Celebrating our legends and creating new ones is this year's focus of the National Football Foundation's Joe Tiller Chapter of Northwest Indiana.

The Tiller Chapter is moving ahead with a busy slate of events and projects for the remainder of 2022. The emphasis is to provide recognition for scholar-athletes and community members who support them and to raise funds for charities.

While fund-raising is an ongoing project, the NFF Honors Brunch "Celebrating Our Legends" XVIII on June 12 at the Purdue Memorial Union Ballrooms in West Lafayette was the organization's feature event. With a sellout crowd of 353, it kicked off the busiest six-month stretch in chapter history. See next two pages for more details.

Next up was NFF Night with the Lafayette Aviators on July 13 at Loeb Stadium in Lafayette. Promoted as a fund-raiser, it drew a disappointing response and generated minimal funds for the scholarship program. But, for those who attended, Prospect League baseball (Aviators vs. Burlington Bees) at beautiful Loeb Stadium was a wonderful respite in this summer of high temperatures, thanks to the hospitality of board member Nate Barrett and the kind folks at Twin City Superstore and the Chariot Automotive Group.

That event is followed by the Tyler Trent Golf Outing Sept. 9 at Coyote Crossing Golf Club and the NFF Honors Reception, which will feature the induction of former Purdue quarterback Kyle Orton into the Indiana Football Hall of Fame, that evening at Bruno's Swiss Inn in West Lafayette. Later in September, the chapter will sponsor a bus trip to the Indianapolis Colts-Kansas City Chiefs game, featuring first-round draft choice George Karlaftis, on Sept. 25. Depending on the popularity of that trip, the Tiller Chapter may sponsor a similar trip to a Purdue football game in November, possibly the Bucket Game in Bloomington, if tickets are available.

## LAFAYETTE JEFF'S PRESTON NAMED STATE SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF YEAR

Lafayette Jefferson High School's Brady Preston, a three-sport standout starter with four years of straight-A's in the classroom, has been named the National Football Foundation's State of Indiana Scholar-Athlete of the Year for 2021-22.

He becomes the 10th recipient of this annual state award.

Presentation of a trophy will take place July 27 at a private event at Town & Gown Bistro in West Lafayette. Winning the state award gives Brady a clean sweep of the awards designed to recognize outstanding scholarship and athletic prowess.

Preston was named the Lafayette Journal & Courier Male Student-Athlete of the Year on June 12 prior to being named the Joe Tiller Chapter Scholar-Athlete of the Year. On June 23, Preston was one of 82 scholar-athletes named to the NFF's Team of Distinction, a nation-wide recognition.

Representing the NFF's Joe Tiller Chapter of Northwest Indiana, Preston was selected by a panel of judges representing the four active NFF chapters in the state. The "competition" was based 40 percent on academics, 40 percent on athletics and 20 percent on citizenship, leadership and character.

Brady, the son of Mark and Cindy Preston of Lafayette, will study business at Butler University. He

earned a 4.35 GPA and was on the straight-A honor roll all eight semesters. A 2021 IFCA Academic All-State selection, Preston earned the 2021 Principal's Award for having the highest GPA on the baseball, basketball and football teams.

Preston started at Lafayette Jeff for three football seasons - one as a tight end and two as a quarterback - as part of the second winningest class in Lafayette Jeff football history, including three NCC championships. He was an All-NCC and All-J&C selection in both 2020 and 2021. He was a four-year letterwinner for the Broncho baseball team as a catcher and was a starting guard in basketball.

Preston was a pillar of the Lafayette community through the Salvation Army Red Kettle program and the Lafayette Community Christmas Day Dinner. He earned the Distinguished Citizenship Award from the City of Lafayette. At Lafayette Jeff, he was active in the National Honor Society and Spirit Advisory Club.

"Brady was a member of the varsity teams 12 times, lettering in every sport he participated in while in high school," Lafayette Jeff Football Coach Pat Shanley said. "He did so while taking AP courses and maintaining all-A's. Brady spent a lot of his free time volunteering and never missed a practice during his high school career. Brady has shown by example for

all local Lafayette student-athletes that it is possible to be a great student, a great athlete, volunteer locally and achieve your dreams of being a D-1 student-athlete."

The other three finalists for the NFF's top state award were:

- Cooper Koers of Indianapolis Cathedral H.S., representing the Central Indiana Chapter (going to Princeton University),
- Jakk Nichols of Evansville Reitz Memorial H.S., representing the Southern Indiana Chapter (going to University of Notre Dame) and
- Matthew Zhang of Mishawaka Penn H.S., representing the Moose Krause Chapter (going to University of Notre Dame).

"On behalf of the NFF chapters in Indiana, I want to congratulate all the scholar-athletes who were nominated and all the coaches and principals who nominated them this year as we advanced the NFF's recognition to all football-playing high schools in Indiana," said Jim Vrugink, the executive director for the Joe Tiller Chapter of Northwest Indiana, who coordinated the judging process for this award.

# TYLER TRENT GOLF OUTING SET FOR SEPT. 9

Golfers! Please add Sept. 9 to your calendar and plan to help make our second year of involvement with the Tyler Trent Golf Outing a great success.

After several years of the Ryan Kerrigan/12th Boiler Golf Outing as a combined effort between the NFF Tiller Chapter and Purdue's Trademarks Licensing Office, this chapter came to an agreement with the Tyler Trent Family and Purdue's Center for Cancer Research with help from the Purdue For Life Office and Boilers, Inc. The outing will be an 18-hole scramble at Coyote Crossing Golf Club near West Lafayette. Lunch will be provided on the course and



a reception will follow.

Capitalizing on terrific cooperation and involvement last September from former Purdue and NFL quarterback Jim Everett, the golf tournament organizers have invited another former Purdue and NFL quarterback, Kyle Orton, to serve as a host "celebrity" for this year's event. Orton will be in West Lafayette to be inducted into the Indiana Football Hall of Fame at Bruno's Swiss Inn that Friday evening and will play in the golf outing.

Primarily, the golf event will raise funds for cancer research and will honor the legacy of Purdue "super-fan" Tyler Trent who passed away in early 2019 after a news-making battle with osteosarcoma cancer. Last year, with 64 golfers and 13 sponsors, our first year of hosting this event, netted \$12,000 for cancer research, thanks to \$6,000 profit from the golf outing and a matching-gift program at the PCCR.

Additionally, this chapter served as a conduit for student intern Triston Myers' class project in the Krannert School of Management this past spring, raising approximately \$2,000 on the Purdue University Akerman-Allen Course in an event called the Tyler Trent Golf Scramble. Myers' efforts attracted 56 golfers and 11 hole sponsors.

Cost of participation in this September's event

will be the same as year, \$600 per foursome or \$150 per player (\$75 per student), and includes a long-sleeve, quarter-zip shirt, box lunch, golf cart, balls and 18 holes of golf.

## TICKETS AVAILABLE FOR GEORGE KARLAFTIS' HOMECOMING ... SEPT. 25 – KC CHIEFS AT INDY

The Tiller Chapter has a block of tickets for the anticipated sold-out Kansas City-Indianapolis NFL football game on Sept. 25 ... and the sale is under way. The Chiefs-Colts game will mark the first "return home" for former Purdue All-America defensive end George Karlaftis, who was the first-round draft choice of the Chiefs this spring.

The chapter is organizing a bus trip for fans at a cost of \$350 per person with the cost covering the transportation, a box lunch, ticket for the game, a souvenir shirt and a "Meet & Greet" opportunity with George after the game. A ticket-only option is avail-

able for \$250 per person. These tickets are for seats in the upper deck, between the 10 and 20-yard lines in section 637 on the east side of Lucas Oil Stadium, near the bus parking lot. Single tickets in that area are currently selling on Stub-hub and Vivid-seats for \$200+ and the prices are going up.

The chapter will accept ticket order requests at these prices (\$350 each including transportation and parking; \$250 each for ticket only) until Aug. 25 when the prices will be adjusted based on the going rate at that time.

This project will serve as a fund-raising effort

for the Tiller Scholarship Endowment, to assure the chapter's scholarship commitment remains intact to help area youth in their first year of college. If successful, the bus trip concept could be repeated later in the fall for the Purdue-Indiana "Bucket Game" in Bloomington, if tickets are available.

Advanced tickets for the Honors Reception Sept. 9 at Bruno’s Swiss Inn are \$30 each for Orton’s induction into the Indiana Football HOF. That price will increase to \$35 each after Aug. 9 until a sellout is achieved.

Registration fees for the Tyler Trent Golf Outing are \$150 per person or \$600 for a foursome.

For the Colts-Chiefs game on Sept. 25 (which promises to be one of the key games of the 2022 NFL season), our starting price, if ordered by Aug. 25, is \$350 per person, including bus transportation, souvenir shirt, box lunch, a post-game “Meet & Greet” with George and upper deck tickets between the 10 and 20 yard-line. Tickets only (you provide your own transportation and lunch) are \$250 each. These ticket prices may spike upward as demand increases after Aug. 25. The game is expected to be a sellout.

As a non-profit organization, this chapter has awarded nearly \$260,000 in grants, scholarships and honorariums plus another \$74,000 to other charities since receiving its charter in the fall of 2004.

Besides seeking donations and sponsorships to support the scholarship program, the chapter also receives money (\$500 for every 50 dues-paying members in the local chapter) from the national office in Irving, Tex. In its first 18 years, this chapter recognized 436 scholar-athletes.

The tax-deductible membership dues are \$60 per year or \$150 for three years, payable to the National Football Foundation. The NFF has 121 chapters and more than 10,000 members, nationally, and awards more than \$1.3 million in scholarships each year. The chapter is seeking partners and sponsors for scholarship packages, which are also tax-deductible.

### NFF HONORS BRUNCH

The June 12 event featured presentation of eight chapter awards to community members and recognition of 17 NFF scholar-athletes who were nominated by their schools throughout Northwest Indiana for the annual Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award and 33 Lafayette Journal & Courier student-athletes nominated by high school athletics directors in the J&C coverage area. Also recognized were 11 J&C sport-by-sport players of the year selected by the J&C sports staff and the Indiana Football Coaches Association North All-Star nominees from Regions 1 and 4. Personalized certificates were presented to the 42 prep athletes who chose to attend (see page 5).

The eight community awards were the results of nominations from chapter members and various entities to recognize outstanding accomplishments in NW Indiana communities. In addition, three former or current coaches were inducted in the Indiana Football Hall of Fame during the June 12 event.

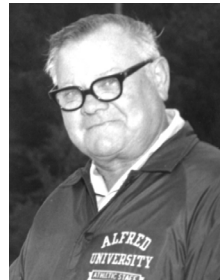

### COMMUNITY ICONS

The community awards included a tribute to Dr. Robert Hagen, who was the Tiller Chapter's President when he died unexpectedly in March. The NFF Chapter presented his wife, Debbie, with the chapter's highest honor, the Gold Medallion Award, for his incredible work in the Lafayette community as a top orthopedic surgeon, supporter of multiple charities (including serving as Chairman of the United Way Campaign and President of the Tiller Chapter) and a great fan of his favorite sports teams, especially Lafayette Jefferson Bronchos, West Lafayette Red Devils, Purdue Boilermakers, Florida Gators and the Detroit Tigers.

The other community awards went to attorney/photographer Sandra Dukes (Arnette Tiller Service to Football Award) for her generosity in pictures; to insurance provider/game official Trent Johnson (Todd Clark Outstanding Official Award); to auto sales/community servant Nate Barrett (Bernie Flowers Contribution to Amateur Sports Award); to university

administrator/play-by-play announcer Tim Newton (Leroy Keyes Legends Award); to education/athletic/philanthropy leaders Alan Karpick and Tom Schott (Purdue For Life Impact Award); to Carroll H.S. athlete Wade Peters, who survived a severe accident last summer (Patrick Mackey Courage Award) and to Purdue quarterback Aidan O'Connell (Drew Brees Mental Toughness Award).

In addition, the event featured appearances and interviews with Purdue Offensive Coordinator Brian Brohm and former Major League Baseball pitcher Clayton Richard.

### HALL OF FAMERS

The four IFCA Hall of Fame inductees have come to their distinction by very different paths – three as coaches and one as a star quarterback.

John Hendryx graduated from Ball State University and immediately went into teaching at Carroll High School and coaching baseball for nine years before becoming head football coach in 1994. Now, 28 years later, he has the 11th most wins among active coaches with a record of 232-97 (a .705 winning percentage) including Carroll, Northwestern, Knox and his alma mater Winamac, including an 8-1 record last fall while winning his sixth conference championship.

Kevin O'Shea graduated from Franklin College, where he led the nation in passing after starring as an all-state quarterback at McCutcheon H.S. in 1982 when the Mavs finished as state runner-up. O'Shea's prep coaching trail included stops at Delta, Attica, McCutcheon (where he coached Mr. Football Clayton Richard), Central Catholic (where he won five state championships and won 114 of 124 games in nine years) and now Indianapolis North Central. His 28-year record is 239-100 (.705 percentage).

Alex Yunevich graduated from Purdue University in 1932, after a stellar career as a running back at Bicknell H.S. and Purdue. He scored three touchdowns in Purdue's first-ever win over Michigan and helped the Boilermakers to a Big Ten Championship in 1929. He went on to coach at Central State Normal College (now Central Michigan University) and Alfred University in New York, compiling a 41-year record of 187-98-13 (.649 percentage), including six undefeated seasons at Alfred. "Yunie" was selected for HOF induction in 1988, but the ceremony never happened and he died in 1992. He was officially inducted posthumously on June 12.

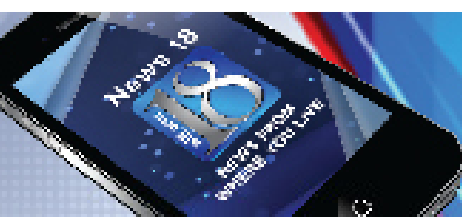
Kyle Orton, who now lives in Iowa, chose to be inducted into the Hall of Fame in September when he returns to West Lafayette for the Tyler Trent Golf Outing during a Boilermaker football weekend. He graduated from Purdue in 2005 after compiling some of the most impressive passing statistics in Boilermaker history, including 9,337 yards passing and 63 touchdown passes in four seasons. Orton went on to spend 10 years (2005-2014) in the NFL with five different teams – Chicago Bears, Denver Broncos, Kansas City Chiefs, Dallas Cowboys and Buffalo Bills.

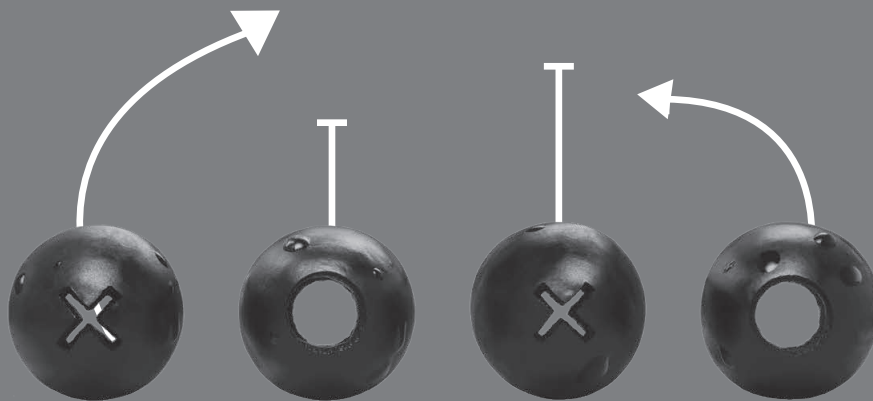
