Preliminary Round • USA (0-0-0-1) vs. Germany (1-0-0-0) • Saturday, May 11, 2024

TONIGHT'S GAME

The U.S. Men's National Team takes on Germany here tonight in its second of seven preliminary round games at the 2024 IIHF Men's World Championship in Ostrava, Czechia. The U.S. is coming off a 5-2 loss to Sweden last night in its opening game of the tournament. All Team USA games air live on NHL Network in the United States.

THE SERIES VS. GERMANY

The U.S. and Germany have played 22 previous times in the IIHF Men's World Championship and the U.S. is 13-0-2-4-3 overall (W-OTW-OTL-L-T). Team USA faced Germany three times as part of last year's world championship, including a pre-tournament game in Munich on May 9 (6-3 win), a preliminary round matchup on May 15 (3-2 win), and in the tournament semifinals, which Germany won by a 4-3 count in overtime. The U.S. has won five of the last six games in the series.

THE HUGHES BLOODLINE

U.S. defenseman **Luke Hughes** is a finalist for the NHL's Calder Trophy, along with fellow American Brock Faber and Connor Bedard. Hughes and his brothers Quinn and Jack all played at the USA Hockey National Team Development Program and all three now star in the NHL -- Luke and Jack for the New Jersey Devils and Quinn for the Vancouver Canucks. Quinn is one of three finalists for the NHL's Norris Trophy (and the prohibitive favorite to win the award), along with Roman Josi and Cale Makar. Ellen Hughes, the mother of Quinn, Jack and Luke, is a former member of the U.S. Women's National Hockey Team and today serves as a player development consultant for the squad.

U.S. NATIONAL SLED TEAM

The U.S. National Sled Hockey Team will play for gold against Canada in the 2024 IPC Para Sled Hockey World Championship on Sunday (May 12) after downing Czechia by a 3-1 count in the semifinals yesterday in Calgary. Team USA has won gold in the last three world championships.

INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS

The U.S. is the only nation in the world that has qualified for the gold-medal game of every major world championship this season to date.

THE LINEUP TONIGHT

Team USA is expected to utilize the same lineup it did for last night's contest vs. Sweden, meaning goaltender **Alex Nedeljkovic**, defenseman **Matthew Kessel** and forward **Gavin Brindley** will not dress.

NOT MUCH REST

Team USA general manager **Brett Peterson** is working on little sleep today. Peterson, who serves as assistant general manager of the Florida Panthers, was at Team USA's game last night against Sweden and then stayed up for a 1:00 a.m. local time faceoff of the Florida Panthers-Boston Bruins Stanley Cup Playoff game (won by the Panthers, 6-2). Peterson played defense for Boston College and went on to compete for five professional seasons in the AHL, ECHL and IHL.

NELSON CLOSE TO NEW U.S. MARK

Brock Nelson, who is playing in his fifth IIHF Men's World Championship, is just three goals shy of becoming the leading all-time American goal scorer in the world championship. Nelson, who scored his 17th career world championship goal yesterday vs. Sweden, is second all-time behind Russell "Buzz" Johnson.

THINGS

The U.S. is the home team tonight, will wear its blue jerseys and occupy the left bench ... Team USA did not have a pre-game skate today ... The last four times the U.S. has lost its opening game of the world championship (2021, 2019, 2017, 2016), it has come back to win game two on all four occasions ... The U.S. won 70 percent of the faceoffs in last night's game vs. Sweden, with **Trevor Zegras** going five-for-five, **Kevin Hayes** winning five-of-six draws, **Brady Tkachuk** successful on 10-of-14 faceoffs (.714) and **Brock Nelson** winning 11-of-16 draws (.688) ... Team USA's roster includes four players who helped the U.S. win gold at the 2024 IIHF World Junior Championship this past December/January in Gothenburg, Sweden. The group includes goaltender **Trey Augustine** and forwards **Gavin Brindley**, **Ryan Leonard** and **Will Smith** ... The U.S. will host both the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship and IPC Para Sled Hockey World Championship in 2024-25. The dates and locations will likely be announced this summer. USA Hockey recently announced that St. Paul and Minneapolis, Minnesota, will be the host cities for the 2026 IIHF World Junior Championship, the 50th edition of the tournament that was initially conceived by former U.S. Olympic coach Murray Williamson, who currently lives in the greater St. Paul/Minneapolis area.

WHAT'S IN A NICKNAME

Team USA assistant coach **Derek Lalonde**, who is the head coach of the NHL's Detroit Red Wings, has long had the nickname "Newsy" after Hockey Hall-of-Famer Edouard "Newsy" Lalonde. When the NHL was forming in 1917, "Newsy" Lalonde was the playing-coach and captain of the Montreal Canadiens. As a kid, Lalonde was working in a newsprint plant and that's where the original Newsy landed his nickname. For Derek Lalonde, it was his teammates at SUNY-Cortland, where he was a standout goaltender, who tabbed him "Newsy," a nickname that has carried with him since.

TEAM USA'S ALL-TIME MEN'S WORLDS MEDALS

The U.S. has won 13 medals in the men's world championship, earning gold once (1933), silver four times (1950, 1939, 1934, 1931) and bronze on eight occasions (2021, 2018, 2015, 2013, 2004, 1996, 1952, 1949). Of Team USA's eight bronze medals, six were claimed by winning bronze-medal games while two came via tournament standings and round-robin play.

BROCK NELSON'S GOLDEN FAMILY

Brock Nelson's uncle Dave Christian was a member of the 1980 "Miracle On Ice" Olympic Hockey Team. In addition, his grandfather, Bill Christian and great uncle, Roger Christian, were both on the 1960 gold-medal-winning U.S. Olympic Team and another great uncle, Gordon Christian, played for the U.S. at the 1956 Olympic Winter Games where the team won the silver medal. Brock's middle name is ... you guessed it ... Christian.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP IN CZECH AND TEAM USA

The 2024 IIHF Men's World Championship marks the 10th time the event is being staged in Czechia/Czech Republic/Czechoslovakia. Team USA has won three medals here in Czechia previously, including gold in 1933 and bronze in both 2004 and 2015.

U.S. PLAYERS AND CZECHIA

Three players -- **Seth Jones**, **Brock Nelson** and **Alex Lyon** -- were part of Team USA in the 2015 IIHF Men's World Championship in Ostrava and Prague. The U.S. earned a bronze medal in the event. The U.S. played its preliminary round games in Ostrava. In the 2020 IIHF World Junior Championship, **Cole Caufield**, **Shane Pinto** and **Trevor Zegras** were part of Team USA and played preliminary round games in Ostrava. The U.S. finished sixth. And in the 2012 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship held in Brno, Czech Republic, in 2012, the U.S. earned gold with **Seth Jones** part of that team.

LEADERSHIP

Brady Tkachuk is the captain of Team USA. He serves as the captain of the NHL's Ottawa Senators and was the captain of the gold medal-winning U.S. National Under-18 Team in the 2017 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. The U.S. has three alternate captains in **Brock Nelson**, **Seth Jones** and **Zach Werenski**. The three have played in a total of eight IIHF Men's World Championships.

THE JOURNEY TO GET TO OSTRAVA

A total of 22 players, along with Team USA's staff, gathered at Newark International Airport on Saturday, May 4, and flew to Bratislava, Slovakia, where the U.S. conducted a short pre-camp and played its lone pre-tournament game on Tuesday (May 7) against Slovakia. Team USA earned a 6-2 victory in the contest with 12 different players contributing points. **Alex Lyon** played the first two periods in goal and stopped 17 of 19 shots, while **Trey Augustine** played the third period and did not allow a goal on four shots. Team USA made the 3.5-hour bus ride to Ostrava on Wednesday (May 8) mid-morning and did not skate. The U.S. had a 50-minute practice session yesterday (May 9) just before noon and skated for 30 minutes late this morning prior to tonight's opening game. **Brock Nelson** arrived here Wednesday (May 8), while **Alex Nedeljkovic** and **Gavin Brindley** got to Ostrava yesterday (May 9) to complete Team USA's 25-player roster.

NOTES FROM PREVIOUS VERSIONS OF GAME NOTES

Bijan Sabet, the U.S. Ambassador to Czechia, attended the U.S.-Sweden preliminary round game on May 10 in Ostrava ... **John Hynes** is the head coach of Team USA in the world championship for the second time after guiding the U.S. in the 2016 world championship in St. Petersburg and Moscow, Russia (4-1-1-4/4th). Hynes also served as an assistant coach for Team USA in the 2019 men's worlds in Bratislava and Kosice, Slovakia (4-1-0-3/7th) ... **Brock Nelson** has played in 78 NHL playoffs games (27-23--50), the most of anyone on Team USA. **Kevin Hayes** is next at 56 games played (8-18--26) ... Ten players have competed previously for Team USA in the IIHF Men's World Championship, including **Alex Lyon** (2015), **Seth Jones** (2014, 2015, 2022), **Jeff Petry** (2012, 2013, 2014), **Zach Werenski** (2019), **Matt Boldy** (2022), **Mikey Eyssimont** (2023), **Johnny Gaudreau** (2014, 2017, 2018, 2019), **Kevin Hayes** (2014, 2017), **Luke Kunin** (2019) and **Brock Nelson** (2014, 2015, 2016, 2017). Additionally, **Alex Nedeljkovic** was part of Team USA for the 2022 men's world championship, but got hurt in pre-camp and returned to the U.S. ... **Derek Lalonde** is leading the U.S. power play, while **Jack Capuano** is in charge of the U.S. penalty kill.

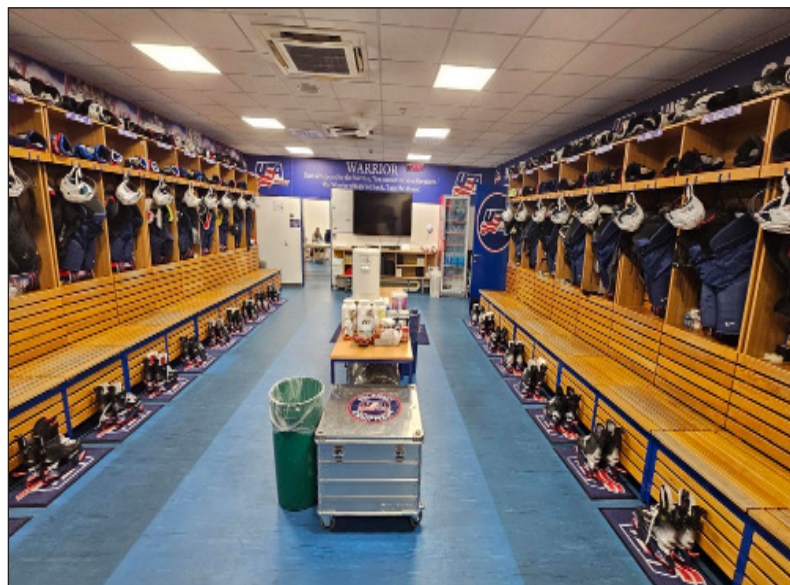
