TODAY'S GAME

The U.S. National Sled Hockey Team faces Korea today in the first preliminary round game of the 2017 World Sled Hockey Challenge here in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. Puck drop is set for 12:00 p.m. local time (11:00 a.m. ET) and will be streamed in the U.S. on HockeyTV.com with updates also available on Twitter @USAHockey with the hashtag #WSHC.

THE SERIES VS. KOREA

The U.S. and Korea are meeting for the seventh time in World Sled Hockey Challenge play. Against Korea, Team USA has won all six WSHC meetings and all-time holds a perfect 13-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record.

The two teams last met in the final preliminary round game of the 2017 Para Sled Hockey World Championship, where the U.S. claimed a 5-0 victory. Forward **Jack Wallace** (Franklin Lakes, N.J.) was named the U.S. Player of the Game after registering his first-ever goal as a member of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team.

IN GOAL TODAY

Steve Cash (Overland, Mo.) is the likely starter for Team USA. A three-time Paralympian (2006, 2010, 2014) and member of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team since 2006, Cash has helped Team USA to a pair of Paralympic gold medals (2010, 2014) and three world championship titles (2009, 2012, 2015). In addition, his contributions have helped Team USA earn a Paralympic bronze medal (2006); two world championship silver medals (2013, 2017); one world championship bronze medal (2008) and five World Sled Hockey Challenge titles (2009, 2012, 2015, 2016 (Jan.), 2016 (Dec.)). The 2009 Paralympic Sportsman of the Year by the United States Olympic Committee, Cash received an ESPY Award from ESPN as the 2010 Best Male Athlete with a Disability and was chosen as the U.S. flag bearer at the 2014 Paralympic Winter Games Closing Ceremony.

NATIONAL TEAM DEBUTS

Defenseman **Ralph DeQuebec** (San Pedro, Calif.) and forward **Travis Dodson** (Deming, N.M.) are making their debut with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team in Sunday's matchup against Korea. Both players spent the 2016-17 season with the U.S. Development Sled Hockey Team. DeQuebec served as co-captain for the squad. Meanwhile, Dodson is seeking a return to the Paralympic Winter Games after participating in the biathlon event at the 2014 Paralympic Winter Games in Sochi.

2016 (DEC.) WORLD SLED HOCKEY CHALLENGE

The U.S. National Sled Hockey Team won an unprecedented third-consecutive World Sled Hockey Challenge crown in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, on December 10. Team USA earned a 4-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record over five games, including a 5-2 victory over Canada in the title game. Team USA outscored its opponents 27-4 over the five-game stretch. The victory saw the U.S. claim its sixth straight major international title, a streak that began at the 2014 Paralympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia.

2018 PARALYMPIC WINTER GAMES

The 2018 Paralympic Winter Games will take place in PyeongChang, South Korea, from March 9-18, 2018. The U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team, which is expected to be named on or around January 1, 2018, will represent the United States in sled hockey. Team USA will play in Group B alongside the Czech Republic, Japan and host South Korea. Group A will include Canada, Italy, Norway and Sweden.

The United States enters the Paralympic Winter Games as two-time defending Paralympic gold medalists. After going undefeated and unscored upon to claim the gold medal at the 2010 Paralympic Winter Games in Vancouver, British Columbia, Team USA became the first nation to claim back-to-back Paralympic gold medals in sled hockey when it defeated Russia, 1-0, in the gold-medal game of the 2014 Paralympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia.

LAST SEASON

The U.S. National Sled Hockey Team opened the 2016-17 season by compiling a 4-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record en route to becoming the first team to win its fifth overall title in the event. At the 2017 Para Sled Hockey World Championship, the U.S. posted a perfect 6-0 record to reach its fifth straight world championship gold medal game before falling to Canada, 4-1. Team USA finished the season 10-1-0-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L).

GOSSSELIN LEADING TEAM USA

Guy Gosselin (Grafton, Wis.), who led Team USA to a silver medal at the 2017 Para Sled Hockey World Championship in Gangneung, South Korea, is serving as head coach of the 2017-18 U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and 2018 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team. Gosselin previously served as an assistant coach for the gold-medal winning 2014 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team alongside head coach **Jeff Sauer** (Madison, Wis.), who passed away last February.

This is Gosselin's third stint with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. In addition to serving as head coach for Team USA in last year's world championship, Gosselin also worked alongside Sauer as an assistant coach from 2011-15. During his time with Team USA, Gosselin helped the U.S. claim gold medals at the 2014 Paralympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia, and the 2012 IPC Sled Hockey World Championship in Hamar, Norway, as well as a silver medal at the 2013 IPC Sled Hockey World Championship in Goyang City, South Korea.

A two-time U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team member (1988, 1992) and three-time U.S. Men's National Team member (1986, 1990, 1991), Gosselin is currently a regional manager of USA Hockey's American Development Model. Gosselin played professionally for parts of six seasons, including a stint with the NHL's Winnipeg Jets following the 1988 Olympic Winter Games. The University of Minnesota Duluth graduate played parts of five seasons (1982-87) with the Bulldogs' men's ice hockey team. A 2013 UMD Athletic Hall of Fame inductee, Gosselin helped lead UMD to back-to-back (1984, 1985) Western Collegiate Hockey Association championships and Frozen Four appearances.

PAULS TO WEAR 'C'; LANDEROS, FARMER TABBED WITH 'A'S

Defenseman **Josh Pauls** (Green Brook, N.J.), a two-time Paralympic gold medalist at the 2010 and 2014 Paralympic Winter Games, is captain of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team for the first time after serving as an alternate captain for three seasons (2014-17). In addition, defenseman **Nikko Landeros** (Johnstown, Colo.) and forward **Declan Farmer** (Tampa, Fla.) have been named alternate captains for the 2017-18 season.

FARMER RAKING IN POINTS

Over the last three World Sled Hockey Challenges, forward **Declan Farmer** (Tampa, Fla.) has found himself atop the statistics leaders.

At the 2016 (Dec.) event, he tallied 17 points (8-9) after pacing all skaters at the 2015 (Jan.) event with 12 points (7-5). In 2015, Farmer became the first U.S. player to lead the tournament in scoring when he tallied nine points (3-6).

Currently, Farmer holds U.S. records in every skater statistic in the World Sled Hockey Challenge, which can be seen on page 2.

USA 9, ITA 1: In round robin play of the 2017 Para Sled Hockey World Championship in Gangneung, South Korea, **Declan Farmer** scored his second hat trick in as many games and 11 other players tallied at least a point as the U.S. topped Italy, 9-1.

USA 1, CAN 4: Nikko Landeros (Johnstown, Colo.) scored, but the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team lost to Canada, 4-1, to finish with a silver medal at the 2017 Para Sled Hockey World Championship in Gangneung, South Korea. It is the third silver medal in world championship play for Team USA.

INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS

Prior to its silver medal at the 2017 Para Sled Hockey World Championship in Gangneung, South Korea, the U.S. had claimed titles in six straight major international events, including the 2016 (Dec.) World Sled Hockey Challenge in Charlottetown, P.E.I.; 2016 IPC Pan-Pacific Championship in Buffalo, New York; the 2016 (Jan.) World Sled Hockey Challenge in Bridgewater, Nova Scotia; the 2015 IPC Sled Hockey World Championship in Buffalo, New York; the 2015 World Sled Hockey Challenge in Leduc, Alberta; and the 2014 Paralympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia. Since 2011, the U.S. has reached the championship game of every major international event.

U.S. NATIONAL SLED TEAM WINS 2017 TEAM USA AWARDS

On Nov. 29, the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team was named the Paralympic Team of the Year by the United States Olympic Committee after registering a 10-1-0-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record that included an unprecedented third straight World Sled Hockey Challenge title last December and a silver medal at the 2017 Para Sled Hockey World Championship in Gangneung, South Korea. On hand to receive the award was last season's captain, **Andy Yohe**.

FIVE SEEKING PARALYMPIC SLED HOCKEY EXPERIENCE

Five players - **Ralph DeQuebec**, **Travis Dodson**, **Billy Hanning**, **Luke McDermott** and **Josh Misiewicz** - are seeking Paralympic sled hockey debuts. DeQuebec and Dodson are making their national debuts this season, while Hanning, McDermott and Misiewicz have been members of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team since the 2014-15 season.

2017 USA HOCKEY SLED CLASSIC, PRESENTED BY THE NHL

The eighth annual USA Hockey Sled Classic, presented by the NHL, took place in Plymouth, Minnesota from Nov. 16-19. The four-day event was hosted by the Minnesota Wild at the Plymouth Ice Center. The field included a record 28 teams associated with a record 20 NHL clubs.

The Chicago Blackhawks, led by national team players **Travis Dodson**, **Jen Lee**, **Kevin McKee**, **Josh Misiewicz** and **Brody Roybal**, won the Tier I title game by topping the Colorado Avalanche, 7-1. As Tier I champions, the Blackhawks received the inaugural O'Connor Courage Trophy as a symbol of the NHL's commitment to the sled hockey community.

The U.S. Women's National Team will finish the Time Is Now Tour with two more U.S.-Canada games, today in St. Paul, Minn., and Dec. 15th in San Jose, Calif. Both games will be broadcast live on the NBC Sports Network.

BOSTON TO HOST 2017 U.S. HOCKEY HALL OF FAME

The 2017 U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Induction Celebration, which will feature the formal induction of the Class of 2017, will take place Wednesday, Dec. 13, at the Westin Boston Waterfront Hotel. The U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Class of 2017 includes **Kevin Collins**, **Jack Parker**, **Ben Smith**, **Ron Wilson** and **Scott Young**. Also honored as part of the celebration will be Lester Patrick Trophy recipients **Peter Lindberg** and **Dave Ogren**. To date there are 172 honored members. Tickets must be purchased in advance and can be obtained online at USHockeyHallofFame.com.

2018 IIHF WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP - BUFFALO, N.Y.

The 2018 International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championship will take place Dec. 26, 2017 – Jan. 5, 2018, at the KeyBank Center and HarborCenter in downtown Buffalo, New York. The U.S. National Junior Team will enter the tournament as the defending gold medalist.



The U.S. and Canada will make history when the two rivals battle outdoors on Dec. 29 in a preliminary round game. The outdoor game, one of 31 total in the 2018 World Juniors, will be staged at New Era Field in Orchard Park, New York, home of the NFL's Buffalo Bills.

2018 U.S. NATIONAL JUNIOR TEAM

The 2018 U.S. National Junior Team, which will have its preliminary roster named in the coming days, will once again see **Jim Johansson**, assistant executive director of hockey operations for USA Hockey, serve as its general manager for the ninth consecutive year.

Bob Motzko (St. Cloud, Minn./St. Cloud State University), who guided the U.S. National Junior Team to its fourth-ever gold medal at the 2017 International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championship in Montreal and Toronto, Canada, is returning as head coach for the 2018 U.S. National Junior Team. Motzko, who led the U.S. to a gold medal in his international head coaching debut, aims to lead the U.S. to back-to-back gold medal finishes for the first time ever. He will be joined by the entire 2017 U.S. coaching staff in assistant coaches **Greg Brown** (Scituate, Mass.), **Grant Potulny** (Grand Forks, N.D.), **Kris Mayotte** (Pittsburgh, Pa.) and **Steve Miller** (Littleton, Colo.).

Overall, the U.S. has captured 10 medals in IIHF World Junior Championship history, including four gold medals (2004, 2010, 2013, 2017), one silver medal (1997) and five bronze medals (1986, 1992, 2007, 2011, 2016).

2018 U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

The 2018 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team will be looking for its fourth consecutive gold medal at the 2018 International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 Women's World Championship in Dmitrov, Russia, from Jan. 6-13, 2018.

The 23-player roster, which was announced on Friday (Dec. 1), features seven players that helped the U.S. earn gold last year in Zlin & Prerov, Czech Republic, including **Taylor Heise** (Lake City, Minn.), **Lizi Norton** (Orono, Minn.), **Gracie Ostertag** (Shakopee, Minn.), **Dominique Petrie** (Beverly Hills, Calif.), **Lindsay Reed** (New Vernon, N.J.), **Ally Simpson** (Frisco, Texas) and **Madeline Wethington** (Edina, Minn.). Twenty-one players also participated in the 2017 Under-18 Series vs. Canada last August in Lake Placid, New York.

Overall, the U.S. has captured gold six times (2008, 2009, 2011, 2015, 2016, 2017) and silver on four occasions (2010, 2012, 2013, 2014).

2018 OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES

The XXIII Olympic Winter Games will be held in PyeongChang, South Korea, from February 9-25, 2018. Both the Men's and Women's Olympic rosters will be unveiled on January 1, 2018.

Men: The 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team will compete from Feb. 14-25. Team USA's final 25-player roster will be comprised of college players, American Hockey Leaguers, and Americans playing professionally in Europe. **Jim Johansson**, assistant executive director of hockey operations for USA Hockey, is the general manager of the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, while Ben Smith is director of player personnel. **Tony Granato** will serve as head coach and will be joined by assistant coaches **Keith Allain**, **Chris Chelios**, **Ron Rolston** and **Scott Young**. The U.S. Men's Olympic Team has won two gold medals (1960, 1980), eight silver medals (1920, 1924, 1932, 1952, 1956, 1972, 2002, 2010) and one bronze medal (1936) all-time in Olympic competition.

Women: The 2018 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team will compete from Feb. 11-22. **Reagan Carey**, USA Hockey's director of women's hockey, is the general manager of the 2018 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team, with **Robb Stauber** serving as head coach. **Bret Strot** filling the role of associate head coach and **Paul Mara** tabbed as an assistant coach. Since capturing gold in 1998, the U.S. has won three silver medals (2002, 2010, 2014) and one bronze medal (2006).

11TH HOCKEY WEEKEND ACROSS AMERICA

The 11th annual Hockey Weekend Across America will be held March 2-4, 2018. Hockey Week Across America will feature a theme for each of the three days, including Wear Your Favorite Hockey Jersey Day on Friday (March 2); Try Hockey Day on Saturday (March 3) and Celebrate Local Hockey Heroes Day on Sunday (March 4). Hockey Weekend Across America was created by USA Hockey in 2008 to engage the hockey community in celebrating the sport of hockey at all levels and exposing the sport to new audiences.
