prove they were as good as any of the big boys from the NCAA schools. "NAIA athletes might not be as big or fast as Division I athletes," said former Green Bay safety Mark Murphy, who attended West Liberty State (WV), "but we still had quality athletes, just not as many. In our division, there were mostly good players and a handful of great players."

Murphy retired after the 1992 season, but the torch has been passed to another crop of NAIA rookies, such as wide receiver Tyree Davis of Central Arkansas, the seventh-round pick of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

"Small school. Big school. It doesn't really matter," Davis said. "The best receiver ever to play football came from a small school, Jerry Rice (Mississippi Valley State). You have to rate an individual on his own merits."

If a David-versus-Goliath mentality was shared by most of the NAIA players, there also was a common story coming out of high school.

"No big schools looked at me and Arkansas State wanted me to walk on," Davis said. "I accepted that as a challenge."

Interestingly, Beebe and Lett were wanted by NCAA schools, but other factors led to their detours to NAIA land. Beebe lasted two weeks at his first college, Western Illinois, before a case of homesickness saw him transferring to Aurora (IL) University for a year and then working with his brother-in-law hanging aluminum siding for three years. He finally landed at Chadron State where former Western Illinois coach Brad Smith had been named the head coach.

Lett's ACT score put him in junior college and transfer credit problems pushed him from New Mexico State to Emporia State.

Then, there's the case of Los Angeles Rams guard Tom Newberry, who ended up at Wisconsin-La Crosse because it was close to his home in

Onalaska, WI, and he wanted to compete in football and track.

"I never really talked to any other schools. I had made my mind up ahead of time," Newberry said. "It's funny, I never really planned to play pro football."

By his junior year, things had started to change for Newberry. Several NFL scouts started looking at the 6-2, 285-pound Newberry on their campus visits. He later ran a 4.67-second 40-yard dash at the NFL Scouting Combine in New Orleans and ended up being selected by the Rams in the second round of the 1986 draft, the 50th overall pick.

"Scouts come to all the schools today, just to see if there's somebody there who can play in the NFL," Newberry said. "If a coach thinks he really has a player, he'll make the necessary phone calls."

Murphy noted that the Pittsburgh Steelers built four Super Bowl championship teams around players from smaller schools.

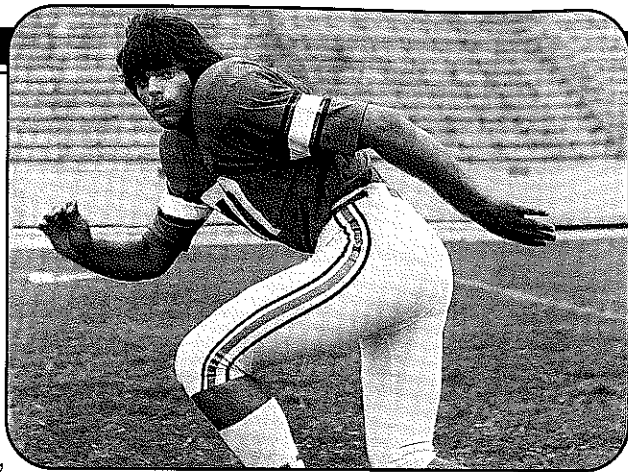
"The Steelers had a way of finding players from small colleges," he said. "I guess if you're a good player, no matter what college you're attending, they'll find you."

Even with the sophisticated scouting networks around these days, NFL scouts still comb the bushes looking for the player who was overlooked by everyone else.

"We usually hear about these guys tearing up their league through some other scout who's been there," said Tim Ruskell, the Bucs' director of college scouting.

"With the small schools, you go more on physical stature and their workouts. It's a lot of guesswork."

Even though he drew attention from several NFL teams, Murphy got passed over in a draft that used to be 12 rounds. Once the Packers made



him one of their free-agent signings in 1980, Murphy used a nothing-to-lose attitude to his advantage during two-a-days.

"In my eyes, there was no pressure," he said. "I figured I'd have some fun, make some things happen. Coming from a small school, I knew I couldn't wait around to get noticed."

Almost all of the NAIA players enjoyed the less-pressurized world at their respective schools as well as the chance to play right away.

"I liked the small-school atmosphere because it was comfortable," said Murphy. "I started as a freshman and played all four years."

Newberry appreciated that he had a life away from the football field.

"I don't think I missed out on anything by not going to a bigger school," he said. "A lot of the guys I meet who came out of Division I say there was so much football, that they were tired of it. It wasn't until I came to the pros that it really felt like a job to me."

If they had to do, most NAIA products would take the same path again.

"Winning was the most important thing for me and having fun," Davis said.

"I enjoyed my four years at West Liberty and we even won the championship my senior year," Murphy said. "We had fun. That was the bottom line." ●

The Oilers' defense shuts down Linfield College's big guns to win '92 NAIA Division II title

After spotting Linfield an early touchdown, the Oilers proceeded to bottle-up the Wildcat offense for the remainder of the afternoon in rout to 26-13 victory and the NAIA Division II football championship.

By the final gun, these beasts from the east didn't leave any doubt about which was the best team on that cold December day. The Oilers (12-1) spoiled Linfield's perfect season the good ol' fashion way - ball control and hard-nosed defense.

Linfield (12-1) was never able to unleash their vaunted running game featuring 1,000 yard rusher Gary McGarvie. After an opening touchdown drive, in which McGarvie pickup 19 of the Wildcats 64 yards in one play, he was held to only 33 more

yards the rest of the afternoon.

The Oiler defense took away every option with their physical swarming defense. Linfield's offense came into the game averaging over 475 yards per game but was held to just 268 on the day that counted most.

Though Findlay's defense played an outstanding game it was an opportunistic offense that quietly put the points on the board. Findlay's wishbone attack, led by the game's outstanding offensive player DeMya Wimberly, amassed 313 yards on the ground. But the big play came through the air on 45 yard strike from Wimberly to Scott McLoughlin which set the table for a 14-7 Findlay lead at the half. The Oilers never looked back.

more than \$93 million. A faculty of 267 serves more than 3,500 students. The student-faculty ration is 14:1.

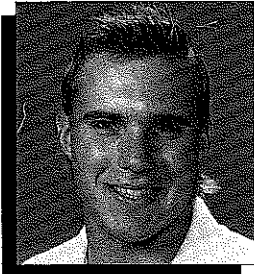
The University is comprised of eight major academic units, including three divisions in its college of

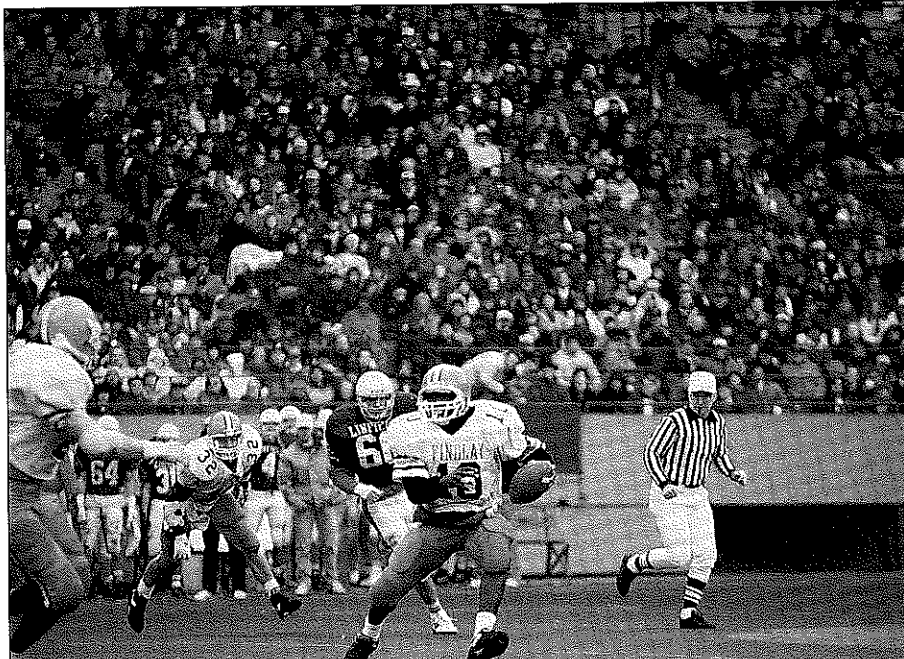
