TONIGHT'S GAME

The U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team faces Canada in the Bronze Medal Game at the 2019 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship here at Fjällraven Center (Ornskoldsvik), Sweden. Puck drop is set for 3:30 p.m. local and 9:30 a.m. ET and will be televised in the U.S. live on NHL Network.

Canada finished the preliminary round with a 4-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record. They opened the tournament by topping Finland (5-3), followed by Switzerland (7-4) Belarus (11-1), and the Czech Republic (6-2).

Canada is led in scoring by Peyton Krebs (6-4-10) and goaltender Taylor Gauthier holds a .914 save percentage and 3.00 goals against average.

All-time, the U.S. is 9-2-2-2-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) in 15 games against Canada at this tournament. The U.S. has outscored Canada 66-36 in those 15 matchups. Last year, the U.S. faced Canada in the preliminary round, where Team USA fell 6-4.

TALKING POINTS

CAUFIELD GOALS RECORD

Following his 14th goal of the 2019 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship in the semifinal loss against Russia, forward **Cole Caufield** has tied Alex Ovechkin for the single-tournament goal-scoring record.

USA VS RUSSIA RECAP (SF)

Caufield scored twice, but Team USA fell to Russia, 3-2, in the shootout in the semifinals. **Spencer Knight** made 31 saves in the loss.

USA VS FINLAND RECAP (QF)

Jack Hughes had three goals and an assist, **Cole Caufield** scored his tournament-leading 12th goal, **Trevor Zegras** recorded four assists, and **Spencer Knight** made 21 saves to help Team USA to a 6-0 win over Finland in the quarterfinals.

USA VS LATVIA RECAP

Cole Caufield and **John Beecher** each recorded two goals apiece in Team USA's 7-1 victory over Latvia in its final preliminary round game at Fjällraven Center. **Spencer Knight** made 12 saves in the victory.

USA VS RUSSIA RECAP

Team USA rallied from a 2-0 deficit on the way to a 6-3 victory over Russia in its third preliminary round game on Sunday (April 21.) **Jack Hughes**, **Alex Turcotte**, **Matthew Boldy**, **Cole Caufield** and **Matthew Beniers** scored for Team USA, and **Spencer Knight** made 20 saves in net.

THINGS WORTH MENTIONING

Jack Hughes (8-9-17) and Cole Caufield (14-3-17) are currently tied for first in the tournament in points through six games ... The U.S. is averaging 6.5 goals per game through six games and owns second-ranked power play (30.3%), behind Canada (33.3%).

Team USA has five returning players who captured a silver medal in 2018, forwards **Cole Caufield**, **Jack Hughes**, **Alex Turcotte**, defenseman **Cam York** and goaltender **Spencer Knight**. Jack Hughes earned the Directorate Award as the tournament's top forward. Hughes was also named to the Media All-Star Team and tournament MVP after leading the tournament in scoring with 12 points (5-7-12). Knight won four games in goal last year, while York recorded six assists and was named to the Media All-Star Team. Turcotte scored two goals and five points and Caufield tallied four goals and six points, both in seven games.

USA VS SLOVAKIA RECAP

Cole Caufield and **Jack Hughes** each scored four goals in the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team's 12-5 victory over Slovakia on Friday (April 19). **Cam York**, **Alex Turcotte**, **Matthew Boldy** and **Owen Lindmark** also netted goals for Team USA, and Cameron Rowe made 30 saves in net.

USA VS SWEDEN RECAP

Team USA topped host country Sweden 6-1 in its first preliminary game yesterday (April 18). **Cole Caufield** netted a hat trick **Spencer Knight** made 29 saves in the victory. **John Beecher**, **Case McCarthy** and **Alex Turcotte** also netted goals for Team USA.

BRINK ADDED

Forward **Bobby Brink** (Minnetonka, Minn.) has been added to the roster of the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team it was announced today (April 21) by USA Hockey. The University of Denver commit spent 2018-19 with the United States Hockey League's Sioux City Musketeers and recorded 70 points (35G, 35A) in 45 games. Brink represented Team USA at the 2018 World Junior A Challenge, where he recorded eight points in six games to help the U.S. claim first place. Landon Slaggert, who was initially named to the roster and played in two exhibition games, has been released from the roster. The U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team now includes 13 forwards, seven defensemen and two goaltenders.

2019 IIHF U18 MWC: ABOUT THE TOURNAMENT

The 2019 International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 Men's World Championship is being held in Ornskoldsvik (A3 Arena) and Umea (Fjallraven Center), Sweden. This will mark the second time Sweden has hosted the tournament, with the previous location being Angelholm/Halmstad (2006) where the U.S. took home gold, defeating Finland 3-1. Unlike this year, the 2006 event saw the U.S. enter the tournament as the defending gold medalist. In the end, Team USA won consecutive gold medals for the first time with Patrick Kane leading the tournament in scoring with 12 points.

TEAM USA AT THE U18 WORLDS

Twenty players The United States enters the 2019 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship having medaled in 16 of the past 20 tournaments, including a tournament record 15 consecutive medals. Overall, the U.S. holds 10 gold medals, four silver medals, and two bronze medals. Seven of its 10 gold medals have come in the last nine years (2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2017). All-time, Team USA is 94-7-3-27-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) in 131 tournament games, outscoring opponents 648-256. In the 14 gold-medal games the U.S. has competed in, its record is 8-2-0-4 (W-OTW-OTL-L).

NHL CENTRAL SCOUTING

Twenty players currently on the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team roster were named to the National Hockey League Central Scouting Bureau's Final Rankings for the 2019 NHL Entry Draft.

Defenseman include **Cam York** (Anaheim Hills, Calif.) at No. 12, **Alex Vlasic** (Wilmette, Ill.) at No. 38, **Henry Thrun** (Southborough, Mass.) at No. 39, **Drew Helleson** (Farmington, Minn.) at No. 46, **Marshall Warren** (Laurel Hollow, N.Y.) at No. 61, and **Domenick Fensore** (Thornwood, N.Y.) at No. 68, **Case McCarthy** (Clarence Center, N.Y.) at No. 77. In addition, goaltender **Spencer Knight** (Darien, Conn.) is rated as the top-ranked North American prospect among eligible goaltenders, and **Cameron Rowe** (Wilmette, Ill.) is rated at No. 4.

HOW WE GOT HERE

The journey towards today's tournament opening game began on April 11, when the U.S. convened in Vierumaki, Finland, for practice. Team USA then played in two exhibition games, falling to Finland 1-0 and topping Switzerland 8-0 on April 12 & 13. On April 15, the team departed for Ornskoldsvik, Sweden via ferry, where they will remain for the rest of the tournament.

Jack Hughes and Cole Caufield earned sole ownership of the U.S. National Team Development Team's career points and career goals records, on the same play, in the U18s' 12-4 win on Friday, Mar. 15 against the Green Bay Gamblers. Caufield recorded a six-goal night to secure the record, exceeding Phil Kessel's (NTDP 2003-2005) prior record of 104 goals in his career with the NTDP. Hughes tallied five assists throughout the game, his fifth being an assist that led to Caufield's record-breaking goal. Hughes exceeded Clayton Keller's (NTDP 2014-2016) record of 189 points in his NTDP career.

ABOUT HODGES

Jason Hodges is in his 21st season with USA Hockey's National Team Development Program and in 2018-19 is serving as athletic trainer for the U.S. National Under-18 Team. Hodges has served on the staff of five gold-medal squads at the International Ice Hockey Federation Men's Under-18 World Championship (2005, 2009, 2011, 2015, 2017). Additionally he has two silver medals in the event (2007, 2013).

ABOUT VISSER

Jake Visser is in his ninth season with USA Hockey's National Team Development Program and will work as the equipment manager for the U.S. National Under-18 Team in 2018-19. His stint has included three gold medals (2011, 2015, 2017) and one silver medal (2013) at the International Ice Hockey Federation Men's Under-18 World Championship. At the signature event for the U.S. National Under-17 Team, the World Under-17 Challenge, Visser has seen one first-place finish (January 2014) and one second-place finish (2012).

ABOUT THE STAFF

ABOUT MONAGHAN

Scott Monaghan will serve as the general manager of the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team for the 21st time at the U18 Men's Worlds. He has served on the staff of for all ten gold medal-winning squads at the 2002, 2005, 2006, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2014, 2015, 2017. An original staff member of USA Hockey's NTDP, he currently serves as its senior director of operations and is responsible for all aspects of the NTDP. Monaghan works closely with the NTDP coaching staff to develop the challenging schedule the teams play, including the growth of an NCAA Division I/III schedule for the U18s and the program's transition to a full-time member of the USHL. Monaghan also has been on the staff of six U.S. National Junior Teams, last serving as team leader for the gold medal-winning squad at the 2010 IIHF World Junior Championship. Monaghan sits on the USA Hockey Player Development Committee and the USA Hockey Junior Council.

ABOUT WROBLEWSKI

John Wroblewski will be serving as head coach for the second time after previously leading the U.S. to a gold medal with a perfect 6-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record at the 2017 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. A player on the inaugural roster of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program in 1997, Wroblewski served as head coach of the United States Hockey League's Youngstown Phantoms (2015-16) prior to his current role. The Neenah, Wisconsin, native began his coaching career as an intern assistant coach for the U.S. National Under-18 Team (2007-08) as part of the NTDP. The following year, he was promoted to a full-time assistant coach, a position he held for two seasons (2008-10). In 2010, Wroblewski earned a gold medal as Team USA claimed first place at the 2010 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. Wroblewski skated with the NTDP for two seasons (1997-99) before suiting up for the University of Notre Dame. A four-year letterwinner with the Fighting Irish (1999-2003), Wroblewski served as alternate captain during his senior year and was the winner of the Notre Dame Monogram Club's Most Valuable Player Award.

ABOUT HINOTE

Dan Hinote is making his first appearance coaching for Team USA at the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. Hinote, who played 14 years of professional hockey in the NHL, AHL and SHL, recently concluded his first year as associate coach for the U.S. National Under-18 Team during the 2018-19 season. The Elk River, Minn., native played 503 games in the NHL and won a Stanley Cup championship with the Colorado Avalanche in 2001. He retired from professional hockey in 2010 and spent four seasons (2010-14) as an assistant coach with the Columbus Blue Jackets as well as a part-time scout for the Blue Jackets. Hinote played two seasons of college hockey at the U.S. Military Academy and today remains the only player in program history to be drafted as he was selected by the Colorado Avalanche in 1996.

ABOUT LIND

Kevin Lind, who has served as an intern assistant coach for USA Hockey's NTDP from 2017-19, will be an assistant coach for the U.S. at the 2019 IIHF Men's World Championship for the first time. Prior to the NTDP, Lind spent the 2016-17 season as an assistant coach for the University of Notre Dame. The 2010 NHL Draft pick (ANA, 6th rd., 177th ovr.) and four-year letter winner with the Fighting Irish (2010-14), Lind continues to be the only person in Notre Dame Hockey history to reach the NCAA's Frozen Four as both a player (2011) and a coach (2017). The Homer Glen, Ill. native won a championship with Team USA at the 2009 World Junior A Challenge and served as an assistant captain at the 2009 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament.

ABOUT NIGHTINGALE

Jared Nightingale, who served as an intern assistant coach for the U.S. National Under-17 Team during the 2018-19 season, will represent the U.S. for the first time as an assistant coach at the IIHF Men's Under-18 World Championship. Nightingale spent the 2017-18 season as an assistant coach for the United States Hockey League's Omaha Lancers. The Cheboygan, Michigan, native played four years (2002-06) at Michigan State, and was an alternate captain his junior and senior seasons. Nightingale went on to a 13-year professional playing career that included stops in both the ECHL and AHL.

ABOUT SPEER

Thomas Speer, USA Hockey's national goaltending coach, will coach for Team USA a second time at the IIHF Men's Under-18 World Championship. Speer, who also oversees the Warren Strelow National Goaltending Mentor Program, guides the Under-17 and Under-18 goaltenders at USA Hockey's National Team Development Program. Prior to the NTDP, Speer worked as director of amateur goaltending for the Dallas Stars, a goalie development coordinator for USA Hockey in Texas and Oklahoma, and as director of camp development and personnel for Elite Goalies in Allen, Texas. He also served as a goaltending coach for the Allen Americans of the ECHL for four seasons.
