September 2019 AAHA Meeting

Proposed amendment to the Policy and Procedure Manual of Arizona Amateur Hockey Association. (This would replace the old Section 16.0 of the existing policy manual)

16.0. Officiating (On-Ice and Off-Ice) Policy

16.1 General.

- 16.1.1 This Officiating Policy applies to all on-ice and off-ice officials, including but not limited to, scorekeepers and referees.
- 16.1.2 All games involving any Member Organization teams shall be officiated by officials registered or otherwise credentialed by USA Hockey. All officials must be screened to the extent required by SafeSport and/or any other rule or policy promulgated by USA Hockey or AAHA.
- 16.1.3 All officials are expected to follow the rules and policies of USA Hockey and AAHA, including but not limited to the USA Hockey Code of Conduct.
- 16.1.4 All officials are expected to cooperate with and support the efforts of AAHA's designated statewide coordinator for assignment and development of officials, USA Hockey's designated State Referee-in-Chief, and any other individual(s) designated by AAHA and/or USA Hockey with respect to officiating.
- 16.1.5 Each official, and his/her respective Officiating Member Organization, shall be accountable to AAHA and any Member Organization to which officiating services are provided, will address any and all issues raised in a timely fashion, and will be subject to the grievance and dispute

resolution procedures set forth in the rules and policies of AAHA and/or USA Hockey.

16.1.6 The Officiating Member Organizations shall be responsible for facilitating and maintaining relations between their respective officials and the Member Organizations, including but not limited to, assisting officials in scheduling of sanctioned ice hockey events and payment of fees by the Member Organizations to the officials.

16.1.7 The integrity of ice hockey depends upon officiating that is consistent and free from bias (both actual and perceived). Therefore, AAHA shall promulgate uniform fee schedules, from time-to-time, that set forth the fees to be charged by the officials to the Member Organizations to which the officials provide officiating services. Such fee schedules shall be promulgated by the Board of Directors with input from the Officiating Member Organizations. Such fee schedules shall also set forth any discounts that may apply as discussed below.

16.2 Scheduling/Tardiness/No-Show.

16.2.1 The Officiating Member Organization shall provide login credentials for the scheduling software to all Member Organizations. This allows all parties to confirm that all games are posted, and Member Organizations are encouraged to utilize the software to confirm that requested games are entered accurately.

16.2.2 Member Organizations must submit all game requests to the designated Officiating Member Organization scheduler for the subject facility. Game requests should be sent via email in Excel or Google Docs format (or as otherwise directed by the scheduler). For tournaments, games should be submitted to the designated tournament scheduler.

16.2.3 Requests for and cancellations of officials must be made at least 48 hours in advance of the game start time. Any requests submitted within 48 hours of the game start time shall be subject to an additional fee per official. Any cancellations within 48 hours of the game start time shall be invoiced for the full game fee. Games canceled due to an act

of God or other exceptional circumstances are not subject to fee. There shall be no fee for cancellation of any AAHA state playoff "if necessary" games.

16.2.4 Officials are required to arrive no later than fifteen (15) minutes before the game start time. Arriving later than fifteen (15) minutes before the game start time but before warm-ups is considered "tardy." Arriving after warm-ups is considered "late." Not arriving at all is considered a "no-show." Fees may be discounted for "tardy," "late," or "no-show" officials as specified in the fee schedules promulgated by AAHA.

16.3 Invoicing/Payment.

16.3.1 On or about the first of each month, the Officiating Member Organization shall submit invoices to the Member Organizations for the games officiated during the preceding month. Member Organizations must pay the invoice, in full, within thirty (30) days of receipt of the invoice. Date of payment shall be determined by the postmarked date of such payment.

16.3.2 Late payment, as determined by the postmarked date, may be subject to a late fee as set forth in the fee schedules promulgated by AAHA and assessed on the next monthly invoice.

16.4 Opt-Out. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary, Member Organizations are permitted to provide their own off-ice officials for youth house and adult leagues provided they have opted-out of such services, in writing, with the Officiating Member Organization. In such event, the Member Organizations shall ensure that the off-ice officials abide by this Policy except with respect to the fees payable to officials, which may be set by the Member Organizations that have opted-out pursuant to this Section 16.4.

Proposed amendment to the Bylaws of Arizona Amateur Hockey Association. (This section would be added to the existing bylaws in Article VIII or possibly another location)

Article VIII. Office of Affiliate Counsel

Section 8.01 As Counsel for AAHA.

The Office of Affiliate Counsel serves as the Chief Legal Officer of AAHA. The Office of Affiliate Counsel represents AAHA in legal proceedings, attends meetings of the Board of Directors and certain committee meetings, has direct access to the Executive Committee, including but not limited to the President, and undertakes such other related tasks as are requested by the Board of Directors and/or President. The Office of Affiliate Counsel functions as an independent authority providing advice and counsel to AAHA, and its officers and directors (to the extent permitted by the governing rules of professional responsibility), regarding all legal matters, including but not limited to regulatory developments and requirements from USA Hockey. The Office of Affiliate Counsel advises the officers and directors on AAHA's governing documents, rules, and other policies and procedures pertaining to the operation of AAHA, including rules, policies, and procedures promulgated by USA Hockey. The Office of Affiliate Counsel reports to the Board of Directors and to the President. The Office of Affiliate Counsel serves at the pleasure of the Board of Directors. The Office of Affiliate Counsel is expected to report to the Board of Directors any concerns regarding the President and other officers to the extent required by the governing rules of professional responsibility. With regard to audits and/or investigations of the President, the Office of Affiliate Counsel reports solely and exclusively to the Board of Directors.

Consistent with the Office of Affiliate Counsel's role in providing advice concerning the rules, policies, and procedures of AAHA and USA Hockey, any Member Organization with a question concerning AAHA's interpretation and/or application of any rules, policies, or procedures promulgated by AAHA or USA Hockey may submit such question, in writing, directly to the President for distribution to the Executive Committee. If the President, after consultation with the Executive Committee, is unable to provide a definitive written answer, the President shall submit the question to the Office of Affiliate Counsel. In such instance, the Office of Affiliate Counsel will respond to the question in writing on behalf of AAHA subject to the governing rules of professional responsibility.

Section 8.02 As Counsel for Member Organizations.

Subject to the governing rules of professional responsibility concerning conflicts of interest, a Member Organization may separately retain the Office of Affiliate Counsel to represent the Member Organization in any legal matter. If an unanticipated conflict of interest between AAHA and the Member Organization arises thereafter, the Office of Affiliate Counsel shall remain as counsel for AAHA, and the Member Organization shall waive the conflict created by the continued representation of AAHA in the matter. In the event of separate representation of the Member Organization by the Office of Affiliate Counsel, the Member Organization shall be responsible for any incurred fees. In no event will AAHA be financially responsible for any services provided by the Office of Affiliate Counsel to any such Member Organization under this Section 8.02.

Disciplinary Report
August/September 2019

The Discipline Committee met on Tuesday August 13, 2019. There was one Match Penalty on the agenda.

1. A player from the Gilbert Adult League was assessed a match penalty under USA Hockey rule 615 (c) for removal of helmet during an altercation. After the player was slashed in the shins he turned and grab the player by the helmet, took it off and threw two punches. The video clearly showed what happened. The suspension was 3 weeks.

The Disciplinary Committee met on Tuesday August 27, 2019. There was one Match Penalty on the agenda.

1. A player from The Chandler Adult League was assessed a match penalty under USA Hockey rule 615 (c) for removal of helmet during an altercation. In a scrum in front of the net a player removed the helmet of an opponent. He was removed from the scrum by an official and the took his own helmet off along with his elbow pads and jumped back in the scrum throwing punches at players from the other team. He was given a suspension of 8 games.

The Disciplinary Committee met on Monday September 9, 2019. There were four match penalties on the agenda.

1. A player for the Corona D2 high school team was assessed a match penalty under USA Hockey rule 615 (c) for removal of helmet during an altercation. The player was crossed checked from the back and fell to the ice with the player falling on top of him. When they got up to their feet the Corona player grabbed the player's helmet by pulling it forward from the back of the helmet. The officials separated the players. The Corona player received a one-month suspension from playing in games.
2. A player from the Horizon High School team was assessed a match penalty under USA Hockey rule 615 (c) for removal of helmet during an altercation. Two players engaged in a scrum and were receiving delayed minor penalties when the Horizon player grabbed his opponent by the helmet and removed it from the player's head. The officials separated the two players with no further incidents. The Horizon player received a one-month suspension from playing in games.
3. A player from the Pinnacle High School team was assessed a match penalty under USA Hockey rule 615 (c) for removal of helmet during an altercation. Two players engaged in a scrum behind the Cactus Shadows' net. The Pinnacle player grab the Cactus Shadows' player around the head and removed his helmet. The officials intervned before any additional penalties were committed. The Pinnacle player received a one-month suspension from playing in games.
4. A player from the Chandler Adult league was assessed a match penalty under USA Hockey rule 601 (f1) deliberate physical assault or attempting to do so to any game official. The player, a goaltender, was clearing the puck from the front of his net. As per the video, he turned on a right angle to face the official who was standing along the boards and fired the puck that hit the glass approximately one to two feet from the official's head. As per USA Hockey rules, the

penalty was reviewed by Ken Reinhard, the Rocky Mountain District Referee-in-Chief. After reviewing the report, videos and interviewing the officials, Mr. Reinhard determined that the penalty was properly assessed. After reviewing all the materials presented to the Committee and listening to the player give his description of the event, the Committee determined that a six-month suspension was appropriate.

This concludes my report for August/September 2019.

Abuse of Officials (Message from Rocky Mountain District Referee in Chief)

It is no secret that abuse of officials is the number one reason officials walk away from hockey (and all sports). You have seen the recent USA Hockey magazine article (copy attached) addressing the issue. To be sure, everyone is concerned and is wanting to do something about it. The Atlantic and Central Districts have enacted very tough, stringent policies and practices to address the issue head on. A review of all game misconduct penalties district wide over the last 30 days shows that 18 out of 44 assessed game misconducts (40%) were for Abuse of Officials.

Our district is also in full support of changing the culture. I reviewed this recently with RMD personnel on a district wide conference call. To that end, here is how we have agreed to handle abuse of officials issues within the RMD going forward.

- Rule 601a1 and 601b1 are to be assessed as required
 - o These are minor penalties assessed for disputing the rulings/decisions of an officials
 - o Officials are encouraged to answer reasonable questions and be respectful
 - The decision to participate in a conversation rests with the official
 - Such conversations should occur efficiently and without delaying the game
- Once obscene, profane, abusive, or vulgar language is introduced to the dispute
 - o Players shall be assessed a 10-minute misconduct under Rule 601c2
 - Official is not required to assess minor penalty first
 - o Coaches are to be assessed a bench minor under Rule 601b2
- If a player/coach continues a dispute the official shall follow proper penalty progression as established in Rule 601

As to how this issue relates to spectators, this is the procedure officials should follow:

- Stop the game and request the offending spectator to stop their behavior
 - o Directive from official directly to spectator. Not a discussion
 - Example: "Your behavior is inappropriate and if you do not stop immediately you will be asked to leave the facility"
- If spectator continues:
 - o Official shall go to score table and request rink personnel to address issue and remove offender
 - o Game clock will be stopped
 - If a curfew game the curfew will still be enforced
- If rink personnel do not show or refuse to remove offender, the officials shall do the following until the spectator is removed:
 - o Retire directly to their dressing room
 - o If unsafe to go to dressing room officials shall sit in the penalty bench
- The officials shall return to the ice and resume the game once the offending spectator has been removed

- When there is a spectator issue where the officials need to take any of the above actions it is expected the officials will email Ken Reinhard (ken@kkjreinhard.net) directly with a cc to Bryan Eisentraut (Bryan.Eisentraut@gmail.com)
 - o Detailed account of the spectator's behavior
 - o Detailed account of the official's actions
 - o Game information: date, time, location, level, teams, etc.

Officials are not paid to have “thick skin” or to ignore obvious abusive behavior. Officials are on the ice to officiate a hockey game. If we want new officials to have a positive experience and to keep existing officials involved then we have to enforce the rules, threat disrespect with respect, and be a catalyst to change the culture.

Mass Exodus Of Young Officials Threatens The Future Of The Game

An exodus of qualified officials could potentially have a dramatic impact on the game at many levels.

IKE SO MANY PIONEERS in the game, Kevin Collins is proud of the past.

So as the keynote speaker at the inaugural USA Hockey Advanced Officiating Symposium, the hall of fame official spent the first half of his speech paying homage to those who helped usher in the early days of officiating education.

But suddenly the legendary NHL linesman shifted gears and challenged those in attendance to look to the future by protecting the next generation of officials against the verbal and physical abuse from parents and coaches.

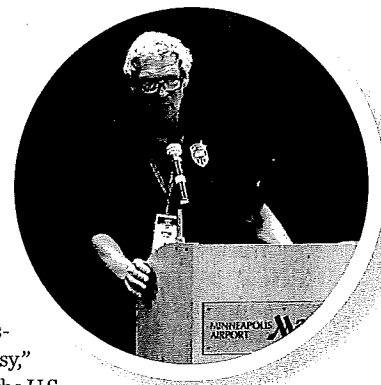
Sitting idly by and watching the mass exodus of talented young whistle blowers could

not only risk the next generation of promising officials, but could plunge the future of the game into uncertainty.

"The past is positive, but the present and the future are not quite as rosy," said Collins, who was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame in 2017.

"Abuse by coaches and parents is taking its toll on young and old officials alike. This is not a regional issue but a national one."

To help stem the tide of officials leaving the game, Collins called on the 250 high-level officials in attendance at the symposium to take matters into their own hands by providing support and serving as mentors to those just starting out in the game.

"I'm asking you to do your part to help save our game and the future of it," Collins implored the crowd. "I'm asking you to take this message back to your local associations and convince your leagues to reach out to coaches and parents and to hold them accountable."

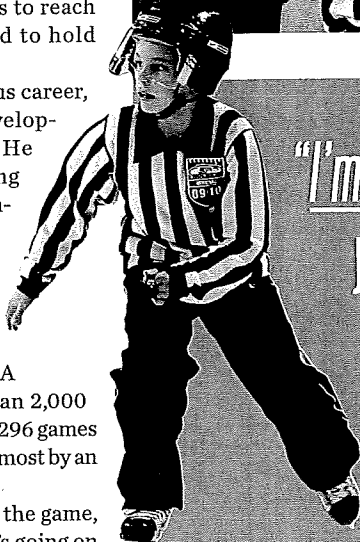
Over the course of his illustrious career, Collins was a pioneer in the development of officiating education. He helped create the first officiating school in the U.S., along with summer development camps, and its officiating manual series, both of which remain core components of USA Hockey's Officiating Development Program.

In addition to his time with USA Hockey, Collins worked more than 2,000 NHL games as a linesman, and his 296 games in the Stanley Cup playoffs are the most by an American official.

Even after years removed from the game, Collins keeps a close eye on what's going on in the sport, and what he sees has caused him considerable distress.

He said that most local officiating programs help young officials navigate the ever-increasing negativity being directed at them from the bench. It's when they leave the ice that there have been a growing number of confrontations with irate parents that are driving many into thinking that officiating is not worth the aggravation.

"We all have heard stories of officials being confronted by irate parents as they leave the ice after a game, whether it's a game at 6 o'clock in the morning or 6 at night," Collins said. "You need to be there

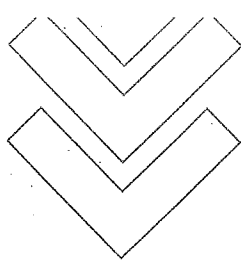
for them. You need to take care of these young officials."

Collins cited situations where local tournaments around the country have had to scale back on the number of games they can hold for lack of qualified officials. This is not just a hockey problem but something that is plaguing so many youth sports.

Dennis LaRue has seen that firsthand. After retiring as an NHL referee in 2016, LaRue became the president of the Spokane American Youth Hockey Association. Youth hockey organizations all across the country spend a lot of time recruiting and training

young referees. And when they leave the game due to the verbal abuse heaped upon them, it starts the cycle all over again.

"When we recruit kids and we get them involved, that's a win for everybody," LaRue said. "But when we lose them because they're sick and tired of being yelled at or berated, that's a loss for everybody because we have to start off with a new recruit who has to go through the same learning curve as a youngster who already has a year or two under his or her belt. We already have time and energy invested in that person and when they walk away you have to start all over again."



Bad behavior at NHL games has spilled over into the youth hockey arenas, and is driving young officials out of the game.



According to USA Hockey registration data, 33 percent of all registered officials leave the game each year, and almost 50 percent of first-year officials don't return for their second season. The main reasons they cite are local politics that keep them from getting enough games, and the constant berating from coaches and parents.

"We really have to step back and recognize that young referees out there are learning the game just like the players are learning the game," said Andy McElman, another retired NHL linesman who is still active in the game in his hometown of Chicago.

"We have to step back and appreciate that when these referees step on the ice, that is their practice. That's the only time they get to get better at the craft of officiating whereas the players may have one or two practices throughout the week and play games on the weekend."

As was mentioned many times during symposium, USA Hockey has long prided itself as the gold standard among youth sports organizations. And now is the time for the organization and those in it to help reign in the insanity that is impacting the entire sporting community.

"This is not a hockey problem. This is a youth sports and societal problem," Collins said. "So, let's be the first to be a leader in youth sports and show soccer, baseball and basketball that we are determined to take a stand against the bullying of young officials." ☆

REFS IN A ROOM

> Inaugural Officiating Symposium Inspires Those In Stripes To Get Better And Give Back

THERE'S A REASON Kevin Collins is considered the dean of American officials and only the second man to wear stripes inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame. Fourteen years after hanging up his whistle, his passion for the game still burns bright as he speaks with the voice of experience that carried him to the pinnacle of the profession.

"Every day you don't try to get better you lose the opportunity to be the best," Collins said during his keynote speech at the inaugural USA Hockey Advanced Officiating Symposium.

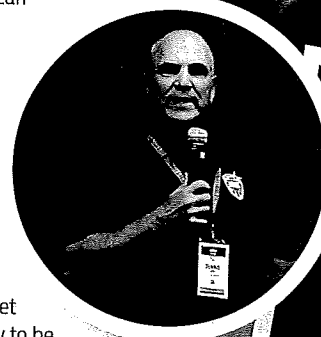
And judging from the turnout inside the packed ballroom, that thought was not lost on the 250 experienced grassroots officials who came to town to improve their own skills and understanding of the game.

The three-day celebration of all things in stripes was an opportunity for USA Hockey to thank those grassroots officials for the dedication they've shown to the game while helping them achieve "tenured" status, which brings with it reduced registration requirements and fees.

The weekend featured a stable of some of the most notable American whistleblowers in the game, including former NHL officials such as Collins, Dennis LaRue, Andy McElman along with current NHL peacekeepers Chris Rooney, Brian Murphy and Bryan Pancich.

Presenters touched on a variety of topics ranging from establishing rapport with coaches to proper positioning to knowing the difference between hope and courage when it comes to making the right call on the ice.

They shared their own experiences about reaching the top, sprinkling in humorous stories about life in the NHL while leaving the room with a message of humility and integrity and paving the way for the next generation to achieve their goals.



A wide variety of top speakers, including Joy Johnston, top, Dennis LaRue, left and Dave LaBuda made the inaugural USA Hockey Advanced Officiating Symposium a worthwhile event.

It was a message that seemed to resonate with each ref in the room.

"We have to give back to the game and help to inspire up-and-coming officials, just as we were inspired this week," said Jacqueline Zee Howard, a college official in Washington, D.C.

It wasn't just the participants who walked away with a renewed sense of purpose. National Referee-in-Chief Dave LaBuda said the weekend far exceeded his expectations and gave him hope in the face of some disturbing trends in the game.

"I was encouraged by the number of officials who were interested enough to take the time away from their families during the summer to come here," LaBuda said.

"Their continued interest in officiating and in USA Hockey has re-energized me and proven to me that in spite of the growing hostility in the hockey world, officials are very much committed to trying to become better and make the game better."
