





## **2021** **DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD** **KIM SPALSBURY**

Kim Spalsbury is respected by his peers and former student athletes for his selfless efforts and hard work in providing two communities successful track & cross-country programs, and cherished hometown involvement! In recognition of his commitment to school sports and community he has been selected as the 2021 recipient of the MHSCA “Jack Johnson” Distinguished Service Award.

Kim ran cross country and track while attending Hope College where he was the captain of both squads in his senior season. After graduation, Kim began his thirty-four year coaching career at Dewitt High School in 1978 with the Men’s Track and Field team, earning a regional championship and placing fifth at the state meet. He then moved on to coach Men’s Cross Country in Fowler from 1980-1995 and in Grand Ledge from 1997-2010 with a combined win/loss record of 178-36. He coached Women’s Cross Country in Fowler from 1980-1995 with a win/loss record of 123-26. His cross country teams combined earned 19 regional titles, 9 Greater Lansing titles, 30 top five state meet finishes, 5 state runners-up titles and 5 state titles. Kim also coached the Women’s Track and Field team at Fowler from 1981-1995 with a win/loss record of 119-17. These teams earned 14 regional championships, 15 league titles, 4 state runners-up titles and 4 state champion titles. Coach Spalsbury served as the Men’s Track and Field coach in Grand Ledge from 1998-2009 with a win/loss record of 76-13, earning four league titles (2006-2009), and 2 regional championships – the first in school history. In addition Kim coached middle school basketball and track for a total of 13 years at Camden-Frontier and Grand Ledge.

Coach Spalsbury has been honored many times throughout his career for his team’s achievements and his commitment to his student athletes, community and sport. He was named the Michigan Interscholastic Coaches Association Coach (MITCA) of the Year 10 times for either track or cross country, received the MITCA Kermit Ambrose Award, was inducted into the MITCA Hall of Fame, received the Greater Lansing Track and Field 1996 Eddy Award, named the 1990 Michigan High School Coaches Association (MHSCA) Women’s Track and Field Coach of the Year and National High School Athletic Coaches Association (NHSACA) national Coach of the Year nominee, 2005 Men’s Cross Country MHSCA Coach of the Year and NHSACA national Coach of the Year nominee, inducted into the MHSCA Hall of Fame and the Greater Lansing Area Sports Hall of Fame.

Throughout his career Kim has also been an active member of many different professional organizations. He served as the meet director of the Greater Lansing Honor Roll Meet of Champions from 2003-2015, was co-meet director of the Greater Lansing Cross Country Championships from 1997-present, served as past president of MITCA and MHSCA, former Executive Secretary of the MHSCA, has served on the board of the MHSCA since 1993, served on the Michigan High School Athletic Association committees for over 25 years, served as the Mideast Cross Country Meet of Champions coach for thirteen years, served as the Midwest Meet of Champions head coach for 11 years, and has been the Meet Director of the Midwest Meet from 2018 to the present.

Kim has also been an active member of his local community serving as the Lions Club president, vice president of the Grand Ledge Education Foundations, was named the Fowler teacher of the year 3 times, received the CMU Educator Award in 1996, helped co-found and run the Grand Ledge Summer Track program for 25 years, traveled to Europe 8 times with high school track athletes from all over the US as a coach with International Sports Tours, has been a member of the Associated Track Officials of Michigan (ATOM) as cross country and track and field official from 2011-present, and was awarded the ATOM Distinguished Service award in 2018.

Kim would like to thank his family for their constant support – his wife Kathy, their children Joshua (deceased), Jarred and Jenna and their grandchildren Jayden, Brynnley, Jameson and Raelynn. In addition he would like to thank his high school coaches Carl Chapman and Jim Brandt, and college coaches Bill Vanderbilt and Gordon Brewer, for modeling good coaching and for mentoring him over the years. He feels he has always been blessed with great student-athletes – “Their commitment and sacrifice is what it is all about!”

## ***DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD***

***NATE HAMPTON***



MHSAA Assistant Director Nate Hampton has served Michigan high school student-athletes and coaches for more than 30 years in ways that will continue to impact schools and athletes for years to come. In recognition of his efforts, he has been named the 2020 recipient of the Michigan High School Coaches Association “Jack Johnson” Distinguished Service Award.

Mr. Hampton has served the Michigan High School Athletic Association since 1990 and is the administrator for Basketball, Football, and Track & Field. He is also the staff liaison for the MHSAA Equity Committee and the Upper Peninsula Athletic Committee.

“Nate has contributed to Michigan high school athletics on a variety of levels providing vision, leadership and dedication,” MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl said. “Nate Hampton has shaped rules and policies that have impacted programs not only in our state, but nationally as well.”

A 1966 graduate of Eastern High School in Detroit and a 1971 graduate of Morgan State (Maryland) University, Hampton joined the MHSAA staff in 1990 after serving as citywide athletic administrator for the Saginaw (Michigan) Public School District for two years. At Saginaw, Hampton was responsible for the athletic programs for 24 elementary schools, five middle schools and two high schools.

In addition to his work at the MHSAA, Nate has provided a long list of contributions at the national level. He has served as the NFHS representative. In addition to his state level work with football and basketball, Hampton recently concluded a four-year term as chair of the NFHS Basketball Rules Committee, and he is a current member of the NFHS Football Rules Committee and the Football Equipment Subcommittee.

Mr. Hampton has received a Citation from the National Federation of State High School Associations. He has also received recognition by several Michigan sports associations for his ongoing dedication and support. The Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association presented him with the MIAAA Special Recognition Award, the Michigan Interscholastic Track Coaches Association recognized him for with their service to the organization, and Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan placed Nate in their Hall of Honors.

# TONY BIRG

Tony Birg joins this year's class of MHSCA Hall of Fame members with thirty-six years coaching experience in wrestling and two years' experience as an athletic director, all in the Springport School district. Since its inception in the late 60's Tony has been an instrumental part of Springport wrestling. He, and fellow teacher Burt Smock, started the wrestling program in Springport. Tony coached wrestling at the high school from 1966-1970, then coached at Springport Middle School from 1971 – 1980. He was back coaching at the high school level from 1980-2002. During his time as head coach his teams achieved a record of 223-80, won the Big Eight league championship five times, were district champions seven times, regional champions four times, and in the 1983/1984 season were the Class D Team State runner's up. In addition Tony's teams produced thirteen individual state champions, fifty-nine All-State wrestlers, and fifty-nine individual league champions.



Throughout his career Tony has been recognized by his peers and community for his coaching and service to his community. He has been named the Michigan Wrestling Association's Regional Coach of the Year four times, was the Big Eight league Coach of the Year four times, and has been inducted into the Michigan Wrestling Association's Hall of Fame. He also served as the Big Eight league secretary from 2003 – 2020.

Tony Birg is known as a "man of integrity and respect, who has positively impacted many generations in the small Springport community. He has been a mentor to hundreds of individual wrestlers and continues to share his sage wisdom with the coaches that have followed in his footsteps." Known for his motto, "If muscles were everything, bulls could catch rabbits," Tony is still viewed as a legend in his community.

# LEON BRAISTED III

Leon Orin Braisted III has served twenty-three years as a golf coach, so far. He began his career in 1998 as a varsity girls golf coach with eighteen seasons at Birmingham Seaholm High School. In 2016 he began coaching the girls varsity golf team at Birmingham Marian High Girl's School—Division 3 where he continues as head coach. During his tenure at these two schools, Leon's teams won eight state championships, were six time state runners up, placed third or fourth at the state tournament five times, were Catholic High School League champions twice, won eighteen regional championships, were Oakland County champions 4 or 5 times, and were Oakland Activities Association champions ten times. His girls teams boast an impressive combined win/loss of 2,863 -366. Leon also became the boys varsity golf coach at Birmingham Seaholm High School in 1998 and served there for nineteen years. In 2017 he became the varsity boys golf coach at Brother Rice High School—Division 2 where he continues to coach. To date his boys teams have won one Catholic High School League championship, seven Oakland Activities Association championships, and have been state runners up. His boys teams have over 2,000 wins.



Coach Braisted has received many honors throughout his coaching career. He has been named the MIGCA Coach of the Year four times, MHSCA Coach of the Year three times, NFHS Coach of the Year in 2018, NHSACA Coach of the Year in 2018, and was inducted into the MIGCA Hall of Fame in 2015.

Over the years Leon has also been active in many different sport associations. He has been the NHSACA Golf Chairperson at the National Convention, served as MIGCA President Elect, President, Past President and Executive Director, and also served as an MHSAA Representative.

Leon Orin Braisted III has organized many tournaments for all levels of high school golf participants over the years and has been a positive voice for change. He believes that you "Do for the kids. Give them opportunities that they might never have." It is this philosophy and his tremendous commitment to coaching that make his teams so successful.

## BRIAN GORDON



Brian Gordon's coaching career spans thirty-six years and three sports in Royal Oak. He has also served as the athletic director of Royal Oak Novi from 2010 to the present. From 1990 – 2010, Brian coached the Royal Oak Kimball High School baseball team with a record of 419-221. While head coach his teams won five league championships, four district championships, and one regional championship. During this time Brian also coached football at Royal Oak Kimball from 1990-1996 with a JV record of 40-23, and from 1997-2002 at Royal Oak Adams JH with a 28-7 record. From 1992 – 1995 he coached 9th grade boys basketball at Royal Oak Kimball with a record of 49-31.

As a varsity baseball coach, Brian Gordon has been recognized multiple times for his coaching and service to sport. He has been named District Coach of the Year five times, Regional Coach of the Year two times, All-Star Coach; Detroit News Metro Coach of the Year, Oakland County Coach of the Year, Royal Oak Schools Distinguished Coach, and was inducted into the MHSBCA Hall of Fame. He has also been honored for his leadership and hard work in his position as an athletic director. He has been named the Oakland County AD of the Year, the Region 11AD of the year, received the Allen Bush Award, and the Unified Champion Schools Award (Michigan Special Olympics).

Brian has also been active in many different sport associations throughout his career. He has served on the MHSBCA Board of Directors ten times, received the Oakland County Past President Recognition, was President of the Kensington Conference, VP of the Kensington Activities Associations, served as a Coaches Advancement Program Instructor, was a MIAA presenter, and Sport Commissioner (KLAA, OAA).

Brian Gordon is known for his dedication and tremendous work ethic evident in everything he does, professionally and personally. His motto throughout his career has been, "There may be people who have more talent than you, but there is no excuse for anyone to work harder than you do." He is highly respected in his community for his passion, enthusiasm and integrity which have impacted many generations of student athletes and coaches.

## MIKE TURNER



Michael Turner has accumulated thirty-one years as a hockey coach. He began his career in 1972 at Southgate Aquinas where he coached for one year. Then from 1973-1981 and 1994-2014, he was the head hockey coach at Trenton High School. During this time his teams earned a record of 629-126-52. His teams have held the state record for the most wins in hockey since 2014. In addition Coach Turner's teams have been State Champions eleven times, State Runners Up four times, and Regional Champions twenty times. During his career he also provided an avenue for over 40 players to advance to the next level of junior hockey, with at least 35 playing collegiate hockey and 6 at the professional level. In addition, four of Coach Turner's players were named Mr. Hockey for the MHCHCA. Coach Turner also coached varsity golf and JV softball for Trenton High School from 1973 -1981, and from 1981-1983 served as an assistant hockey coach at the University of Michigan.

Michael Turner has received many well deserved honors over his coaching career. He has been named MSHCA Coach of the Year four times, NHSACA Coach of the Year Finalist three times, NHSACA Coach of the Year, NFHSCA Section 4 Finalist, NFHSCA State Coach of the Year, USA Today National HS Hockey Coach of the Year, and was inducted into the Trenton Hall of Fame, the MSHCA Hall of Fame. He also coached "Replay the Series Hockey Game – Trenton vs Catholic Central." This was a tied game in 1999, resumed 11 years later in 2010 and was shown nationally by Fox Sports. Scotty Bowman was the honorary coach of the Catholic Central team, and Brendan Shanahan was the honorary coach of the Trenton Team. Hockey and Red Wing great, Gordie Howe dropped the opening game puck.

Coach Turner has been an active member in many different hockey associations serving 5 years on the MHSAA Hockey Planning Committee, the MHSAA Rules Committee, the MSHCA Seeding Committee, and was President of the Michigan Metro League for three years. He is respected in the hockey community for his knowledge of the sport, for the way he works with his players - bringing out the best in them, and for the respect his players have for him. He is known for his coaching mottos:

"Never underestimate the heart of a Trenton Trojan" and "Most teams play for a good season. At Trenton we play for Championships!"

# STEVE ZARANЕК

Steve Zaraneк has forty-two years of coaching experience as the Girls' Cross Country and Track and Field coach for Grosse Pointe South – so far. As the girls' cross country coach since 1979, Steve's teams have an overall dual meet record of 416-46. His teams have won 111 invitational championships, 28 league championships, 27 state regional championships, were team state finalists (top 3 at state regional) 37 times, had 16 top ten state D1 finishes, won the state D1 championship in 2011 and produced 33 All-State athletes. As the girls' track and field coach since 1980, his teams have an overall dual meet record of 281-33. Steve's track and field teams have won 52 invitational championships, 26 league championships, 21 state regional championships, 3 state D1 championships (2011, 2012, 2013), and produced 42 All-State athletes. In addition his teams hold state records in the 800, 1600 and 3200 meter relays and the national high school record in the 3200 meter relay.



A dedicated and legendary coach, Steve has been honored for his service and commitment to coaching many times. He has been named MITCA Division 1 Coach of the Year three times for girls' track and field and one time for girls' cross country, MITCA Coach of the Year nominee twelve times, MITCA National Coach of the Year finalist in 2013, and was inducted into the MITCA Hall of Fame in 2007.

Steve has also been an active member of several sport associations and his community. He has served as an MHSAA committee member 26 times since the mid-80's on various committees, served as the MHSAA state regional host (track and cross country) 40 times, was a clinic presenter for MITCA multiple times since the mid-90's, worked with the summer youth track and cross country programs for Grosse Pointe since 1980, volunteered as the parish athletic director (St. Clare-Grosses Pointe) from 1978-1995, and was the volunteer parish (CYO) youth head coach for basketball/volleyball/track from 1977-2005.

Throughout his coaching career Coach Zaraneк has taught his athletes to "Believe in yourself, your teammates, and your coaches. Together, the memories created will last a lifetime." Steve is known for his calm, consistent, caring demeanor and holding his student athletes accountable for being the best teammate possible. He is "knowledgeable, hardworking, competitive and above all, cares deeply about the student athlete." These qualities are what grew his teams from nine athletes in 1979 to an average of around ninety athletes today.

## ROGER AVERS




Roger Avers joins this class of MHSFA Hall of Fame inductees with thirty years of coaching experience. He started his career in 1965 at Grant High School as the JV football coach (18-5-2) and boys varsity track coach (17-10). In 1966 his desire to become a head football coach and to be closer to home, led him to Brown City High School where he coached varsity football (3-6) and track (6-2). After only one year, his home school, Algonac, had the varsity track and JV football positions open up. Roger spent five seasons as the JV football coach with a record of 21-17, twenty-five seasons as the boys varsity track coach with a 172-58 record, twenty-five years as the boys cross-country coach with a 164-60 record, and fourteen years as the girls cross country coach with a 79-24 record. Over the years his boys track teams earned thirteen league titles, six regional titles and a state title in the 3200M relay and two state titles in discus. His boys cross-country teams earned fourteen league titles, one regional title, had four All State Runners and one athlete qualify as an Academic All State Runner twice. Roger's girls cross-country teams earned thirteen league titles, three regional titles and had five All State Runners.

Roger has been recognized on many occasions by his peers and community for his service and commitment to coaching. He has been named Algonac Hall of Fame Coach (1986, 1989, 1990), SCAL Outstanding Service Award (1990), Boys MAC Conference Coach of the Year (1996, 1997), Girls MAC Conference Coach of the Year (1996, 1997), MITCA Regional Coach of the Year – Track (1995, 1996), National High School Scholastic Magazine Bronze Award (1988), Port Huron Times Herald Coach of the year for boys track and cross country and the State of Michigan Special Tribute - Track and Field (1996) signed by State Senator Dan Degrow, State Representative Karen Willard and Governor John Engler.

A key component of Roger Avers' coaching philosophy has been "The single most important factor in any success story is WILL POWER." Undoubtedly this is what has enabled Roger's influence on his athletes to extend beyond the individual's athletic accomplishments, and to help his athletes recognize personal worth. Since retiring from coaching he remains an advocate his athletes.

## LARRY BELLOR



Larry Bellor has accumulated twenty-five years of coaching experience beginning in 1979 at John Glen High School, where he coached JV football for one year with a record of 6-3. From there he moved on to Ogemaw Heights High School where he coached JV baseball, JV football for four years with a record of 24-12, and varsity football for twenty years with a record of 122-75. His varsity teams earned ten conference championships, eight play-off trips and in 1997 the Ogemaw Heights Varsity Football Team won the Class BB State Championship.


Over the course of his coaching career Larry received many accolades. He was named Regional Coach of the Year in 1994 and 1996, Class BB Region One Coach of the Year in 1997, MHSFA Hall of Fame in 2010, MHS Baseball Assistant Coach of the Year in 1989 and was a member of the East vs West All Star Coaching Staff in 2003. Still he remained "humble and directed the accolades toward the people around him. Not only did he display great respect and appreciation to his players and coaches but also to the behind the scenes people like the stat keepers, concession workers, equipment managers and so forth. Coach Bellor didn't just share the glory; he tried to give most of it away." As a former assistant coach observed, "To me, he preached NO individual was more important than the team... No player, coach, volunteering staff or school board member, Nobody! We won as a team, and lost as a team."

Larry Bellor's impact reached beyond the playing field and into the community. Larry started a reading program designed to get varsity football players in elementary classrooms reading to students. He also began a student athletic trainers program and created the first weight room at Ogemaw Heights High School, earning the money for equipment by holding "lift-a-thons". He also coached American Legion Baseball and Little League. He is highly respected by his peers, community and student athletes.

# DAN COON

Dan Coon enters this year's MHSCA Hall of Fame as a wrestling coach with thirty-seven years of experience – and still counting. Dan began his coaching career at his alma mater, Fowlerville High School, in 1979 as the Middle School Head Wrestling Coach. After a few short coaching experiences in Alma, Petoskey, Muskegon Catholic Central and Cheboygan, he returned to Fowlerville as an assistant coach in the fall of 1989. He became the head coach in 1991. In his first eleven years as Fowlerville's head coach his teams won six consecutive league titles and in 1994 they were State Champions. From 2006-2010 Dan was the head wrestling coach at Webberville High School. He returned to Fowlerville in 2010 where he remains as the head coach.



Throughout his career Dan has received many recognitions and awards. He was named MWA Regional Coach of the year in 1994 and 1998, MWA State Coach of the Year in 1994, coached at the Cadet World Championships, had two former wrestlers competing at the World Championships in 2018 and in 2019 was inducted into the MWA Hall of Fame.



# JEFFREY DEVANTIER

Jeffrey Devantier has coached cross-country and track for thirty-one years at Birmingham Seaholm High School. He was the coach of the girls cross-country team for 31 seasons (1988-2018) with a record of 177-45. Under his leadership the Birmingham Seaholm High School girls cross-country teams were six time Oakland County Michigan Girls Cross-Country meet champions, nine time Division 1 Michigan regional champions, three time State of Michigan champions (2012, 2014, 2015) and US National co-champions in 2012. Jeff also coached girls track for 25 seasons (1992-2016) with a record of 82-47, and boys track for 10 seasons (1989-1991 and 2004-2010).



Jeff has received many honors during his long career. He was named the National High School Coaches Association girls cross-country Coach of the Year for 2012-2013, Michigan's girls cross-country Coach of the Year three times – 2012, 2014 and 2015, and the Track & Field and Cross-Country Coaches Association girls cross-country Coach of the Year in 2015 representing Michigan.

Coach Devantier distinguished himself throughout his career for running his programs with the highest possible standards, teaching of commitment and work ethic, and delivering lifelong results for his that went beyond running for his student athletes. His prerace routine avoided lengthy speeches or pep talks. Instead bulleted points of that race day's strategies were covered and invariably ended with "You know what to do."

Jeff Devantier has been an active member of his community as a member of the Birmingham Lions Club and having his teams support the Run for the Blind fundraisers annually. He has also been a MITCA member since 1989.

## JAMES FELDKAMP



Jim Feldkamp has 50 years of experience as a coach of student athletes, coaches and athletic directors. He continues coaching today primarily as either a teaching facilitator for the MHSAA Coaches Advancement Program (CAP) or as a consultant to the Charter School Conference (16 schools). Within this 50 year window of time, 39 years included A.D. responsibilities. His athletic experiences include Romeo, Anchor Bay, Troy School District, Detroit University Prep H.S. and numerous schools and school districts primarily in southeastern Michigan. As the boys varsity basketball coach at Anchor Bay High School for 14 years in the 1970's and 80's, his teams' 151 career wins ranks as the most in school history and was a highly regarded program.

Throughout his career Jim has received recognition for his contributions and visionary approach primarily as an athletic administrator at the local, state and national levels. He has served as president of 4 different athletic conferences and also as president of the Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (MIAAAA) in 1999-2000. He has been named A.D. of the year in Oakland County (1997), for the State of Michigan (2001) and was a finalist as National A.D. of the year in 2002 representing MI, OH, IN, IL, WI and IA. The Michigan High School Athletic Association has recognized him as a recipient of the Allen Bush Award for exemplary service to interscholastic athletics in MI (2000) and also the Charles Forsythe Award for distinctive service (2005). In 2006 he received both the Michigan and National Awards of Merit and has been a presenter at 18 Michigan and 3 National Athletic Director Conferences. In 2014 he received The National Coach Contributor Award for Coaches Education from the National Federation (NFHS).

His service to community includes the creation of the Oakland County Slam Dunk and 3Point Shot Competition which over a 12-year period generated over \$90,000 for the benefit of the Troy Community Coalition for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse. This event was developed together by Jim along with his wife Pam. Also, a joint projects effort with the city recreation department led to ball field renovations throughout the Troy Community over several years along with the development of an extensive summer sports camps program which served over 25,000 participants in its initial 12 years. Jim also coached multiple youth basketball and baseball teams in the city as his three children were highly active in these programs.

## Laurie Glass



Laurie Glass has accrued thirty-one years of coaching experience to date. She began her career coaching JV and varsity volleyball years at Kalamazoo Central High School. After two years she was hired as the middle school basketball and volleyball coach, at her alma mater, Leland Public Schools. It seems especially fitting that she should return, because as a student Laurie started the girls' sports programs in Leland in 1976 by getting seven girls to sign up and finding a coach. From 1989-1990 she coached the girls varsity volleyball team at Leland with a 41-18-13 record and two conference championships. She then moved on to Traverse City Central coaching varsity volleyball for the next for years with a 125-49-23 record. From 1995 to 2007 she was back at Leland coaching varsity volleyball with a 551-157-48 record. Included in these wins were thirteen conference championships, ten district championships, eight regional titles, three trips to the final four, one runner-up finish and two state championships. In 2010 Laurie returned to Leland once again and continues there as varsity volleyball coach. To date her record is 415-122-33 including four conference championships, nine district championships, eight regional titles, two final four trips, two runner-up finishes, and one state championship. In addition her teams have earned Academic All-State Honors every year.

Laurie has received many honors throughout her coaching career. She was named NFHS-National Coach of the Year in 2014, NHSACA-National Coach of the Year Finalist in 2014, MHSCA Coach of the Year in 2014, MIVCA Coach of the Year in 2002, 2006 and 2015, MIVCA Regional Coach of the Year several different years, and Record-Eagle Coach of the Year in 2002 and 2006. She has also achieved the AVCA Milestone Awards for 500 and 1000 wins. In 2006 Laurie was inducted into the MIVCA Hall of Fame.

Laurie Glass has been a presenter multiple times at the Women in Sport Leadership Conference, at the Michigan Interscholastic Volleyball Coaches Association and was the "Featured Speaker" at the Nebraska Athletic Association Coaches Clinic and at the Coaches Clinic in the Upper Peninsula. She is also a mentor coach for coaches in Michigan and across the United States. She is highly regarded by her peers and student athletes. She is known for her work ethic, always going above and beyond in her responsibilities as coach and fostering positive relationships.

# DR. RANDY T. JOHNSON

Dr. Randy Johnson, "Doc", has coached "with dignity" at Auburn Hills Oakland Christian School for twenty-five years. He served as the boys varsity soccer coach from 1992-1999, with a record of 102-26-17 including three conference championships, one district championship and one regional championship. He was instrumental in the initiation of the girls varsity soccer program and coached from 1993-1999 with a record of 62-18-8. During this time his teams were undefeated in the conference six times and earned one district and one regional championship. Doc was also the boys varsity golf coach from 1999-2015 and 2017-2019 with a 252-23-2 record and earning thirteen conference championships, four district championships, four regional championships, one county championship and one state championship. He also initiated the boys JV and varsity bowling teams and was the varsity coach from 2005-2012 with a 51-27 record. The girls varsity bowling team was also initiated and coached by Doc from 2006-2012, and earned a 35-17 record. He also coached boys soccer and basketball from 1986-1991 at Heritage Christian High School in Cadillac, however it was not a MHSAA school at the time.



During Dr. Randy Johnson's twenty-five years of coaching he received Coach of the Year honors thirty-two times; sixteen MI-AC League honors, six district honors, five regional honors, three state honors and two county honors. He was also nominated twice for National Coach of the Year honors.

Doc has also been actively involved in many different sports associations and his community. He has been a member of the MHSSCA and served as the Division 4 representative and serving on the All-State selection committee. He has also been a member of the MIGCA, serving as the Division 4 representative and on the All-State selection committee. He served as League chairman for boys golf for eight years and hosted numerous soccer and golf tournaments. As a coach Dr. Randy Johnson's goal "was not to coach a sport; it was to invest in lives." He accomplished this through his coaching style and by running summer camps for all ages for soccer (12) and golf (8). He also took groups of high school students to Mexico fifteen times to play soccer, and distribute food, clothing and medical supplies. They also worked on building projects and helping orphaned children.

Because of this Dr. Randy Johnson is highly respected by coaches, parents, student athletes and the community; "Randy has an impeccable reputation among students and staff for caring for his family, students, school and athletics. This reputation is reinforced by Randy's actions in leading his teams to reinforce sportsmanship, athleticism, character, service and accountability."

# TIM MCINNIS

Timothy McInnis served thirty-four years as a swim coach. He began his career at Crestwood High School in 1982 and after one year moved to Northville High School where he coached from 1983-1985. Then, in 1987, Coach Tim was hired at Brighton High School and coached there until 2016. While he was boys head swim coach from 1990-1995 and 2009-2016 his teams earned three top ten finishes, had one All-American relay (1991) and one All-American Swimmer (2015). He was the boys assistant swim coach in 1996, 2007 and 2008. As girls assistant swim coach, his teams earned four top ten Division 1 finishes, had numerous All-American relays, numerous All-American swimmers and two state champions. Tim also coached the Brighton Eels Swim Team (B.E.S.T) from 1990-1995 and 2013-2015. And from 1989-2016 he served as the Brighton Aquatics Director.



Tim McInnis was undeniably a great coach, but it is the relationships he fostered with his athletes and their families that defined him as a great man. "Tim McInnis was more than just a coach. He was a friend, mentor, someone who would listen to you and most importantly a father figure. There is not a day that passes without a thought or memory of him." "Coach Tim always just had a way with the kids. He made every athlete feel part of the team whether they were an outstanding swimmer or just someone trying to be part of a team." "Being part of a 'winning team' is not always about bringing home the hardware it's about what you learn along the way. I think most of these kids feel that Coach Tim had a big impact in their lives and he will always be remembered in our hearts." "I want to be as good of a man in my life as Tim was in his."

Tim McInnis was an active member of the MISCA and also worked in his community with the Brighton Eels Swim Club and the Red Cross Swim Club.

## ANNMARIE MICHOL



Annmarie Michol joins the MHSCA Hall of Fame with twenty-eight years of coaching tennis to date. She began her career at Grosse Pointe South in 1990 as the boys JV tennis coach with a record of 24-8 over two seasons. From 1992-2010 she coached the boys varsity tennis team at De La Salle Collegiate with a record of 140-70-5. During this time her teams earned one regional championship, qualified for states four times and earned an 11<sup>th</sup> place finish at states. From 2012-2015, Annmarie coached girls varsity tennis at Regina High School with a record of 46-18 earning one regional championship and qualifying for states two times. Since 2016 she has been the boys and girls varsity tennis coach at Utica High School. To date her boys teams have a record of 66-8 and her girls teams have a record of 45-10.

Annmarie has been honored many times for her work in the classroom and on the tennis court over the years. She was the first female coach to be hired in De La Salle school history, was a recipient of the Lasallian "Educator of the Year" Award and the "Bishop John Quinn Teacher Award". As a coach she has received the CHSL Coach of the Year award eight times, MHSAA Regional Coach of the Year award over ten times, Macomb County Coach of the Year three times, State Coach of the Year in 1995 for boys tennis while at De La Salle and in 2017 while at Utica, had the De La Salle boys tennis team named Macomb county Team of the Year twelve times, had the De La Salle and Regina tennis programs recognized with Sportsmanship Awards and Academic All-State awards, and was inducted into the Macomb County Hall of Fame in 2013. In addition Ann Marie has directed the CHSL boys tennis tournament over ten times, has run the sectional meetings (Central Division) for many years, and has acted as the assistant site manager for MHSAA Regional Tournaments for many years.

Annmarie is highly respected by her peers and student athletes as a "consummate educator" spending countless hours working inside the classroom setting and outside of it. She currently serves on the Board of Directors of the MHSTeCA, and directed numerous summer camps to promote tennis, works as a promoter to make sure tennis coaches are registered with the coaches association, is a part of tutoring programs, academic affairs (honors banquets & graduation), student council and LINK Crew Moderator, has served on interviewing committees and plans on running for the State Tennis Board. In addition she has served as a Eucharistic Minister at De La Salle, Catechism teacher at St. Lawrence and has helped Campus Ministry with many of their functions.

Kathy Moody-Breece joins this year's class of inductees with twenty-two years of coaching experience in varsity softball and three years' experience as a JV volleyball coach. Kathy began her career at Elk Rapids High School in 1990 as the varsity softball coach. During the fourteen years she spent there as head coach her teams earned a record of 255-187. Her teams were district champions in 1993-1994, 1999-2000, 2002-2003, and were regional champions in 2002-2003. Kathy also served as the JV volleyball coach at Elk Rapids from 1990-1992. In 2007 she was hired as the varsity softball coach at Traverse City West where she coached until 2014 with a record of 116-151.

Throughout her coaching career Kathy has received many honors for her service and commitment to coaching. She has been named the MHSCA Softball Coach of the Year, MHSSCA Regional Coach of the Year (2002, 2003), MHSSCA District Coach of the Year six times, and in 2009 she was inducted into the MHSSCA Hall of Fame.

Robert E. Oliver has coached swimming for over forty-one years at several different high schools across Mid-Michigan, including Williamston High School, Haslett High School and Saginaw Public Schools. Under his leadership, Bob's teams have achieved an overall interscholastic dual meet record of 516-123-2, including fifteen undefeated seasons, thirteen seasons with only one loss, forty-five championships / invitational wins, and seven individual state champions.

A dedicated and driven coach, Bob is well respected by his peers, student-athletes, parents and his community. He has been honored for his service to his teams and sports on numerous occasions. 

He began his coaching career in 1973 as an assistant coach for the Holt wrestling club and continued for eleven years. In 1976 Rocky served as a volunteer coach for the Kalamazoo Central wrestling team and in 1977 served as a volunteer coach for Portage Central wrestling team. He moved on to be an assistant wrestling coach at Jackson High School in 1978 and in 1979 was hired as an assistant coach at Holt High School. Rocky has been the head coach of the Holt High School wrestling team since 1981 with a 599-106 record. During this time his teams have earned twenty-four league titles, thirty-four district titles, three state titles, one runner up finish and twenty-six top ten finishes. His teams have also produced one hundred ninety-one league champions, eighty-one state placers, eighteen state champions, one hundred ninety-nine state qualifiers and forty-eight wrestlers with 100+ wins.

Rocky is well respected by his peers for his coaching and sportsmanship and has been recognized on several occasions for his accomplishments. He has been named MWA State Coach of the Year (1996), received numerous Regional Coach of the Year Awards, many area (Lansing) Coach of the Year Awards, is a two time nominee for National Coach of the Year (NHSACA) and finalist, was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame (Stillwater, OK), inducted into the Michigan Wrestling Association Hall of Fame, inducted into the Holt Athletic Hall of Fame and the Greater Lansing Sports Hall of Fame.

Rocky has promoted his sport and student athletes as the USA Michigan Junior Open director from 1979-1983. He also served as president of the Holt Wrestling Club from 1981-1983, and continues to serve on the Holt Wrestling Club Board. Since 1979 he has also helped host 200+ tournaments. He has also been honored with the Modern Woodman of America Home Town Hero Award and the Top of the Town High School Coaches Award for the Lansing Area.

## TOM STOCKTON



Tom Stockton enters this year's MHSCA Hall of Fame with twenty-three years coaching experience. He has been the girls and boys varsity and junior varsity bowling coach at Sterling Heights Stevenson High School since 1997 and continues to coach there. To date his varsity girls bowling teams have a 172-34 record, including six conference titles, six regional titles and two state titles. His varsity boys bowling teams have a 135-73 record, including three conference titles, four regional titles and two state titles.

Over the course of his coaching career Tom has been honored by his peers and community for his service and coaching. He was named the Detroit Free Press Dream Team Coach of the Year (2004 & 2009), earned eight MAC Coach of the Year Awards, was named MHSIBCA Boys and Girls Coach of the Year (2009), was named the MHSCA Coach of the Year (2011), and was inducted into the MHSIBCA Hall of Fame (2008).

Tom continues to actively support and promote the sport of bowling. He is an active member of the MHSAA Bowling committee, continues as the MHSAA Regional and State Final Manager since 2004, has been a member of the MHSIBCA board of directors since 2002, and is the director of JV Championships and scholarship committee.

Coach Stockton believes that his "Titans are made not born" and has always preached that sportsmanship is the number one goal for every coach and team.

# SCOTT STREET

Scott Street has accumulated forty years of coaching experience. He began his coaching career at Flint Northern High School as the boys' varsity golf coach from 1980 to 1985 with a record of 39/26. He also served as the JV girls softball coach at Flint Northern during this time. Scott moved on to Walled Lake Western High School in 1985, beginning his coaching career there as the boys JV tennis coach. In 1986 he became the boys' varsity golf coach. To date his teams have a record of 256/131, including six league championships, and five state qualifying teams. In 1990 he started the girls varsity golf team and became the head coach. To date his girls teams have a record of 152/139, including three division championships and two state qualifying teams. In addition his teams have a combined eleven All-State Academic team awards and he has coach fourteen All-State Academic individuals.

Four years later, Jodi took over the young varsity volleyball program at Bedford and quickly made girls athletics a success at Bedford.


Coach Manore never would have guessed she would go on to become not just the winningest volleyball coach in the state, but the winningest coach in the country.

After eclipsing the 2,093-win mark during the 2019 season, in 35 years in charge at Bedford, Coach Manore has 2,093 career wins and a .834 winning percentage (2,093-362-59).

Jodi Manore has six Michigan High School Coaches Association coach of the year awards, and in 2016, she was named the national volleyball coach of the year by the National High School Athletic Coaches Association.

### ***MIKE JOLLY, DE LA SALLE COLLEGIATE***



Mike Jolly began his coaching career in basketball and football at Mount Clemens shortly after his graduation from the school in 1960.

His 59 years in coaching and administration continues to this day as a member of the De La Salle football staff that guided the Pilots to Division 2 state championships in 2014 and 2018. In addition to four years at Mount Clemens, he coached football, basketball and baseball at Chippewa Valley from 1965 to 1979; football, baseball and lacrosse from 1974 and from 1982 until the present at De La Salle.

He also was athletic director at De La Salle and since 2006 has been the Pilots' clay target shooting team head coach. Jolly graduated from Michigan State with a bachelor's degree in social science and master's degrees in physiology/anatomy/coaching and outdoor education.

He won the Gerry Carroll Award from US Lacrosse in 2012 for exemplary coaching and he was also the organization's National Man of the Year in 2000. He was the National High School Athletic Coaches Association's boys assistant Coach of the Year in 2011.
