz and runs a replacement route to that open area. The QB reads the same thing and reacts accordingly.


Nothing in the passing game works without solid protection. Our drop back protection scheme is a big on big scheme in which uncovered linemen and our fullback are responsible for blitz pick-up. This protection has been successful, but it is still my belief that the QB is the most important player in protecting the QB. Our QBs are instructed and drilled to get rid of the ball on time, "make a good decision and make it early". This requires a good pre-snap read by the QB so he can anticipate where we want the ball to go. Receivers have a big role in protection, as well. Their routes must be run accurately and crisply and they

must be open on time. Like everything else in football, pass protection requires a team effort.

We have spent a great deal of time and energy improving our third down efficiency. This, of course, means being very efficient in the passing game. This past season we passed the ball 157 times and completed 63% of our passes. We converted on 53% of our third downs. Third down conversions have been a focus for us in our summer practices and our 7 on 7 competitions, as well. Playing regularly in a league has allowed us to work on various route combinations and strategies. It has been a noticeable advantage to give our QBs and receivers some experience together in a competitive situation.

Our third down and medium/long offense consists of our five step game with two and three player combo routes. We vary formation, use motion and shifting in order to disguise our intentions and force the defense to make adjustments late. Shifting to or out of a trips formation has been effective.

A more recent addition to our offense has been our version of four verticals (diagram). We learned about four verticals from St. Cloud State several years ago and it has become our five step game. The diagram included is our base play and we also run several adjustments off of this. We have varied our formations and used motion and shifting to create some favorable match-ups with this scheme. After running this series for several years, there are four key lessons we have learned



that I will list: receivers must hit landmarks, QB must be skilled at moving defenders with his eyes and deliver the ball on time and #2 receivers must beat the under-coverage.

This version of the wing-T and my interpretation of the game of football will probably be gone forever, since I have just retired from teaching and coaching. I have lost a lot of football games, so a good case could be made that this stuff that you just read about doesn't work very well. I'll stick by it, though. I like our offense, including our version of the wing-T. We have had success with it as it has evolved into a good, flexible high school offense. It is run/pass balanced and it attacks all areas of the field. Plus, our kids have enjoyed running it.



A Small School Perspective: Surviving and Thriving in a Small Town

Ten years ago, after a decade teaching and coaching, I accepted an offer to return to my home town, Silver Bay. This would be my first experience with 9-man football.

Silver Bay, like other towns dependent on theiron ore industry, has seen its population fluctuate since its establishment in the mid-1950s. As is typical in small-school football, we've ranged from one or two win seasons to seasons in the state tournament, most recently in 2011 and 2015. While I am very appreciative of the coaching honors that have come with the state tournament appearances, I smile a little bit knowing that I probably coached the hardest during those one or two win seasons. Of course, the state trips were culminations of those "learning" seasons. As any coach knows, the harder the work, the sweeter the reward.

There are great lessons to be learned in football, far beyond the wins. I am a firm believer that true character shows in tough times. When things are going well, it's easy to smile. When times are tough, players and coaches who possess strength of character seem to shine. This means much to me because I know that both I and my players will face many challenges in life, just as everyone does. Graduating them out of our program with the tools to do this is important.

It would seem natural after a trip to state that participation the following season or two wouldn't be an issue. While this can help and have that impact, in the small school environment, there are many other factors. It's typical to win a bunch of games with a strong senior group and find a much bigger challenge the following season with a smaller group entering. In an extreme example, there was a senior-heavy team recently in our section that played in the section championship game, but, due to numbers, was unable even to field a varsity team the following year. One player can make a huge difference at any

level of football. At a small school, it may not be just a matter of whether we'll thrive, but whether our program will survive.

How do we attract the players? We all know the difficulties these days: less participation in sports in general for various reasons, injury concerns, sport-specific athletes, work, etc. In the small school, it's common for a first year senior or junior to end up starting out of necessity, especially during the lean years. Our trip to state this past season included four of our nine seniors having joined football during their sophomore or junior seasons. Another had moved to town last summer, and another was born and raised in Haiti and hadn't encountered American football until junior high.

Like many coaches, ours believed it was important to have kids playing Pony League tackle football to learn the necessary skills and foster an enjoyment and commitment to the game. I realized one of the differences I face as a football coach in northern Minnesota is that parent was relatively light during younger ages. Compared to sports like hockey, where parents are inspired to commit at an early age, often formal football programs aren't available until fourth or fifth grade. Also, as a traditionally male dominated sport, not all parents may have comparable interest or background in football.

Several years ago I began to have the mother [person who fills that role] – son picnic the evening before our first game. We foster a family feeling, and it allows us to show our appreciation for moms. This also allows the mothers to get to know all the players and coaches better, to develop friendships, and to form a support-group of sorts with the other mothers. The mothers can see what we teach and expect from the players, see that their children are in good hands, and ask me any questions they may have. I bring my wife and three daughters to see how important family and life beyond football is to me. Our

assistants do the same.

We also have a dad's night when we have the fathers [person who fills that role] on the field for introductions. The fathers can wear their players' away jerseys and be there with them as they are introduced before the game. Some of these fathers feel the excitement of when they played, and others who didn't play can become more in tune to what we do and experience the excitement of it all.

Tradition and respect can be powerful. We've begun to honor people who have been important to our program during the annual homecoming coin toss. Along these lines, we also have a wonderful and unique resource as a town that boasts a Minnesota Veteran's Home. During the season, we take a day out of study hall and head to the Veteran's Home with jerseys on to be introduced to and mingle with our nation's military veterans. Several of these veterans also come to our games and watch from an area near our bench. It's important for players to understand honor, respect and commitment to others. It also makes the point that football is important, but it is still a game.

Strength training is important and can help foster commitment. But in a small school, finding time and motivating players can be difficult. We bring players into the weight room during our summer practices, but not because they'll gain a great deal of strength in those few weeks, or even during the entire season. A strength training routine during training camp can serve to introduce and familiarize them with safe and effective lifts. Many students feel intimidated going to the fitness center or fear the unknown. It is important for them to be trained how to lift and to feel confident.

Obviously, gaining strength is a goal; however, our players tend to be involved in many other activities. When I look back at the best teams we've fielded, the common denominator is that they played sports and were involved in many activities. They enjoyed competition and being part of a team. Football may not have been their favorite overall and I accept that. It's our challenge to inspire them to commit to football during football season and give it their best. Fortunately, I have been able to offer a weight class during study hall. This can give busy students time to work out, and it can also help bring around students who do not currently play football. These students may feel more comfortable and confident to give the sport a chance.

Current players can be a very powerful force in recruiting new players within the school. I make sure the football players realize it's Silver Bay's team, not just an elite club. If a football player gives some kids a hard time for not playing, many of those kids shut off to the idea of ever playing, and they also resent the program. They may become harder for me to reach as their social studies teacher. I don't want their memory of high school to be negative toward the football program. Maybe their kid will want to play football one day somewhere. I hate the idea of football players being arrogant towards others. I want them to be leaders and role models. I ask them to give people a reason to root for them, not against them.

Of course, quantity isn't the complete answer. The paradox of this is a team of undependable, undisciplined players has a high probability of becoming the sort of program that fails to attract potential players. A team and its players need to exhibit good character, work hard for each other, and be dependable. If a kid sees the player next to him giving all he has, he'll give it back. If not, he won't.

People often ask about the X's and O's. While it's always necessary to be flexible and fit the play calling around the players, it may be even more important in small school football. For instance, I will hear fans ask why we don't do something they see in the NFL. I explain that to do that at a high level can take years of preparation and learning and that we still need all the players that factor into that equation. In the NFL they all have amazing ability all the way through their last backup player. I need to make sure I have a playbook that can utilize what strengths we DO have. I can't write up a playbook and assume I'll have all the players to run all the plays effectively. That may not be physically possible. We have to depend on players who may be new to football. We want to hit all parts of the field and take advantage of what the defense gives us, but still need to make it possible to get all 9 guys moving in the same direction. Not everyone does this, as obvious as it seems. It can be painful to watch teams that are locked into some particular offense and play calling when they don't have the personnel for it. Better to have 6 guys who know what they're doing well to help the other 3 rather than 9 guys with none completely confident.

Most importantly, I think it's important to keep the sport alive. Whether it's 9-man or 11-man the same great lessons are there to be learned. It's kids playing a kids game. I'm an adult blessed with the opportunity to coach these kids. I think it's important to coach the sport, not just the kids on my sideline. After all, I've been on the other sideline. The lessons those kids are learning, while not directly my responsibility, are as important as the lessons my players are learning.

Over the next ten years our program will see classes dip from nearly 40 students to under 20 before rebounding. This will continue to challenge us, but I feel confident that our program will continue to survive and also thrive and our players will continue to learn the lesson that the sport of football teaches.

Changing Program Culture

TYLER KREBS, Head Football Coach, Burnsville High School

Tyler Krebs graduated from Lakeville High School and the University of St. Thomas. He coached for 14 years at Eastview High School before becoming the head coach at Burnsville in 2011. In 2015, Burnsville won their first conference (subdistrict) and section championships in 20 years. Tyler teaches English, business and technology classes at Burnsville High School. Tyler, his wife (Ali), and their three children live in Savage, MN.

I was very fortunate to play football under Larry Thompson and his staff and play basketball under John Oxton and his staff at Lakeville. I also was very fortunate to coach football with Kelly Sherwin and his staff at Eastview. I have been around successful programs my entire life and have been around head coaches who knew how to create a championship culture. When I became the head coach at Burnsville in 2011, the program hadn't won a championship in 15 years. There was very little stability in the program (I was the 5th head coach in the past 8 years). I heard every excuse about why we couldn't win championships (changing demographics, decreasing enrollment, lazy athletes, no parental support, bad administration, etc.).

Organizational culture is a system of shared values and beliefs, which governs how people behave in organizations. These shared values have a strong influence on the people in the organization and dictate how they perform their jobs. In order to build a championship culture at Burnsville, we needed to change behavior and improve performance in 10 key areas:

- 1. Coaching Staff Championship programs are made up of coaching staffs with great teachers and role models. Championship programs also have stability with their coaching staffs and schemes. The most important job of a head coach is surrounding the program with great people. When building a staff, the most important qualities in coaches are their work ethic and their ability to build relationships. We can teach people football knowledge, but it's hard to change work habits or personalities. We are always trying to get more quality teacher-coaches in our building (an assistant coaching position is always posted). We also evaluate every coach at the end of every year and make any changes necessary. A head coach needs to make tough personnel decisions at times to make the program better.
- 2. Player Development/Strength Program Championship programs are the teams with the best and strongest athletes.

Our coaches and players believe that any championship we will win at Burnsville will be earned in the weight room. We were fortunate to add Scott Sahli and Dr. Larry Meadors as our strength coaches. We moved to Olympic lifts and our kids work extremely hard in the weight room. We have increased the number of kids in our room, increased the intensity of workouts, and have seen increased performance and results. We also work very hard to recruit the halls for potential football players. We've had several examples of great athletes in other sports who played football for the first time their junior or senior year at an all-conference level.

3. Youth Program - Championship programs have a great feeder program into their varsity team. We made several changes to our youth program to align us to the successful programs around us (adding flag football, separating into grade level leagues, etc.). We use common playbooks, terminology and drills at all levels. We really try to make the youth coaches feel like they are a part of our varsity program. We also try to get our high school kids around our younger players as much as possible.

4. Program Philosophy - Championship programs are all built on a solid foundation of beliefs and expectations. When we started our program five years ago, we started using the theme "Building Champions". We now have that logo on a neon sign in the weight room, on every platform, on every t-shirt, and we say it in every breakdown chant. Because our players had never had a winning season, we needed to brainwash them. We also needed our student-athletes to become more disciplined in everything they do. We created a new lettering policy, grade checks, chemical free forms, attendance checks, etc. We are big believers that "if you want to win championships in football, you need to be a champion in the classroom, in the hallways, and in the community".

5. Booster Club - Championship programs have all of their invested stakeholders on board. We made several changes to

our booster club to align with the successful programs around us (creating leadership positions, adding bylaws, becoming a 501c3 organization, etc.). We have increased our parental involvement in all areas of our program. We have also increased our corporate sponsorships and fundraising. This has allowed us to add more coaches to our program and be competitive with the championship programs around us.

6. Player Leadership - Championship programs have strong player leadership to help the team navigate through the adversity of a season. We do a leadership program in May with athletes to prepare them for the summer and upcoming season. We also have meetings with our captains to help train them on leadership. We have three permanent captains that are selected by the team at the banquet ending the previous season. The coaches also select one game captain every week to join them. This season we played 11 games, so we were able to have 14 captains during the season. We really like that idea of shared leadership within our program.

7. Practice Structure - Championship programs maximize their practice time and are fundamentally sound. We spend 30 minutes in the weight room at the beginning of every practice. We believe that our championships will be won in the weight room. We also believe lifting is a great dynamic warm-up to practice and will help us reduce injuries. Our practices are scripted and we use our scoreboard clock to change sessions. We really try to create tempo and use competition in our practice as much as possible. Coach Sahli creates our daily conditioning program so it is matched to what we do in the weight room. We talk about outworking our opponents every day at practice and really being efficient with the time we have.

8. Game Planning - Championship programs execute their game plans and make the adjustments necessary to win games. We are a program that really believes in film preparation for our coaches and players. We will watch 30 minutes of film with our players at every practice (either our practice film or opponent game film). We also watch our game film on Saturdays with our players. We film all of our varsity practices and games from multiple angles. We also make sure that we are doing weekly film breakdowns at our lower levels as well.

9. Team Building and Community Service - Championship programs are made up of teams with great chemistry and players with high character. We do an overnight team building trip every year to Camp Ripley through the National Guard. We also try to do one large community service event every year (Feed My Starving Children, Habitat for Humanity, Hunger Walk, Adopt a Highway, Relay for Life, etc.). We do a weekly team meal at a local restaurant on Thursdays before our game. We also

feed our players after our games on Fridays. We have traditional team building competitions during the season like our ironman and triathlon competitions. We are always looking for new ways to have our players spend time with one another inside and outside of the season.

10. Hard Work & Perseverance - Championship programs stay the course and keep working until they succeed. We started at Burnsville with a five year plan to win a championship. In our first four seasons, we won 2 games, 3 games, 2 games and 4 games. We didn't win a playoff game until the end of our fourth season. There were several times during those first four years when I asked myself if we were doing the right things and making any progress. Championship programs keep reflecting, learning from others around them, and making small improvements every year.

It took Mike Grant 14 seasons of coaching to win his first state championship, Nick Saban 9 seasons to win his first national championship and Bill Belicheck 7 years to win his first Super Bowl. It took those programs some time to create that culture and now those teams compete for championships every year.

We were fortunate to have an excellent senior class last year that worked extremely hard over the past five years. They really bought into our strength program and came together as a team. They will be a very difficult group to replace, but championship programs find ways to replace great senior groups every season. The goal is to keep improving in all ten of those areas and try to compete for championships every year.




Rand Middleton, West Central Tribune, Willmar

Steve Johnson is a 1974 graduate of Richards High School in Oak Lawn, IL. He played football and lettered three times in his high school career. He went on to college at Bethel College, later to become Bethel University. He graduated in 1979 with a physical education degree. He was four-time letter winner at Bethel in football. He began teaching at St. Cloud State University while he was taking masters course work. Steve taught physical education in addition to being an assistant football coach. He was responsible for the defensive ends. He later went on to coach at St. Cloud Cathedral as the head football coach with a 26 – 16 record. He also had stints at the University of Minnesota as a graduate assistant with the running backs and at Montana State University with the wide receivers.

Steve returned to Bethel in 1989 to start a turnaround for Bethel Football. Under his tenure, they have now amassed 22 consecutive winning seasons. 
Flint Motschenbacher, Detroit Lakes

The Power of Influence Award: Criteria and History

The Minnesota Power of Influence award is presented by the MFCA to recognize one of the many extraordinary football coaches in Minnesota. The Minnesota award winner is our association's nominee for the national Power of Influence Award, which is presented jointly by the American Football Coaches Association and the American Football Coaches Foundation®.

The Power of Influence Award was created as a way for the AFCA and AFCF to honor a deserving high school football coach for his effect on his players, school and community. The individuals nominated must be active head football coaches and must embody the life-changing qualities of respect and inspiration. They must have touched lives and caused student-athletes and others to want to emulate their honesty, patience and modesty. This award is not based on wins and losses, however, it is noted that coaches of powerful influence have longevity and success.

Previous Minnesota Power of Influence winners and national nominees have included: Dwight Lundeen of Becker 2009, Dave Nelson of Minnetonka 2008. Dave Hylla of Proctor 2007, Mike Mahlen of Verndale 2006, and Ron Stolski of Brainerd 2005. Stolski went on to be named the national Power of Influence Award winner by the AFCA and AFCF.

MINNESOTA FOOTBALL COACHES ASSOCIATION 2016 DON SWANSON AWARD

The Don Swanson award represents exemplary service to the MFCA. It is presented annually to a member of our association who personifies what the late Don Swanson exemplified: unconditional service to and for football in Minnesota. "Swannie" was a respected teacher, coach, administrator, and friend to all who knew him. His passing in 2009 left us all with a void. He was a proud graduate of South

High school and Gustavus Adolphus College and a life-long educator in the city of Minneapolis. His work as part of the MFCA clinic is legendary and he will never be replaced. In honoring "Swannie," we remember his sense of humor, his quick wit, his engaging charm, and, most importantly, his tireless efforts on behalf of students and coaches. He was one of our finest — a true 'Keeper of the Game'.

Dave Nelson, Minnetonka

Dave Nelson just completed his 14th year as head football coach at Minnetonka and 38th season overall.

Dave is a graduate of the University of Minnesota Duluth where he captained the Bulldogs in football and baseball his senior year. He was inducted into the UMD Athletic Hall of Fame in 2000.

Prior to joining the Skippers, Nelson led the Blaine Bengals to 10 conference championships and eight section championships during his 18 years as head football coach. The Bengals won the 1988 State Championship in addition to finishing as state runner-up in 1996, 1997, and 2001.

Coach Nelson helped lead the Skippers to the Minnesota 5A State Championship in 2004 and the 6A State Playoffs in 2012. His overall coaching record is 242-105.

In 2009, the Minnesota Football Coaches Association awarded Nelson with the Jerry Kill Power of Influence award. Coach Nelson was awarded the Semper Fidelis Leadership Award from the United States Marine Corp in 2012. In 2013, he was named



the Tom Mahoney "Man of the Year" by the Minnesota Football Coaches Association. Nelson was inducted into the Minnesota Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2014.

Dave and his wife Maureen, have three children: Sarah, Ashley, and Jesse and seven grandchildren.





An <u>active</u> assistant football coach at the high school level.


Although not strictly limited to varsity level coaches, the Executive Committee sets a requirement of being an assistant who is a "front liner" – in the limelight,



District 9 South - East

The 2015 football season ushered in a new era - the first year of district and sub-district football in Minnesota. However, the power structure remained the same from what had previously been the Southeast Conference with the addition of Alden-Conger (from the Southern Confederacy) and formerly independent West Lutheran (Plymouth) to form the East Sub-district of District 9 South. On the larger stage, the state nine-man crown and scepter did not change hands either. While claiming a third straight nine-man state championship. Grand Meadow won a 36th straight game, the longest active winning steak in Minnesota high school football.

The Superlarks and Spring Grove were ranked as the top two teams in the state until Grand Meadow won their showdown 21-20 in the final game of the regular season. Those two powerhouses next stormed through the first two rounds of the play-offs to set up the highly anticipated rematch in the Section One championship game. But that matchup was all Superlarks, 35-7.

Grand Meadow (14-0, 8-0 East) would win three state tournament games against Cleveland/Immanuel Lutheran (52-14), state-ranked No. 2 Waubun (35-20) and state-ranked No. 3 Underwood (34-.20).

Gary Sloan, 23-year veteran mentor at Grand Meadow, was named the 2015 Coach of the Year by the Minnesota Football Coaches Association. He has coached the Superlarks to all six state tournament appearances, including the last four state championship games. His career record at GM is 178-72.

Spring Grove (9-2, 7-1 East) was ranked No. 4 in the final state poll after the highest scoring season in school history (49.5 points per game). The Lions also fashioned the best turnover margin (+16) in program history. After playing in the 2011 state tournament, SG is 37-7 over the last four seasons with all seven losses coming against Grand Meadow.

Each regular season game in 2015 was a sub-district contest, but it was not a complete round robin with nine league rivals and an eight-game schedule. No East Sub-district team came close to throwing a scare into either of their two league rivals perched atop the state polls.

There was a three-team battle for third place in the sub-district. Randolph and Mabel-Canton each finished with a 6-2 sub-district record; however, M-C did not play Grand Meadow. Randolph (7-3, 6-2 East) defeated the Cougars 42-22 in week four. The only close game for the Rockets was a 10-8 season-opening win at fifth-place Houston. Randolph was the only East Division squad not

in the Section One Tournament. With the No. 2 seed in Section Two, the Rockets ripped No. 7 Ogilvie 56-12 before falling to No. 3 Renville County West 28-14.

Mabel-Canton (7-3, 6-2 East) also had only one close game, again a win versus Houston, 22-18 - in week five. The Cougars scored 73 points in the section quarterfinal before giving up 48 in a semi-final loss.

Houston (6-4, 5-3 East) finished in fifth place after coming up just short against both Randolph and Mabel-Canton. Edging Lyle/Pacelli 20-18, the Hurricanes were involved in three of the only five close sub-district games.

Houston did not face Spring Grove for the first time in decades. The 'Canes defeated sixth-place Lanesboro twice by back-to-back 20-point margins. Houston won the victory bell trophy 40-20 in the regular season finale before opening the playoffs with a 34-14 advantage versus the Burros. Houston, the 2008 state champion, is the only other sub-district member to have won a state title.

Lanesboro (4-5, 4-4 East), which did not play Randolph, closed with an even four wins and four losses in league play - but all by lopsided margins. The Black and Orange averaged 36 points per game while giving up 34. But it was either feast or famine for the Burros. There were no close games - none decided by fewer than 20-point margins.

With one too many teams for a complete round robin schedule, the top four teams did not all play each other, and to a greater degree, neither did the four squads at the lower end of the standings. Lyle/Pacelli (2-7, 2-6 East), in seventh place, soundly defeated two of the three teams that finished lower in the standings but did not play the last-place team.

Tied for eighth and ninth places, Glenville-Emmons (1-8, 1-7 East) and Alden-Conger (1-8, 1-7 East) each defeated last-place West Lutheran, but unfortunately, the Wolverines and Knights did not have the opportunity to play each other. West Lutheran (0-8, 0-8 East) went without a win, coming closest with a 24-20 loss to Glenville-Emmons.

There were mostly blowouts with only five of the 40 sub-district duels decided by single-digit margins. And none of the dozen playoff contests were that close either. Randolph's season-opening 10-8 win over Houston was the lowest scoring game, and the Rockets closed the regular season in the highest scoring game as Randolph and G-E combined to put 127 points on the scoreboard. Lanesboro and Lyle/Pacelli combined to score 120 points; L/P and M-C together tallied 103.

The advent of the 2015 season and District football spelled the end of Central lakes Conference football... the end of the beginning. Historically, the conference, formed in 1977, left behind a long and lasting legacy of outstanding teams, player, coaches and games. Thankfully, due to the District's football committee's desire to honor geography, enrollments and like programs as guidelines, essentially long standing rivalries remained largely intact.

In this writers view, the District teams were as good as ever. Each evening, teams had to bring their 'A' game to compete. The Brainerd Warriors' season was an indicator of that. Following an opening season loss to Elk River, they won tough games with Apollo, Sauk Rapids and Willmar, followed by losses to Alexandria, Moorhead, and Bemidji. Brainerd and Sartell split with the Warriors winning their homecoming game and then losing to the Sabres in the opening round section play. Brainerd

Coach Mike Rowe and his staff helped lead the Spartans to back to back state appearances for the first time in school history (3rd in 5 years). The Spartans who finished their first year in the competitive North Central Red Division finished 5-3 in the regular season. Rocori entered the Section 8 4A playoffs as a 3 seed for the second year in a row. The Spartan were able to beat 3 very good football teams (Little Falls, Detroit Lakes, and Wilmar) to earn the right to go to the State 4A playoffs. Rocori beat a very good Hermantown team to get their 9th win of the season. The Spartans lost in the State Semi-Final to South St. Paul 19-15. Off the field the Spartans got it done in the classroom earning their 6th Team Academic Gold Standard. Maison Grefe starting cornerback for the Spartans also was named to the all-academic team. This is the 5th year in a row the Spartans have had someone make that team.

Rocori graduated 25 seniors, but still have a lot of experience returning for the 2016 season. They will look to continue their dominant play on the defensive side of the ball with 8 returning starters. On offense they will return All-Conference quarterback Connor Schoborg, running back Nick Warne, and wide receiver Derek Thompson.

The Storm, led by 19 outstanding seniors, had a turnaround year winning 4 games this season. After not winning a game the past two years the Storm where led by senior QB Matt Johnson and senior LB Richard Carriveau who helped recreate excitement for STORM Football. The STORM looks forward to next year and the opportunity to continue to rebuild and will rely heavily on underclassmen to continue to restore STORM Pride!

Sartell got off to a slow start to the 2015 season, losing their first four games to Rogers, St. Cloud Tech, Moorhead, and Bemidji. The Sabres were close in three of those games, losing by a combined 11 points. Sartell got their first win of the season for Homecoming vs Rocori, jumping out to a 28-0 first half lead and made a goal-line stand, tackling the running back at the 1 yard line to preserve a 28-21 victory. The Sabres then traveled across the Mississippi to rival Sauk Rapids, earning a 49-0 win.

The defense was outstanding in earing the shut out, and junior QB Chris Belling set a school record with 5 TD passes. The Sabres traveled to Brainerd for a Saturday homecoming game, losing a tough game 19-21. Sartell finished the regular season with a convincing 49-14 victory over St. Cloud Apollo. Sartell earned the #5 seed and another trip to Brainerd to start the playoffs. The Sabres put together their best

team effort of the season, beating Brainerd at Brainerd for the first time in school history, 41-16. The Sabres then traveled to #1 seed and undefeated Moorhead Spuds. Sartell held the lead for most of the first half, but Moorhead rallied and took the lead right before half. Although the Sabres would mount a comeback, Moorhead ended Sartell's season 27-40. Sartell finished 3-4 in the North Central Red Division, 4-6 overall. The Sabres were led by All-District performers Jake Lieberg (SR, WR,

793 yard, 10 TDs), Logan Anding (SR, TE/FS, 180 yards, 4 TDs), Ryan Zayas (SR, OL/DL), Mitch Zayas (JR, DL), Chris Belling (JR, QB, 1818 yards, 20 TDs) and John Schmidt (SO, RB/LB, 858 yards, 13 TDs). Sartell looks forward to a great 2016 campaign, with 8 starters returning on both sides of the ball.

St. Cloud Tech had exciting close finishes throughout the season including two overtime victories over rivals Sartell and Rocori. Tech finished its season in an exciting 50-42 loss at Monticello in the district quarter finals. The Tigers finished the season 3-6 and return an experienced veteran squad next fall. Tech's passing attack has key players back and the defense will

be much improved heading into the 2016 campaign.

The Willmar Cardinals experienced an exciting playoff run before losing in the Section finals to the Rocori Spartans. The Cardinals started the season with an impressive win against a 6A Buffalo team winning on the last play of the game 21-20. Following the opening night win the Cardinals struggled throughout the middle of the season losing tough games against Alexandria, Moorhead and Brainerd. The resilient Cardinals hung tough and won their last two out of three games beating St. Cloud Apollo and Tech. Those two wins gave the Cardinals momentum heading into the section playoffs. In the opening round the Cardinals beat Thief River Falls and in one of the most exciting games of the year the Cardinals overcame a 14 point deficit with just over five minutes remaining to sting the top seeded Fergus Falls Otters in overtime 27-21. The Cardinals were led by seniors Colten Carlson, Zach Radermacher, Max Doering and Nathan Laurence. The 2016 squad looks promising for the Cards with top offensive/defensive lineman returning. These players include; Brady Reigstad, Louis Russell and Alex Miner.

The Saint Cloud Apollo Eagles struggled in 2015 after posting back to back 6 win seasons in 2013 and 2014. Apollo started the season with a win against Cambridge-Isanti, but that one win was all this young Eagles team would see in 2015. Apollo battled through the rest of the 2015 season with many underclassmen seeing playing time and gaining valuable experience. In 2016 Apollo will be led by three senior All District players: QB Joey Atkinson, OL/DL Luke Dunsmoor and WR/DB/KR Peter Nelson, along with 12 other returning starters. ■

Academic All-State Football Team Concept

Purpose of Awards – To promote and recognize academic achievement by Minnesota high school football teams in each classification.

Proposal – Team academic recognitions in each class will be awarded based on the following standards and procedures.

Criteria

GOLD AWARDS: A team must have a GPA of 3.26 or above for the past school year for their whole home official roster. (NO FRESHMAN) **SILVER AWARDS**: A team must have a GPA of 3.0 - 3.25 for the past school year for their whole home official roster. (NO FRESHMAN)

Guidelines and Procedures

- * The teams and awards from each class will be chosen by the Academic All-State Team Committee.
- * A team must use all members on their official home roster in determining the team GPA. (may include Grades 10-12, no freshmen for small schools.)
- * Each player's name and GPA must be recorded and sent to the class representative.
- * A 4.00 system will be used and 4.00 will be the highest grade possible. No weighted grades.

- * Grades will be rounded to two decimal points.
- * Grades will be from the past full school year. No summer school or current fall grades should be included.
- * Individual GPA's will be added together and divided by the number of team members to determine the team GPA. The team GPA must be included on the entry form.
- * A school official (principal, councilor, etc.) must sign the form.
- * To be eligible for the team academic awards, the head coach must be a current member of the MHSFCA.
- * Forms must be submitted to the class representatives by November 1st and award winners must be submitted to the committee by November 8th.

INDIVIDUAL

Academic All-State Football - Player Guidelines and Procedures

A review of the Minnesota State Football Coaches Association's basic requirement for the team are:

- 1) Must be a senior varsity letterman for the current season who is a starter on either offense, defense or kicker.
- 2) The player must have outstanding football and leadership ability plus academic excellence.
- 3) Player must carry a 3.0 (4.0 scale) grade-point average in an academic core curriculum in his sophomore, junior and first quarter of the senior year.
- 4) Player shall not have any Minnesota State League eligibility penalties or infractions during his high school career.
- 5) Each class will select a team consisting of the number stated below:

9-Man=13	3A=16	6A=19
1A=14	4A=17	
2A=15	5A=18	

- 6) The teams will not be selected by position, but the committee will select the top football players of each class who meet the criteria stated above.
- 7) The Coach submitting the player application must be a member of the Minnesota State Football Coaches Association.

Guidelines & Procedures:

1) All applications should be typed or printed with correct names and data.

- 2) The selection committee must have a good summary of not only the player's academic record, but the player's football accomplishments.
- 3) If the first quarter grades are not out for the applicant's senior year, his first quarter senior subjects must be listed.
- 4) All applications must be sent to your class academic team representative. If you have any problems, contact your class representative first. Please check the time deadlines on the application form.

Remember: This is your state's FOOTBALL COACHES ASSOCIATION'S endeavor.

Grand Meadow, under head coach Gary Sloan, continued its winning ways with its third consecutive 9 Man state title to go along with a 36 game winning streak. The Superlarks defeated Underwood Rockets, coached by Chuck Ross, 34-20.

The game was competitive throughout as Underwood held a 20-14 lead in the third quarter. But Grand Meadow used a strong running game to score the last three touchdowns of the game to build on their winning streak that extends back to the 2013 season.

Class 1A

Two names stood out in the Class A title game. For Minneapolis North, the name Johnson was mentioned often as quarterback Tyler Johnson, who gained 294 of the Polars 325 yard total. For the Vikings of Minneota, it was the Hennen name that drew a lot of attention as the brother combination of Garrett and Isaac played a big role in their team's success along with cousin Kyle.

It was another competitive game that wasn't decided until the fourth quarter when Minneota, coached by Chad Johnson, pulled away with a big offensive performance and several pivotal plays on defense. North, coached by, Charles Adams, was the first Minneapolis school to make a title game since 1977.

Class 2A

Caledonia, coached by Brent Schroeder, proved to be too much for Pipestone, winning convincingly, 40-0. It was Caledonia's sixth state title in the last ten seasons.

The Arrows of Pipestone were coached by Clay Anderson, in his first year at Pipestone. Pipestone stayed with with the Warriors for the first few series of the game, but Caledonia's strength, depth and experience proved to be too much as they built a lead of 33-0 by the half.

Class 3A

The Pierz Pioneers, led by head coach Leo Pohlkamp, powered their way to a state title with a ground game that produced over 300 yards rushing in a 36-8 victory over Jackson County Central, coached by Tom Schuller.

Jackson County grabbed an early 8-7 lead and the first half was closely played before the Pioneers running game took

control of the championship game and Pierz completed an undefeated season.

The Pioneers last won a state title in 2004 when they were Class AA

Class 4A

The Becker Bulldogs, led by long time coach Dwight Lundeen, used a balanced offensive attack to build a 28-0 lead of Chad Sexauer's South St. Paul Packer team and then won by a final score of 35-14.

The Bulldogs made some big offensive plays early to take the lead and they kept the pressure on the Packers throughout the game by also containing South St. Paul's option offense. Becker's offense produced nearly 500 yards of offense in the game.

The win extended Becker's winning streak to 25 games over the past two seasons.

Class 5A

St. Michael-Albertville, led by head coach Jared Essler, won its first state football title with an exciting 28-21 victory over St. Thomas Academy, coached by Dave Ziebarth.



 Jake Lacina (Cretin-Derham Hall; father Corbin; 1989 Cretin-Derham Hall), Ben Mezzenga (Totino-Grace; father Tony 1983 Totino-Grace), Ryan Schlichte (Mankato West; father Dave 1979 Worthington), Michael Veldman (Becker; father Gregg 1978 South St. Paul),.
- 13. Three other All-Star players are also second generation All-Stars (their fathers coached in the All-Star Game):

- James Hendricks (Bemidji, father Troy), Brad Bahlmann (Marshall, father Terry), Ben Buthe (New Prague, father Tony).
- 14. This is only the third game in the current series (1974-2015), where none of the quarterbacks are from the largest schools MSHSL class (6A in the 2014 season). This also occurred in 1988 (no QBs from AA) and 2010 (no QBs from 5A).
- 15. In the 2015 All-Star Game, there are 11 players from Dakota County schools, which is the most of any county. This is noteworthy because this is only second time in game history where a county other than Hennepin had the most All-Star players. This also occurred in 2009 (Dakota County schools had 13 players, Hennepin County schools had 9).
- 16. The 2015 game has both the AP Player of the Year (Ryan Schlichte) and the MFCA Mr. Football Award winner (Robbie Grimsley, also the Star Tribune Metro Player of the Year). Both will play for the South All-Stars.
 The last time the AP Player of the Year and the MFCA Mr. Football Award winner (if different individuals) played on the same All-Star team was in 2009 (Metro team Eric Peterson, Blaine and Varma Sonie, Apple Valley).
 The last time the AP Player of the Year and the Star Tribune Metro Player of the Year (if different individuals) played on the same All-Star team was in 1998 (Metro team Ryan Iverson, Eden Prairie and Marvin Spencer, Blaine).
- 17. This is the first time since 1975 that there is only one All-Star quarterback from a Metro area school. This year, it is Billy Hart (DeLaSalle, South team). In 1975, it was Steve Winum (Bloomington Jefferson, North). Ironically, Winum suffered a broken thumb injury during the 1975 All-Star training camp and was limited to defensive back duty in the All-Star Game.
- 18. Coaches note: first All-Star Game since 1978 where both head coaches are from Metro area schools. In 1978, it was Gerry Brown (St. Thomas Academy, South) and George Wemeier (Minneapolis Washburn, North). In 2015, it is Derrin Lamker (Osseo, North) and Brian Vossen (Lakeville North, South).
- 19. This is only the fourth time overall that an All-Star team has a head coach from the Twin Cities metro area and both quarterbacks are from schools in outstate Minnesota (North head coach Derrin Lamker from Osseo; quarterbacks James Hendricks from Bemidji and Michael Veldman from Becker). This also occurred in 1975 (South), 1978 (South) and most recently in 2012 (North).
