The U.S. National Sled Hockey Team meets Canada here this afternoon in the championship game of the 2018 Para Hockey Cup. Puck drop at the Western Fair Sports Center in London, Ontario, is set for 4 p.m. ET with period updates on Twitter at @usahockey.

The U.S. has a chance to claim its fifth-straight tournament title having won the 2015, 2016 (Jan.), 2016 (Dec.) and 2017 events. A win would also extend Team USA's tournament-record titles to seven after also claiming titles in 2009 and 2012.

- TALKING POINTS -

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME REGULARSDating back to the 2015 IPC Sled Hockey World Championship, the U.S. and Canada have met in the championship game of seven consecutive international tournaments. The U.S. holds a 6-1 advantage, with its lone loss coming in the 2017 Para Ice Hockey World Championship.

The two teams last championship game meeting came in the gold-medal game at the 2018 Paralympic Winter Games where the U.S. came from behind in dramatic fashion to capture the Paralympic gold medal with a 2-1 overtime win. Declan Farmer (Tampa, Fla.) scored the game-tying goal with 37.8 seconds left in regulation and tallied the golden goal 3:30 into overtime.

LEADING THE WAY

U.S. alternate captain **Declan Farmer** leads all skaters in goals (8) and points (11) while teammate **Brody Roybal** (Northlake, III.) has a tournament-best seven assists. In net, Jen Lee (San Francisco, Calif.) and Steve Cash (Overland, Mo.) rank first and second, respectively, in both goals against average (Lee - 0.00, Cash - 0.50) and save percentage (Lee - 1.00, Cash - 0.933).

GAME 1: USA 3, CANADA 0

In its tournament-opener on Monday (Dec. 3), the U.S. blanked Canada, 3-0, as Farmer tallied a goal and an assist and Kyle Zych (South Hadley, Mass.) scored his first goal in his national team debut. Steve Cash made nine save to secure the shutout and Rico Roman (Portland, Ore.) scored Team USA's third goal.

GAME 2: USA 9, SOUTH KOREA 0

Luke McDermott (Westerlo, N.Y.) scored twice and eight other U.S. players registered at least one point as the U.S. defeated South Korea, 9-0, in its second game on Tuesday (Dec. 4). Jen Lee (San Francisco, Calif.) earned the shutout in net while Josh Hargis (Colorado Springs, Colo.) became the second newcomer to score his first goal as a member of Team USA.

GAME 3: USA 4, CANADA 1

Declan Farmer netted two goals and **Josh Pauls** (Green Brook, N.J.) added a goal and an assist as Team USA edged Canada, 4-1, to maintain its perfect tournament start. Kevin McKee (Chicago, III.) also scored as Steve Cash earned his second win.

GAME 4: USA 8, SOUTH KOREA 0

Brody Roybal and Declan Farmer each tallied five points and 10 other players collected at least one point to lead the 2018-19 U.S. National Sled Hockey Team past South Korea, 8-0, in its final preliminary round game. **Colin Gooley** (Baldwinsville, N.Y.) registered an assist for his first point with Team USA.

OTHER USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS

Last night, USA Hockey hosted its annual Holiday Party in Colorado Springs, Colo., that included a visit from the Stanley Cup ... The 2018 U.S. Junior Select Team defeated Canada East, 3-1, last night in a pre-tournament contest ahead of the 2018 World Junior A Challenge ... On Wednesday (Dec. 5), the 29-player roster for the 2019 U.S. National Junior Team was unveiled live on NHL Network. The team will begin training camp next Friday (Dec. 14) in Everett, Washington, just 30 minutes north of Seattle, which on Tuesday (Dec. 4) was authorized to file an application for an NHL expansion team to become the 32nd NHL franchise and begin play in the 2020-21 season ... Over the last 10 seasons, the total number of hockey players in the Seattle area has increased by 46%.

LEADING TEAM USA-

David Hoff (Bottineau, N.D.), USA Hockey's Northern Plains District Coach-In-Chief and assistant coach of last year's gold medal-winning 2018 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team, is in his first season as head coach of the 2018-19 U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. This will be Hoff's third season with Team USA after making his debut in the 2016-17 season.

Josh Pauls (Green Brook, N.J.), who has helped the U.S. capture the gold medal in the last three Paralympic Winter Games (2010, 2014, 2018), is serving as captain of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. In addition, two-time Paralympic gold medalists (2014, 2018) Declan Farmer (Tampa, Fla.) and Rico Roman (Portland, Ore.) have been named alternate captains.

Pauls begins his 11th season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his second as team captain while Farmer is entering his seventh season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his second as an alternate captain. A Purple Heart recipient and U.S. Army Veteran, Roman is serving as an alternate captain for the first time as he begins his eighth season with Team USA.

THIS AND THAT

Prior to Thursday's game, U.S. captain Josh Pauls (Green Brook, N.J.) called into NHL Network's "NHL Now" to discuss the team's tournament and recent success ... On Tuesday (Dec. 5), the U.S. Olympic Committee named the U.S. Women's National Team as its Team of the Month for the Team USA Awards Best of November honors after claiming its fourth consecutive Four Nations Cup title ... Seven players on Team USA hold military backgrounds from the U.S. Army and U.S. Marines, including three U.S. Army veterans in alternate captain Rico Roman (Portland, Ore.), Jen Lee (San Francisco, Calif.) and U.S. Army Ranger Josh Hargis (Colorado Springs, Colo.) and four U.S. Marines in Ralph DeQuebec (San Pedro, Calif.), Travis Dodson (Deming, N.M.) Luke McDermott (Westerlo, N.Y.) and Josh Sweeney (Portland, Ore.).

INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS

Over the last four years, the United States has skated to a 43-4-1-3 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record in all competitions over the last four years that includes a Paralympic gold (2018), two world championship medals (gold - 2015; silver - 2017), four-straight Para Hockey Cups (2015, 2016 (Jan.), 2016 (Dec.), 2017), the 2016 IPC Pan-Pacific Championship and the 2018 Turin Para Ice Hockey International Tournament.

Additionally, since 2009, Team USA has reached eight consecutive gold-medal game berths at the Paralympic and World Championship level. In those gold-medal game appearances, the U.S. has posted a 6-2 record while claiming three Paralympic gold medals (2010, 2014, 2018) and three world championship gold medals (2009, 2012, 2015). Its two losses came in world championship play (2013, 2017).

USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS

U.S.-CANADA THREE-GAME WOMEN'S SERIES

USA HOCKEY'S NATIONAL TEAM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Founded in 1996, USA Hockey's National Team Development Program began operations in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and remained there until the summer of 2015. The full-time program is composed of two squads, the U.S. National Under-18 Team and U.S. National Under-17 teams, which compete in the USHL as well as against international and collegiate competition.

The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against NCAA Division I and III opponents, USHL teams as well as competition in three international tournaments.
