2023 IIHF WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The U.S. Women's National Team is one of 10 teams competing at the 2023 International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship from April 5-16 in Brampton, Ontario.

The tournament features ten teams divided into two groups of five. Team USA is competing in Group A alongside, Canada, Czechia, Switzerland and Japan. Group B includes Finland, Sweden, Germany, Hungary and France. Each group will play a single round-robin series before the playoff round.

All five teams from Group A and the top three teams from Group B advance to the playoff rounds. Winners of the quarterfinals advance. The two semifinal winners will play in the gold medal game, while the two semifinal losers will play for bronze.

WOMEN'S WORLDS SUCCESS

The U.S. has earned gold or silver in every IIHF Women's World Championship since the inception of the event in 1990. The U.S. has made the title game in all 21 tournaments staged.

LAST TIME OUT

In the final game of the 2022-23 Rivalry Series, Team USA dropped a hard-fought bout, 5-0 to Canada. The rivals stepped on the gas early jumping out to a 1-0 lead, before a four-goal second extended their lead to 5-0. Despite the score, the U.S. out-shot Canada 25-18 in the game.

QUICK SHOTS

TODAY'S MATCH UP

Today's match up against Japan marks the first preliminary-round game for Team USA at the 2023 IIHF Women's World Championship. It marks the second consecutive tournament the U.S. has opened WWC play against Japan. The U.S. enters the tournament as defending silver medalists.

AGAINST JAPAN...

Team USA boasts a perfect 4-0 record against Japan at the WWC. Most recently, the U.S. topped Japan 10-0 in the opening game at the 2022 Women's World Championship. The U.S. has outscored Japan 32-2 in all time meetings at Women's Worlds.

LAST TIME AGAINST JAPAN

The U.S. last met Team Japan during the opening game of the 2022 IIHF Women's World Championship. Nine different players tallied goals, while 15 players had at least a point in the U.S.' 10-0 shutout victory. Forward **Taylor Heise** recorded five assists in her U.S. Women's National Team debut, while **Alex Carpenter** (2G, 1A), **Amanda Kessel** (1G, 2A) and **Kendall Coyne Schofield** (3A) all recorded a three-point game

HEISE'S BREAKOUT PERFORMANCE

The reigning Women's World Championship MVP returns to the ice following a record-breaking performance in 2022. **Taylor Heise** recorded 18 points (7G, 11A) in seven games for the U.S. at last year's Women's Worlds. She led the tournament in points, goals and assists and scored the most points in a single women's worlds since Team USA's Cindy Curley recorded 23 in 1990.

KNIGHT BREAKS ALL-TIME WWC POINT RECORD

Team USA captain, **Hilary Knight**, returns to the ice for the U.S. in her 13th Women's Worlds appearance. In 2022, Knight broke the long-standing IIHF all-time WWC point record, recording her 87th all-time point on a third-period goal in the team's quarterfinal win against Hungary. Knight currently holds the IIHF all-time WWC points and goals record.

NEW FACES

Becca Gilmore, **Gabbie Hughes**, **Tessa Janecke**, **Nicole LaMantia**, **Abbey Levy**, and **Haley Winn** were named to the U.S. Women's National Team for the first time in international competition and will be making their debut in Brampton. Gilmore, Janecke and Winn all played for Team USA in the 2022-23 Rivalry Series.

2022-23 RIVALRY SERIES

Team USA faced Canada this winter for the 2022-23 Rivalry Series, a seven-game series. Canada won the series by the tally of 4-3.

WWC Series vs. Switzerland: 10-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

LAST WWC MEETING: AUGUST 29, 2022 • USA 9, SUI 0: The U.S. Women's National Team used goals from seven different players, including two from both **Taylor Heise** (Lake City, Minn.) and **Hilary Knight** (Sun Valley, Idaho), to earn a 9-0 win over Switzerland. **Alex Carpenter** (North Reading, Mass.) recorded three assists as Team USA outshot the Swiss, 57-4 in the winning effort. **Maddie Rooney** (Andover, Minn.) recorded the four-save shutout in net.

CZECHIA



WWC Series vs. Czechia: 1-0-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)

LAST WWC MEETING: SEPT. 3, 2023 • USA 10, CZE 1: A six-goal first period propelled Team USA to a 10-1 victory over Czechia in the semifinals of the 2022 IIHF Women's World Championship. **Taylor Heise** (Lake City, Minn.) led the U.S. with five points (2G, 3A) and **Amanda Kessel** (Madison, Wis.) added four points (3G, 1A) as 13 players tallied a point.

JAPAN



WWC Series vs. Japan: 4-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

LAST WWC MEETING: AUGUST 25, 2022 • USA 10, JPN 0: Nine different players tallied goals, while 15 players had at least a point in the U.S.' 10-0 victory. Forward **Taylor Heise** recorded five assists in her U.S. Women's National Team debut, while **Alex Carpenter** (2G, 1A), **Amanda Kessel** (1G, 2A) and **Kendall Coyne Schofield** (3A) all recorded a three-point game. The U.S. outshot Japan 62-6, holding Japan shotless in the middle period. **Nicole Hensley** recorded the shutout in net, stopping all six shots faced.

CANADA



WWC Series vs. Canada: 12-4-6-10 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

LAST WWC MEETING: SEPTEMBER 4, 2022 • USA 1, CAN 2: Following a scoreless first period, Canada jumped out to a 2-0 lead from two goals from Brianne Jenner. **Abby Roque** (Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.) netted a power-play goal to cut Canada's lead in half. Despite heavy offensive pressure in the third, the U.S. could not find the back of the net, falling in the gold medal game, 2-1. **Nicole Hensley** (Lakewood, Colo.) made 17 saves in net.

QUARTERFINALS



U.S. All-Time in WWC Quarterfinals: 3-0 (W-L)

Of Note: The U.S. never played in a quarterfinal contest at an IIHF Women's World Championship event, having earned a bye to the semifinal round in all previous competitions, until the tournament was reformatted in 2019. Team USA is a perfect 3-0 in quarterfinals since. With 10 teams in this year's tournament, all eight teams that advanced out of the preliminary rounds will play in the quarterfinals.

SEMIFINALS



U.S. All-Time in WWC Semifinals: 16-0-0-1-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)

Of Note: The U.S. has only fallen once in the semifinal round of the WWC and that was against Canada on April 10, 2009. Despite a 33-save effort by Molly Schaus, the U.S. was edged by its northern rival, 2-1. Because the U.S. had already earned a bid into the gold-medal game, the loss did not eliminate the team. Team USA went on to claim gold against Canada two days later, winning 4-1.

MEDAL GAMES



U.S. All-Time in WWC Medal Games: 4-5-4-8 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

Of Note: The U.S. has faced Canada in 20 of the last 21 medal games they have played in, having played for gold in every WWC in history. In 2019, the U.S. faced Finland for gold, winning that game 2-1 in a shootout. Team USA has won gold nine times, including eight of the last 10 Women's Worlds.

2022 U.S. OLYMPIC TEAM RETURNEES

In total, 13 players on this year's team were members of the 2022 U.S. Olympic Team that took home silver in Beijing in February 2022. Olympians include, **Cayla Barnes, Alex Carpenter, Savannah Harmon, Caroline Harvey, Nicole Hensley, Megan Keller, Amanda Kessel, Hilary Knight, Abbey Murphy, Kelly Pannek, Abby Roque, Hayley Scamurra and Lee Stecklein.**

WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM NEWCOMERS

Becca Gilmore, Gabbie Hughes, Tessa Janecke, Nicole LaMantia, Abbey Levy, and Haley Winn were named to the U.S. Women's National Team for the first time in international competition and will be making their debut in Brampton. Gilmore, Janecke and Winn all played for Team USA in the 2022-23 Rivalry Series.

LUCKY NUMBER 13

Forward **Hilary Knight** is appearing in her record 13th IIHF Women's World Championship, the most in USA Hockey history. Knight has led Team USA to gold eight times (2008, 2009, 2011, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2019) and silver four times (2007, 2012, 2021, 2022).

8TH APPEARANCE FOR CARPENTER

Forward **Alex Carpenter** is playing in her eighth IIHF Women's World Championship, tying Brianna Decker, Natalie Darwitz, Shelley Looney, Jessie Vetter and Meghan Duggan for fourth-most in USA Hockey history.

YOUTH MOVEMENT

Ten players on the roster have birth years of 2000 or later, with six of those ten born in either 2002, 2003 or 2004.

TWO GENERATIONS

The age gap between the oldest player on Team USA and the youngest player on the U.S. squad is 15 years. **Hilary Knight**, 33, born July 12, 1989 is the oldest player on the roster, while **Tessa Janecke**, 18, born May 12, 2004 is the youngest player on the roster.

COLLEGE CONNECTION

All 25 athletes on the Team USA roster have competed or are currently competing as women's hockey student-athletes at a U.S. college or university. The University of Wisconsin leads the way with six athletes, while the University of Minnesota has five representatives. Boston College has three, while Northeastern, Ohio State and Clarkson all have two. Cornell, Harvard, Lindenwood, Minnesota Duluth and Penn State all have one athlete. Eleven different schools have representation on the team.

PATTY KAZMAIER MEMORIAL AWARD HONOREES

Four members of the team have been honored with the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, bestowed annually to the best women's player in NCAA Division I college hockey: **Taylor Heise** (2022), **Aerin Frankel** (2021), **Alex Carpenter** (2015) and **Amanda Kessel** (2013).

U18 WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP ALUMNI

A total of 19 players on the 2023 U.S. Women's National Team represented the U.S. at an IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, including **Cayla Barnes, Hannah Bilka, Alex Carpenter, Britta Curl, Lacey Eden, Becca Gilmore, Rory Guilday, Caroline Harvey, Taylor Heise, Gabbie Hughes, Tessa Janecke, Megan Keller, Amanda Kessel, Nicole LaMantia, Abbey Murphy, Abby Roque, Kelly Pannek, Lee Stecklein and Haley Winn.** Janecke was most recently on the U18 team in 2022.

2020 U18 TAKEOVER

Five players from the electric 2020 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team are in Brampton as members of the 2023 U.S. Women's World Championship Team. **Lacey Eden, Rory Guilday, Caroline Harvey, Abbey Murphy and Haley Winn** all won gold at the 2020 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship in Bratislava, Slovakia.

FROM NEAR AND FAR

A total of 13 different states are represented on this year's Women's World Championship Team. Five players are from Minnesota, four are from Illinois and New York, while two are from Massachusetts and Michigan. California, Colorado, Idaho, Maryland, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Texas and Wisconsin all have one player representing.

LONE STAR STATE OF MIND

Forward **Hannah Bilka** is just the second U.S. Women's National Team player ever from the state of Texas. The Coppell, Texas, native is second only to Ellen Weinberg of Dallas, Texas, who represented the United States at the 1992 IIHF Women's World Championship in Finland.

AROUND USA HOCKEY

MAKING THE 2023 U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

The 25-player 2023 U.S. Women's National Team was selected following a five-day evaluation camp in Blaine, Minn. from March 25-31. The team was selected from a pool of 43 of the top players in the country.

2023 PATTY KAZMAIER MEMORIAL AWARD

The 2023 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award was presented to Sophie Jaques of Ohio State as part of 'Saturday of the Women's Frozen Four' on March 18 in Duluth, Minn. The Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, an award by the USA Hockey Foundation, is given annually to the top women's hockey player in division I college hockey. Jaques, along with Colgate's Danielle Serdachny and Northeastern's Alina Mueller, were honored as top-3 finalists.

2023 HOCKEY HUMANITARIAN AWARD

Team USA forward **Gabbie Hughes** (Lino Lakes, Minn.) is a finalist for the 2023 Hockey Humanitarian Award. The award is given to the player in collegiate hockey who embodies excellence both on the ice and off the ice in the community. The award winner will be announced Friday (April 7) at the Men's Frozen Four in Tampa.

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2023 U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM STAFF



JOHN WROBLEWSKI, HEAD COACH

John Wroblewski is serving as the head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team for the 2022-23 season following taking the helm at the 2022 IIHF Women's World Championship, where he led the U.S. to a silver medal.

Wroblewski joined the U.S. Women's National Team following two years (2020-22) as the head coach of the Ontario (Calif.) Reign, the AHL affiliate of the LA Kings, and four seasons (2016-20) as the bench boss of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program.

Over his four years with the NTDP, the program reached its first USHL playoff berth since 2012 and finished top-three in all 12 international tournaments played. He led his team to 33-consecutive international victories from 2016-18, and also oversaw the development of 29 NHL Draft picks, including Jack Hughes, who was selected first overall by the New Jersey Devils in 2019.

At the IIHF level, Wroblewski guided the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team twice, resulting in a gold in 2017 and bronze in 2019.

The Neenah, Wisconsin, native began his coaching career as an intern assistant coach with the NTDP and was promoted to a full-time assistant coach the following season, a position he held from 2008-10.

Wroblewski, a player on the inaugural NTDP roster in 1997, skated four years with the University of Notre Dame (1999-2003). He went on to play four years (2003-07) professionally with the ECHL's Fresno Falcons, recording 125 points (65-60) in 273 career games.

JOSH SCIBA, ASSISTANT COACH

Josh Sciba is reprising his role on the U.S. Women's National Team staff during the 2022-23 season, after serving in the same capacity at the 2022 IIHF Women's World Championship.

As an assistant coach, Sciba helped lead the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team to a gold medal at the 2022 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, after serving in the same capacity for the 2019 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team.

Sciba is currently the head coach of the Union College women's ice hockey team, a role he has served in for the past six seasons.

As a player, Sciba was a member of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program from 2001-03, prior to playing four years at the University of Notre Dame.

BRENT HILL, ASSISTANT COACH

Brent Hill is making his debut as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team on the international stage having served as an assistant coach during the 2022-23 Rivalry Series.

Hill is currently serving as an assistant coach of the Quinnipiac Women's Ice Hockey team, a role he's held for the last two seasons.

Hill was on the bench as an assistant coach for the 2015 U.S. Under-18 Women's World Championship, leading the squad to a gold medal at the 2015 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship.

Prior to Quinnipiac, Hill spent four seasons at the helm of Bishop Kearny Selects Academy, following a season as an assistant coach at Merrimack University and four seasons as an assistant coach at RPI.

SHARI DICKERMAN, ASSISTANT COACH

Shari Dickerman is making her debut as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team on the international stage having served as an assistant coach during the 2022-23 Rivalry Series.

Dickerman, an assistant coach at Minnesota State University, previously served as assistant coach of the 2022 U.S. Collegiate Women's Select Team, that competed at the 2022 Collegiate Series against Canada in August.

Prior to her appointment to the USA Hockey staff, Dickerman served as an evaluator at numerous USA Hockey camps.

A member of the Mavericks staff since 2009, Dickerman has helped lead Minnesota State for the last 13 seasons.

As a player, Dickerman was an All-American goaltender for the Mavericks.

ALLI ALTMANN, GOALTENDING COACH

Alli Altmann returns as the goaltending coach of the U.S. Women's National Team after serving on the silver medal-winning staff of the 2021 and 2022 U.S. Women's National Team that both took silver at the Women's World Championship.

Altmann also guided the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for four seasons, having served in the goaltending coach role from 2017-22. She guided the U.S. to two golds and two silvers during that time.

Altmann is currently the co-owner and vice president of DEVENIR Goaltenders. She played four seasons for Minnesota State University, recording a career .901 save percentage.
