COACH RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Coaches and Trainers must obtain proper certification.
2. One member of each team's coaching staff must attend the Zone coach's meeting as scheduled. (\$75.00 fine)
3. The Coach, bench personnel and players must maintain proper conduct at all times (i.e. before, during and after games. (OLA Constitution B7.01)
4. The Coach must ensure, particularly, that proper conduct of the team is exercised on the floor.
5. If a Coach is going to be late for a game, due to unforeseen circumstances, he should attempt to contact the Arena and notify the appropriate people. (If the start of the game is delayed for more than fifteen minutes, the appropriate fine will be levied.)
6. The Coach, Manager or Head timekeeper must notify the Division Convenor and Zone Scheduler of the outcome of any **play-off game**, immediately after the conclusion of that game by e-mail. (fine \$25.00)
7. If a team has both Home and Away Uniforms, the Coach must have both available for all games, and ensure that his team is dressed in their non-conflicting Colors prior to game time.
8. The Coach must notify his/her Association Representative, to contact the Zone Director and Ref-in-Chief, if neutral referees are to be requested for any play-off games. (Referee mileage fees to be paid by the requesting team.)
9. The Coach must be familiar with the rules and regulations as set down by the C.L.A., O.L.A. and the Zone, and instruct his/her players in the proper playing of the game of Lacrosse, to the best of his/her ability.
10. **Ensure that the teams shake hands** (prior to the start of the game or at the end).
11. The use of a suspended player in a game, will result in the game being forfeited, the Coach being suspended for at least one game and the player still having to sit out his/her suspension.
 - Suspensions must be served in consecutive games, including Zone games and all O.L.A. sanctioned tournaments.
 - Suspended players or coaches may not be added to game sheets in a higher (or same) division to "use up" suspensions.
 - Suspended players' or coach's names must appear on the team list in the appropriate location, in order that the Convenor will count it as a game served. Failure to note the name on the "game sheet" will result in the game will not counting as the suspension having been served.
 - The Zone GSI Administrator must be advised of any tournaments that the team is attending, in order to document suspensions being served or new suspensions received.
12. Team Officials will be brought in for a meeting, when their team has accumulated four reportable suspensions (i.e. Gross or Match penalties), to determine where the problem lies, so that a suitable solution might be reached.
13. With GSI all bench Staff the game must sign the "game sheet". (Remove names of those not in attendance)
14. If a team incurs an excessive number of penalty minutes in one game (excluding misconduct's), the "Coach-in-charge" will be suspended for the next game;
 - Tyke, Novice & Peewee - 26 minutes or more. *
 - Bantam, Midget & Intermediate - 36 minutes or more. *

PLAYER RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. The Player must obey all rules and regulations as set down by the C.L.A., O.L.A., Zone and Association, and show respect and courtesy to coaching staff, referees, minor officials and spectators at all times. (OLA Constitution B7.01)
2. After a player has received two reportable suspensions (i.e. Gross or Match penalties), he/she will be called to a meeting, along with a coach, to determine his/her future in Lacrosse. A third reportable offence will result in the player being suspended for an indefinite period of time, until the player has demonstrated his/her desire to play Lacrosse in a more acceptable manner.
3. Any player not attending a discipline committee hearing, will be suspended until he/she makes arrangements with the Zone Director and attends another hearing.

BENCH STAFF:

1. Ensure that all bench personnel are properly certified. (A first year minor coach / bench personnel must have successfully completed the Community Development Clinic and completed the accompanying workbook by December 31st of the same year; in the 2nd year, all coaches coaching Peewee and below need to be Community Coach Development 'trained'. All coaches coaching Bantam and above would need to take the Competitive Introduction clinic and be 'in Training' or 'Trained', (for Clinics prior to 2023 the workbook must be completed by September 2024 or the Comp. Intro Clinic must be taken again.)
2. Trainers must have current, OLA approved, certification.
3. A copy of the Zone Guidelines is provided for each team in their Association on an annual basis; (these guidelines will be handed out at the Zone 9 coaches' meeting.)
4. Ensure that one member of the bench personnel from each team, is in attendance at the Zone coaches' meeting; (date, location and time to be set annually.)
Note: Fine for non-attendance at Zone coach's meeting - \$75.00 per team
5. **Complete and submit a Non-Zone Game form for any exhibition game played outside the regular Zone Schedule, failure to do so and competing in the 'unsanctioned' game will result in a fine of \$100.00 and the bench personnel suspended until dealt with.** (the form is available on the OLA & Zone websites)
6. **Concussion Awareness:** Concussions can occur while participating in any sport or recreational activity. Since the circumstances under which a concussion can be sustained are so varied, it's important for all coaches, parents, and athletes to be aware of the signs, symptoms, and what to do if a concussion occurs. Completion of this CLA on-line seminar is a mandatory requirement for all bench personnel: <https://www.lacrosse.ca/content/making-head-way> (2019)

REGISTRATION

Coach or Manager must ensure that all players on the team are registered properly. Prior to attending any Tournament, you must have the players and bench staff registration forms with all necessary signatures (Club, Zone, OLA). Failure to produce the completed forms at the tournament will result in the player / bench staff being denied the opportunity to participate in that tournament.

RELEASE APPEALS

Players must be registered for the current season, prior to applying for a release.

A: ZONE RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. The Zone Director must have all appropriate documentation relating to the appeal.
2. The Zone Director will appoint an Appeals Committee to deal with any matters relating to an appeal of a player release or game suspension.
3. Zone appeal dates will be established and published annually.
4. The Appeals Committee shall consist of;
 - Chairperson
 - A minimum of two other members and possibly three, (with no conflict of interest)
5. The committee will be provided with all relevant data and interview all parties involved. The Chairperson shall ensure that the decision of the committee be presented to the Zone membership. This would happen at the meeting in which the Appeal is being heard by the Appeals Committee. Subject to OLA Rules and Regulation OR I I.I must be followed and CLA rules, regulations and guidelines.
6. **OR11.1 – Zone / League Level Hearings**
 - a) All appeals must be filed within 5 business days of the receipt, in writing, of the decision being appealed. The fee for the appeal may not exceed \$100.
 - b) Payment must be made prior to the start of the hearing.
 - c) The hearing will be heard by a minimum of 3 people one of whom will act as the Chair
 - d) Within 5 Business days of the hearing, all parties must receive a written decision which includes the following:
 - i) Issue in question
 - ii) Statement of the facts
 - iii) Decision
 - iv) Reason for the decision
 - v) Appeals Process information
 - e) If the written decision is not received within 5 business days of the conclusion of the hearing, the appellant shall automatically have their request granted and the Zone/League will be considered to have no grounds for an appeal. The Respondent will not lose their right to appeal.

In the event that a release is granted at any level, this 2-page form must be attached to the player's new registration form as proof of his/her release.

PLAYING UNIFORM

Color Change and Conflict of Colors

Each Association within the Zone currently has recognized Team Colours. If a change of Team Colors is contemplated, it first must have Zone approval. If team colours are changed without Zone approval, a fine of \$200.00 will be assessed.

ZONE RESPONSIBILITIES:

The Zone must meet with the Association requesting a Color change, to ensure that there will be no conflicts with other Association Colors. If a conflict occurs, the change will be denied.

ASSOCIATION RESPONSIBILITIES:

- The Association must discuss, with the Zone, any contemplated Color change to their playing uniform. (Zone approval is required before a change may be made.)
- The Association must be aware of current Color conflicts and if they have Home and Away Uniforms, be prepared to wear their non-conflicting Colors regardless of the location of play.

COACHES RESPONSIBILITIES

- The Coaching Staff must be aware of current Color conflicts and be prepared to wear their alternate uniform, if they have one, regardless of the location of play.

PLAYING UNIFORM - APPEARANCE

Note: All players, on the same team, will wear a uniform style and color of shorts.

GAME CANCELLATIONS

Game-day cancellations are only acceptable under the following circumstances:

1. Arena is unavailable. (i.e. double booking by arena staff)
2. Floor is unsafe to play on. (i.e. wet and slippery). Arena staff will make this decision early in the day. At game time it will be the Referee's decision.

Note: Cancellations will not be permitted due to players being on holiday.

Procedure:

1. A designated Club Rep must immediately notify everyone concerned, (i.e. Opponents, Zone Director, Referee Assignor, Referee-in-Chief, Scheduler, Convenor), of the cancellation and the reason
2. Game cancellations (other than those listed above) must be arranged more than 72 hours prior to the scheduled game time, to allow sufficient time to notify everyone involved. This will be subject to a **\$200.00 rescheduling fee**.
3. Game cancellations with less than 72 hours notice before the game will be treated as a "No-Show" and the appropriate fines levied.

A. ZONE RESPONSIBILITIES:

- The Zone Scheduler will notify the Zone Director, Zone Referee-in-Chief, Zone Division Convenor and OLA Ratings Coordinator of the rescheduled game, after consultation with both Association Reps involved.

B. ASSOCIATION RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. The Association Representatives must ensure that the Zone Scheduler, Referee Assignor, Zone Director, the appropriate division Convenor and the opposing team's Association representative has been notified if a game is to be cancelled.
2. This notification must be made within the set time guidelines to avoid fines.
3. The Association Representative must confer with the opposing team's Association Representative and the Zone Scheduler in order to reschedule the game to a mutually agreeable time.

C. COACHES RESPONSIBILITIES:

- The Coach must notify his/her Association Representative if a game is to be cancelled.
- **Coaches are not permitted to cancel games or reschedule games!**

Notes:

- In the event that a team is unable to play the rescheduled game, after previously, mutually agreeing to the reschedule, a forfeit will be awarded to the opposing team and the appropriate fines levied, plus costs incurred for; floor time, referees, minor officials, etc.
- In the event that a game has to be cancelled, the Referee Assignor must be personally contacted. **A message on an answering machine is not adequate notification.**
- In keeping with the above ruling, an e-mail is also not adequate notification. You must speak to the assignor to ensure that the message will be relayed to the referees in sufficient time that they are not going to the arena for that game. If there is not sufficient time to prevent the referees from attending, costs will be assessed.

ZONE GAME PLAY

ZONE RESPONSIBILITIES:

The Zone will annually notify all Associations of the game play and penalty guide-lines that are in effect, with instructions to notify their coaches and executive that these are to be enforced. This pertains to Zone regulations and is in addition to all current O.L.A. and C.L.A. Rules.

LENGTH OF GAMES:

U7 - PEANUT/PAPERWEIGHT – All games must be curfewed 60 minutes from the scheduled start time. (In order that they don't hold up League games that follow.)

U9 - TYKE Three fifteen-minute periods, the last two minutes of the third period to be stop-time. (No 30 second rule in U9)

U11 - NOVICE Three fifteen-minute periods, the last two minutes of the third period to be stop-time. (30 second rule in effect)

U13 - PEEWEE Three fifteen-minute periods, the last five minutes of the third period to be stop-time. (30 second rule in effect)

U15 - BANTAM Three fifteen-minute periods, the last five minutes of the third period to be stop-time. (30 second rule in effect)

U17 - MIDGET Three fifteen-minute periods, the last ten minutes of the third period to be stop-time. (30 second rule in effect)

U22 - INTERMEDIATE (same as for Midget)

- Games at all levels must have three minutes rest between periods.
- Stop time may only be waived by mutual agreement of the coaches.
- In the event that a game start-time has been delayed due to a team arriving late, the length of periods may be altered in order that subsequent games do not exceed the time allotted by the arena for that night.

LENGTH OF SEASON:

- Regular season games must be completed two weeks prior to the respective division Provincials.
- If Zone playoffs cannot be completed in one week for that division, then the regular season must be shortened for that specific age division. (i.e. The first two divisions, with Provincials on the Civic Holiday weekend, may have to finish their regular season games before divisions with later Provincials.)

ZONE PLAY-OFF FORMAT

1. All Zone playoffs must be completed within the two week period immediately prior to their respective division Provincials.
2. Teams that are OLA rated "A" in U13, U15 and U17 divisions, will be matched against the same for playoffs. If there is only one "A" team in any of these divisions, the Championship shall be awarded automatically and no playoffs shall take place.
3. Wherever possible, teams shall play within their respective OLA rating category.
4. Teams must be prepared to play at any time during playoffs (i.e. the next game may be set for the next day).
5. Cancellation of, or "no-show" at any playoff game will result in forfeiture of the game by the offending team. (Appropriate fine)
6. No playoff games will be played after Provincial Championships (except in situations due to extenuating circumstances).
7. The team finishing highest in the standings as of the July playoff meeting, will have the home arena advantage, for the Championship game in that category.
Note: Due to the unequal number of games being played, ranking will be determined by dividing the team's points by the number of games played by that team, to get the highest average
8. The "Home team", in all playoff games, will be responsible for phoning/e-mailing the results to the Scheduler and GSI Administrator on the night of the game. (Fine - \$25.00)

A. ZONE CHAMPIONSHIPS:

- Two-team playoffs will be (2 out of 3) or (3 out of 5) series, as time permits.
- Three or more teams will be played as a Round-Robin, with the top two teams playing a one-game final.

B. TIEBREAKER FORMULA (C.L.A.)

- In the event of a tie in the standings, the record between the two teams will determine the winner. (A tie is defined as; having the same number of points, derived from an equal number of games played.)
- If a tie still exists, the goal average formula (below) will be used. Only the goals scored in games between the two teams shall be taken into consideration for this calculation.
- If a tie still exists the goal average formula will be used, taking into consideration all games played in the series.
- If a tie still exists, the team with the greatest number of assists during the whole season shall be declared the winner.

Formula:
$$\frac{\text{GOALS FOR}}{(\text{GOALS FOR} + \text{GOALS AGAINST})} = \text{GOAL AVERAGE}$$

LENGTH OF PLAY-OFF GAMES:

In Zone playoff games, the regulation game times are still in effect, with the addition of overtime periods in the event of a tie game. Ten minute, stop-time, "sudden victory" periods will be played with the team scoring the first goal declared to be the winner.

Note: In Round-robin games, a tie stands and no overtime will be played, (Except in the championship game.)

Club Reps are responsible to notify Minor Officials if games are Round-Robin or Series playoffs, and they can advise the referees in case of a tie.

ZONE 9 FINES

A: ASSOCIATIONS

- 1. No-Show or late Cancellation - \$100.00 (plus Referee fees & floor time)
 - 2. Game Cancellation (72 hrs.+)-\$200.00 (Rescheduling fee)
 - 3. Forfeit - \$300.00 (Team suspended and Association voting rights cancelled until paid)
 - 4. Late Start * (15 to 30 minutes) - 50% additional referee's fees - (excluding mileage, * more than 30 minutes treated as a "no show", costs to be paid by the offending team)
 - 5. Gross Misconduct - \$40.00
 - 6. Match Penalty - \$40.00
 - 7. Game Misconduct (Coach) - \$25.00
 - 8. Game Misconduct (Player) - \$10.00
 - 9. 10 Minute Misconduct - No fine
 - 10. Major Penalty (5 min.) - \$10.00
 - 11. Late team list (to Statistician) - \$50.00 (Forms provided)
 - 12. Final list by June 15th - \$50.00 (Forms provided)
 - 13. Late Playoff results notification - \$25.00 (Home team) (**to Scheduler**)
 - 14. Non-attendance at Zone Meetings- \$100.00 (first offence), and doubling for each subsequent offence during the year
 - 15. Debts not paid prior to OLA-AGM - \$100.00 + Association will be suspended and voting rights cancelled until all debts are paid
- Debts not paid prior to Dec. 31st may result in suspension of the entire club for the following season.***
- 16. Graduated Suspensions (except fighting):
 - 2nd suspension - 3 games + \$35.00 fine
 - 3rd suspension - Discipline Hearing + \$50.00 mandatory fee
 - 17. Fighting Suspensions:
 - 1st or 2nd offence - Balance of game + 1 game suspension + fine
 - 3rd offence - Discipline Hearing + \$50.00 mandatory fee + fine

2024 ONTARIO LACROSSE “INTER-ZONE-GAME” GUIDELINES

Inter-Zone single games are not part of a team’s approved Zone schedule, that are meant to enhance Zone schedules and encourage participation during the minor box season.

Inter-Zone Games may be scheduled for weekdays or weekends, including holiday weekends, depending on the schedule of the host association and the availability of officials. For officiating assignments and availability, regularly scheduled minor, junior and senior box lacrosse games and tournaments take priority over Inter-Zone Games. Officiating fees are required to be paid at the provincial rate under the current agreement schedule.

Inter-Zone Games may be requested by a hosting association according to the following guidelines:

1. Inter-Zone Games may not be used to serve suspensions, and suspended participants (coaches and players) may not take part in Inter-Zone Games.
2. Inter-Zone requests must be submitted at least fourteen (14) calendar days in advance of the proposed date using [this form](#). Forms which are incomplete will not be approved.
3. Approval of Inter-Zone Games will be issued within five (5) business days from the request submission date. Zone approval is required for both participating teams.
4. Recovery of costs (floor time, officials, etc.) are to be divided equally between participating teams.
5. Game Sheet Inc. must be used to record Inter-Zone Games. Game outcomes will be included as part of MyLAX rankings and count towards the team’s minimum number of games which are required to be played in order to qualify for Provincial Championship entry.
6. For situations not covered under these guidelines, a determination may be made by the OLA VP Minor in consultation with the host Zone Director and at least one other member of Minor Council.
7. Cancellation of an approved Inter-Zone Game will be subject to a fine of up to \$500.00 to the team who initiates the cancellation, payable to their opponent within 48 hours of decision or prior to the next scheduled game (whichever comes first). The fine amount is determined by the VP Minor.

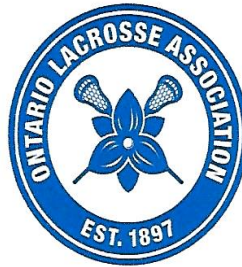
BLOCKED DATES

- U13A, U15A and U17A teams may not schedule Inter-Zone Games between the first and second weekends of “A” Qualifiers competition without approval of the “A” Qualifiers Coordinator, in addition to the Zone Directors.
- Inter-Zone Games may not be scheduled prior to the fourth Wednesday in April.
- Inter-Zone Games may not be played with less than seven (7) calendar days prior to the team’s first date of Provincial competition.
- Inter-Zone Games take scheduled priority over both EPIC and Team Ontario Lacrosse events where that division is participating.

2024 OLA Inter-Zone Game Request

All organizers of minor box interzone games are required to follow the Ontario Lacrosse Association's rules and regulations related to games played outside of their zone's regular schedule. These regulations apply to all games, including exhibition games, interlock games, Fun Days and any other games that do not appear on the approved Zone schedule throughout the season.

This request form must be submitted at least fourteen (14) days in advance of the game.

ONTARIO LACROSSE AUTOMATIC MINOR BOX DISCIPLINE POLICY (2024)

The Ontario Lacrosse Association's Automatic Discipline Policy is in effect for all participants (players, bench personnel, volunteers) of the U7, U9, U11, U13, U15, U17, U22 and corresponding girls' and womens' divisions of OLA box lacrosse, whether or not the team's participants are "dressed" for the game or event, when attending any OLA-sanctioned events. All fines and suspensions are automatic once they have been recorded on the OLA game sheet and signed off by the officials. It is the sole responsibility of the penalized team to adhere to the OLA's Automatic Minor Discipline Policy throughout the entire season; regardless of whether or not the team has been formally notified by zone or tournament representatives.

Discipline is assessed according to the appropriate division charts, using the following guidelines:

1. For U7, U9, U11 and U13 participants, discipline will be assessed according to the attached chart on Page 4. For U15, U17 and U22 participants, discipline will be assessed according to the attached chart on Page 5. For U13 players who are competing as Affiliated Players in the U15 Division, discipline will be assessed according to the U15, U17 and U22 chart.
2. Each participant's suspension record is maintained by the Zone Statistician (or designated zone executive) for the duration of the season.
3. Each participant's suspension is served in subsequent OLA-sanctioned previously scheduled exhibition, regular season, playoff and/or championship games until the suspension has been served in full, regardless of which calendar year the infraction occurred. Suspensions that are not served in the calendar year (by reason of injury, release, transfer, roster allocations or any other case) will be carried over to any subsequent season of involvement, regardless in which division the suspension was assessed.
4. Automatic indefinite suspension until a hearing chaired by the appropriate representative will be in effect for any Gross Misconducts and/or Match Penalty.
5. For suspensions assessed to an affiliated player competing for a higher category team, the suspension will be served in the division in which the player is registered, and the player is ineligible to participate in any capacity at any level until the suspension is served in its entirety.
6. With the exception of Clause 10, any non-playing bench personnel who are disciplined under this policy must serve their suspension with the team with which they received their suspension, and the individual is ineligible to participate in any capacity at any level until the suspension is served in its entirety.
7. Suspended participants may not compete while a suspension is under protest/appeal/review.
8. Suspended participants may not be at any arena during OLA games until their suspension has been served in its entirety. For violation of this section, Automatic OLA Review will result.
9. Discipline assessed in zone play that will result in a Zone/IT Hearing will be chaired by the Zone Director (or appointed representative). Discipline assessed in exhibition play or non-zone play that will result in a Zone/IT Hearing will be chaired by the Zone Director (or appointed representative)

in which the game took place. Discipline assessed in an invitational tournament that will result in a Zone/IT Hearing will be chaired by the Tournament Convener (or appointed representative). Discipline assessed in an "A" Qualifier or Provincial Championship that will result in a Zone/IT Hearing will be chaired by the appropriate event chairperson (or appointed representative).

10. The head coach of any team who accumulates 26 penalty minutes in U11 or below, or 36 penalty minutes in U13 or above, will receive an automatic game misconduct in accordance with the OLA's Total Penalty Minutes Policy. Zone Directors and Tournament Convenors are responsible for administering this policy. Where the teams's head coach is improperly listed as an assistant coach to circumvent this rule, the game will be forfeited and a fine will be assessed.
11. Discipline that results in fines incurred at tournaments, "A" Qualifiers and Provincial Championships will be payable to the Ontario Lacrosse Association. Discipline that results in fines incurred in exhibition, zone or non-zone play will be payable to the zone in which the infraction occurred in. Associations have 30 days from the date of receipt of the OLA invoice to ensure that payment for any fine has been received in full.
12. Players assessed GM45A (Fighting), GM45C (Restarting a Fight) or GM45D (Fighting Off the Playing Surface) during any Tournament, "A" Qualifier or Provincial Championship will be subject to the discipline as outlined in the appropriate chart, in addition to being disqualified from any further play in that Invitational Tournament, "A" Qualifier or Provincial Championship in any division.
13. Non-playing team personnel who are assessed a game misconduct for verbal abuse directed towards an official (GM28) during any Tournament, "A" Qualifier or Provincial Championship will be subject to the discipline as outlined in the appropriate chart, in addition to being disqualified from any further play in that Invitational Tournament, "A" Qualifier or Provincial Championship in any division.
14. Participants who confront or engage with spectators off the playing surface will be subject to a fine of up to \$1000 dollars, plus any accumulated fines from penalties assessed, as well as an automatic five-game suspension, provided an official report is submitted to the OLA.
15. Teams involved in any "bench clearing" situation (defined as two or more players leaving either team's bench and/or penalty box in order to engage in an altercation on or off the floor) will be subject to a fine of up to \$1000 dollars plus any accumulated fines from penalties assessed, as well as an automatic OLA Review to determine the appropriate discipline for the bench staff.
16. Teams involved in any pre-game or post-game altercations (defined as actions which would result in penalties being assessed during the game, whether on or off the floor) will be subject to a fine of up to \$1000 dollars plus any accumulated fines from penalties assessed, as well as an automatic OLA Review to determine the appropriate discipline for the bench personnel.
17. Participants who return to competition prior to serving their suspension will be subject to a fine of up to \$1000 plus any accumulated fines from penalties assessed, as well as an automatic three-game suspension in addition to the balance of the original suspension. If any team personnel are determined to have been involved in directing the participant to return to competition prior to serving their suspension, an OLA Review will be scheduled to determine the appropriate discipline, including forfeiture of the game at the discretion of the OLA.
18. Zone Directors, Tournament Directors or other representatives may not, under any circumstances, intervene in a discipline matter to modify, reduce, vacate or otherwise alter the discipline policy

without the written permission of the OLA VP of Minor Box (or appointed designate).

19. Associations and/or teams failing to adhere to the Ontario Lacrosse Association Automatic Minor Discipline Policy may be subject to additional sanctions, based on the nature of the violation and any other mitigating circumstances deemed relevant by the Ontario Lacrosse Association, which may include one or a combination of additional suspensions assessed; additional fines assessed; forfeiture of the team's games; forfeiture of the team's provincial championship series; forfeiture of the association's performance bond; any other discipline as deemed appropriate at the discretion of the OLA's VP of Minor Box (or appointed designate), in consultation with the appropriate Zone Director (referred to as "OLA Review").
20. In addition to these guidelines, participants are governed by the OLA's policies, procedures, bylaws, rules, regulations, including the specified discipline charts on the following pages. Protests/appeals of any OLA Automatic Minor Discipline or any other policy are subject the guidelines of the OLA Appeals Process. Protests/appeals may not be lodged on behalf of a team for suspensions of five games or less, or for fines of \$100 or less. Only the OLA's VP of Minor (or appointed designate) reserves the right to intervene in discipline matters based on the best interest of the game.

Notwithstanding any of these guidelines, the OLA's Board of Directors may fine a club or team in any sum not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1000.00), or may suspend or expel a club, team, member or player for notorious and continued foul play, or unfair, unsportsmanlike, ungentlemanly conduct, individually or collectively, on the field or at any place where a lacrosse match is being played, or at any meeting or gathering in the interest of the game, for neglecting to pay assessments made by the Board of Directors or for rules of the Corporation, for neglecting to obey or carry out any persistent infringement of the laws of the game, or the rules of the Corporation, for neglecting to obey or carry out any order of the Board of Directors transmitted by the President or Executive Director. (MR10.01)

Note 1: Automatic OLA Review is defined as an indefinite suspension to the participant until a ruling has been issued by the chair of the discipline committee, which may include a hearing.

Note 2: Protests/appeals may not be lodged on behalf of an individual or team for suspensions of five games or less, or for fines of \$100 or less.

Note 3: For second offense players and non-playing bench staff in the same calendar year under the same infraction category, the suspension length and fine amount will be automatically doubled.

Note 4: For GM28 penalties assessed during zone play, the Zone Discipline Committee has latitude to determine the length of suspension based on the following conditions: the age division of the players, the experience of the official(s), the nature of the infraction, or any other objective factor that may influence the decision.

Note 5: For GM28 penalties assessed during tournaments, the Tournament Discipline Committee has latitude to determine the length of suspension based on the following conditions: the age division of the players, the experience of the official(s), the nature of the infraction, or any other objective factor that may influence the decision. The reason for the decision must be included in the convenor's tournament report for on issues of significance.

Zero Tolerance Policy

There will be zero tolerance for abuse of O.L.A. certified officials, during sanctioned lacrosse games in Zone 9, in either tournament or league play.

Immediate Ejection and Suspension:

- Immediate action to be taken by the Official, will be to eject the offending player/coach/team official/spectator from the game.
- Failure of the offender to leave the area as requested, will result in a forfeiture of the game to the non-offending team.
- The offender will be suspended indefinitely from all sanctioned lacrosse activities, until the occurrence has been dealt with by the Zone Disciplinary Committee.

Verbal Reporting:

- The Official must verbally report all instances of ejection due to 'abuse of an official', immediately following the game.
- This verbal report is to be filed with the Zone Technical Director to inform him that the suspension has occurred. (Must be followed up with a written report).
- The association hosting the event where the offence occurred, will be required to deal with the incident as per the following procedures:

Written Follow-up:

- Print a copy of the game sheet and a copy of the incident report from the Officials.
- Prepare a list of names and phone numbers of witnesses who were in attendance. These are to be submitted to the Zone Technical Director, who will then contact the Chair of the Zone Disciplinary Committee and the respective Convenor.
- Discipline Committee to be convened (within seven days) to meet with the offender(s) to have them explain their actions and to determine the length of suspension to be served.
- The Chair of the Disciplinary Committee will report the decision of the committee to the offender, the Association rep, the Convenor and the Zone Executive.
- Repeated occurrences will be dealt with by increasingly stiffer penalties and the ultimate penalty may be permanent removal from the arenas and the game.

Appeals:

- The offender may appeal the suspension to the Zone Executive via the Zone Appeal Process.

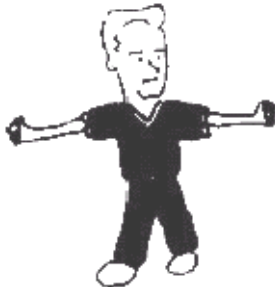

Both arms extended over your head.

Both arms extended to just over your head, with ten fingers apart and extended

Both feet on the floor, right leg forward and look straight ahead while striking knee



UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT
One hand on top of the other, to form a 'T', to the side of your body.

WASH OUT
Both arms swung laterally across the body with palms turned down. (Goal disallowed)

Crossed arms in front of chest, with fists closed.

MR7.12(a)
The sale or provision of alcoholic beverages or spirits by the sponsoring club or hosting organization at any minor event sanctioned by the Corporation is prohibited. Disciplinary action will be taken by the Board of Directors on any violation of this regulation.





RESIDENCE RULES

MR2.05

No player who has changed his residence or club since January 1st of the current year shall be certified unless he has satisfied the Board of Directors of such change with bona fide complete and definite information regarding same.

MR2.08(a)

A player resident in a community represented by a club with house league and/or a team entered in a category for which he is eligible to play, must register with that club except where such player's services are waived by that club subject to the provisions of MR3.12.

MR2.08(b)

A player who is eligible but resident in a municipality with no minor team in any group for which he is eligible, shall be given the choice of the club for which he may play, when the difference between his residence to the two or more municipalities concerned does not exceed eight kilometres by the shortest well traveled route and by mileage shown on the current map issued by the appropriate department of the Ontario Government.

MR2.08(c)

Having made his choice, such player shall remain a member of the club for which he has signed until properly released, or until the municipality in which he lives operates a team for which he is eligible, at which time he shall have the choice of signing with the new team in his own municipality or remaining with club with which he originally signed.

NOTE:

Paperweight players MUST return to their own resident association once attaining Tyke age.

Soft Lacrosse players MUST return to their own resident association once attaining Paperweight age.

MR2.09(a) Residence Rule:

This shall be an area in which he/she has been living with his family as of January 1st of the playing year. If a player makes a bona fide change of residence after January 1st and has qualified with a club, such a change of residence must be brought to the attention of the Board of Directors before such a player is entitled to play with the club he first qualified with.

MR2.09(b)

Any certified O.L.A. player who has played for five (5) consecutive years with the same club or association shall have the option upon changing residence to remain with his previous club or association for the remainder of his minor eligibility. Having made his choice, such player shall remain a member of the club for which he has signed until properly released. (see MR3.01, MR3.12)

MR2.10 – Residence Rule:

In the event a club signs a player from a city, town or village that does not have an entry by May 1st, and at a later date, city, town or village so affected enters a team, the player will remain with the team holding his signed certificate until released.

MR3.01

A player must apply for a release from his/her club/association to play for another club/association by May 15th of the current playing season. All players must be registered and OLA approved for the current season prior to any participation. Such release shall become official immediately upon Zone and OLA approval.

MR3.11

No rep player may be conditionally released more than once to the same club. If a club releases a rep player to the same club a second time, that player is unconditionally released to that club.

A player released to play House League, may not play Rep for that Club seeking that player's release, (either as an AP or otherwise), without the releasing club's written permission. Any player released to play house league may be released more than once to the same club without becoming unconditionally released.



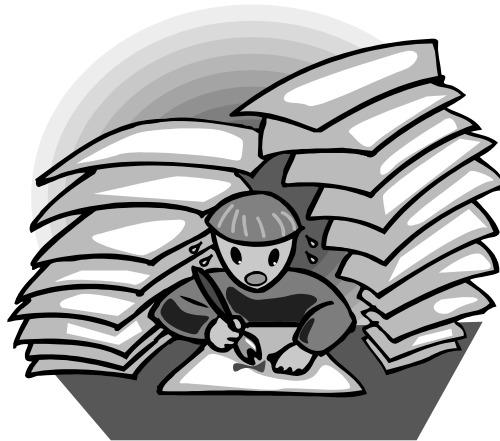

Definitions

In-Training: coach has attended the appropriate clinic.

Trained: coach has attended the appropriate clinic and has successfully completed the evaluation workbook.

Certified: coach has attended the appropriate clinic, successfully completed the evaluation workbook, CAC online ethics test, and an in-person/video evaluation of support to athletes in training OR coach has completed the technical, theory, and practical components of the old NCCP system.

Old NCCP vs. New NCCP **Old NCCP:** Levels 1, 2, 3 in technical (complete lacrosse specific clinic), theory (complete multi-sport clinic), and practical (coach a year and complete evaluation workbook).

New NCCP: Community-Development (Level 1), Competitive-Introduction (Level 2), and Competitive-Development (Level 3). In the new NCCP, technical and theory are integrated in the same clinic.

Stick Measurement Rules:

Players' sticks may be made of wood, plastic, metal, or other appropriate materials.

Any stick that the Referees determine to be dangerous is placed in the timekeeper's box for the remainder of the game (no penalty is assessed, the stick is simply removed).

Under no circumstances will a goal be disallowed as a result of a stick measurement.

Stick measurements/examinations must:

- 1) Be requested by a captain
- 2) Be requested during a stoppage in play (a goal, a penalty or a time-out)
- 3) Be requested while that stick is on the playing surface
- 4) Be requested for one of the following:
the length of the stick, the width of the stick, or the construction of the stick

Stick Length:

The length of a legal player's stick is 40" - 46" (bantam, midget, intermediate)

The length of a legal player's stick is 34" - 46" (paperweight, tyke, novice, peewee)

A goaltender's stick can be of any desired length (all divisions)

Stick lengths are measured from the butt of the stick to the top of the head (entire length of the stick)

Stick Width:

The width of a legal player's stick is 4½" - 8" (all divisions)

A Goaltender's stick can measure no wider than 15"


Stick widths are measured at the stick's widest point from the inside of the frame to the opposite side

Stick Construction:

The stick cannot be constructed, modified or strung in any way that withholds the ball from play.

The ball, when passed between the sidewalls of a stick, must travel freely from the top of the head of the stick to the ball stop at the bottom and rest freely. When the stick is turned over so that the open mouth of the stick faces the floor, the ball must drop out.

Use of illegal stick results in a minor penalty, and the stick remains in the timekeeper's box until the end of the game.

Example:

4 games are being played at Bill Burgoyne Arena in St. Catharines

Three referees are being used, all from out of town

6pm - Pee wee → R1 (Hamilton) and R2 (NOTL) → game fee paid

7pm - Bantam → R1 (Hamilton) and R2 (NOTL) → game fee **plus** R2 mileage

8 pm - Midget → R1 (Hamilton) and R3 (Welland) → game fee paid

9pm - Intermediate → R1 (Hamilton) and R3 (Welland) → game fee **plus** R1 and R3 mileage

In this case, the Bantam team pays R2's mileage, and the Intermediate team pays R1's and R3's mileage

All teams regardless of division, must have cash on hand to pay the officials' mileage, if necessary.

Note about assigning:

Our goal in assigning is to ensure that all games use local referees where possible, and when travel is necessary, that officials are used from the same center. Where officials travel from the same center, only one mileage is paid (either the referees carpool, or the referees split the total mileage.

If the person responsible for paying the referees has questions/concerns about the mileage and whether or not the referees should have split the mileage, that person should pay the referees the requested amount and then contact Sebastien Beaudoin:

Referees are paid at the end of each game by the home team of that division

It is the responsibility of the Home team in every game to determine, (by asking the referees), if they are just doing that game or if they are also doing the next game. In this way you will know which referee receives just the game fee and if either referee is to be paid mileage as well.

Referees must be paid for the games that they were scheduled to do, prior to them leaving the arena. If they are not paid for any reason, the Zone Treasurer will issue a cheque to the referee, for the amount owing. The Club will then be invoiced for the amount plus a \$50.00 fine





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OLA Paperweight (U7) Rules and Regulation

1. **Game Length.** All games are three 15-minute periods running time, with a buzzer after every three minutes indicating the line change. All players must change at each buzzer; players are not permitted to remain on the floor after a line change buzzer except in situations where there are less than ten players on the bench.
2. **Coaching.** One coach for each team is permitted on the floor for the purpose of assisting players during various points of play (including positioning and general encouragement). Coaches are not permitted to carry a stick on the floor or to address the referees. Each team must have one certified coach, one carded trainer, and may have up to three OLA-registered volunteers.
3. **Facing Off.** A face-off will be conducted at the start of each period and following each goal. For any other stoppage, including the three-minute line change buzzer, possession will be awarded by the referees nearest the location where play was stopped.
4. **Penalties.** Penalties will not be formally assessed. Where an infraction occurs, play will be stopped and the referee will briefly explain the infraction. For major infractions, the referee may direct the offending player to the player's bench for the remainder of the shift.
5. **Floor strength.** Each team must have five runners and a goaltender at all times, except in circumstances where a major infraction has resulted in an offending player returning to the player's bench. Teams are not permitted to "pull" or substitute goaltenders at any point in the game.
6. **The Game.** Referees in the paperweight division are encouraged to exercise professional judgement when officiating. The goal of both the referees and the coaching staff is to introduce the game to players through instruction and encouragement. Notwithstanding the regulations above, all CLA playing rules are in effect, aside from:
 - a. There is no shot clock
 - b. There is no over-and-back in a short-handed situation
 - c. There is no 10 second count in a short-handed situation
7. **Division Structure.** The paperweight division is sanctioned by the OLA to provide an introductory opportunity for non-competitive play. The paperweight division is not rated or ranked at any point throughout the season. Paperweight tournaments are formatted as non-seeded, round robin schedules where teams do not advance to a championship final.
8. **Tournament Recognition.** All players must be must be recognized in the same way (ie. trophies, medals, hats, etc.).

Zone Directors or Tournament Directors may not, under any circumstances, modify or otherwise alter the OLA Paperweight Rules & Regulations at the rep level without the written permission of the OLA VP of Minor Box. U7 (Paperweight Division) Rule Modification Rationale

The Long Term Player Development model sets out a vision for introductory levels of lacrosse that puts the player first. The LTAD model provides age-appropriate opportunities for kids to participate in the game. Focusing on development and enjoyment will lay the foundation for local, national and international success long into the future.

The LTAD model has been developed based on the following principles:

Doing the right thing for the player at the right stage in their development

Adopting a player-centered approach and not treating the development of all players the same way

The broader the foundation of players, the more successful the sport will be

Viewing player development as a long-term process

Learning the skills of running, scooping, cradling, passing, catching and shooting are primary, whereas stick-checking, cross-checking and body-checking are secondary

A need to better educate parents on the lacrosse development of their child – it is okay for parents to want their kids to get to the highest levels but they need to know the best way to go about it

In U7 (Paperweight), the following rule modifications are in effect:

1. Within the dotted line of the defensive zone, defending players are able to create contact by using the Place & Push mechanic on the ball-carrier. A defending player's stick must be placed on the opponent's arm before the defending player extends their own arms. This allows the defending player to accurately steer the attacking player away from the goal. Once the attacking ball-carrier is pushed outside of the dotted line, they can continue to be pushed until they no longer have the ball, but cannot be pushed into the boards.
2. Defending players cannot make contact with any attacking players who are not the ball-carrier (similar to field lacrosse) at anytime, anywhere on the floor. There is no Place & Push or cross-checking allowed on a non-ball-carrier anywhere on the floor.
3. Any violation of the modified contact rules (either #1 or #2) will result in a stoppage of play. The offending player will be sent to the team bench for an immediate substitution. Play can be restarted immediately with possession to the non-offending team, but the substitute player cannot enter the playing surface until the offending player has reached the exchange box. This penalty is not recorded on the score sheet. To facilitate skill development, body contact, stick-to-body or stick-to-stick contact that violates the modified rules is illegal.
4. Any actions of players which would result in a penalty under regulation box lacrosse rules will still result in a penalty being assessed as normal for the Paperweight division.
